"Bluebonnets Bloom, Cemetery Beautiful."

This headline on an article Sunday, describing the beauty of a cemetery near Electra while the bluebonnets were in bloom, refreshed our mind as to one of the reasons Spring is our favorite season. It's the maze of color about the countryside when wild flowers are in bloom.

Travelling along the highway, you motor from one riot of color into another as the variety of flowers burst forth in spring blossoms.

This riot of color was prevalent at our "shack on the lake" on two different week ends when we visited there. We had the sweet clover in profusion, an occasional buttercup, the wild onion, and other flowers which brought color and delightful odors to the surroundings.

"It's just so beautiful, I hate to mow," one of our neighbors remarked some two weeks ago. We didn't mow, principally because of a sore back muscle—then, too, fishing is a lot more fun than running a lawn mower when up there!

By this week end, the blossoming flowers had mostly given way to the passing of their season, or to the lack of rain which caused the soil to crack open. But along the roadways, we may see much color until well into summer, as other varieties of wild flowers burst into bloom. Large patches of "niggerheads" of buttercups always draw our admiration.

But try transplanting them from their native habitats, where seemingly they are getting no moisture, then water them well—and your efforts will go largely unrewarded.

The bluebonnet is our favorite of spring wild flowers. We have quite a few patches around Munday homes, but the ones that we always enjoy are those along the right-of-way at those lovely homes in Seymour, just after you cross the bridge going into town.

During our sojourn in Eldorado, Texas, we enjoyed three spring seasons. We used to travel the ranch roads—many times alone—just to enjoy the wild flowers in bloom. Bluebonnets and blue sage used to get us confused, they were so much alike.

We recall, too, that the cemetery just outside the city limits of Ballinger was almost solid with bluebonnets and was such a beautiful sight that travellers sometimes pulled off the highway to admire them for a while.

One spring, while in John Tarleton, we were assigned to a detail to go out into the country and gather a truck load of bluebonnets. We were excused from classes that day for this purpose. Another detail was to use the flowers to decorate the college park for some spring party.

Down near Glen Rose, we found the bluebonnet fields to our liking. Soon the truck was piled high, and were back at the college by mid-afternoon.

Several years ago, we decided a patch of bluebonnets would add to the attractiveness of our home. We purchased two packages of seed from "a cripple" who appeared to be making a living selling the state flower. We visioned such spring beauty as we had seen at the Dick Atkinson home.

But, you know, those things never did bloom! We guess the main reason is that the seed are still occupying an obscure corner in one of the drawers of our desk.

We've been told the bluebonnet should be planted sometime in September in order to bloom the next spring. By the time September rolls around, our mind is plumb away from planting activities. It's too near harvest time, we guess, and our mind has wandered away from spring.

We're somewhat of a genius at not getting little things done on time. We've received two of those give-away rain gauges at different times, but they never register the rainfall for us. They're still boxed up in our garage!

Munday Completes Field For Teen-Age Baseball Play; Games Start On May 30

Those interested in promoting teen-age baseball teams, those who are too old for Little League, have recently completed a field in Munday for these games. The boys will be members of Texas Teen-Age Baseball, Inc., and may go into the state play-off.

The grass field has been enclosed with cyclone fence and is of regulation size, being 320 feet from home plate to the fence. It will be lighted by 84 1,500-watt flood lights mounted on 60-foot poles.

The field is completed, with the exception of the stands, and will be paid for only by contributions. A drive is now under

way to secure funds for the field, which is costing around \$4,000. Everyone will be contacted and given an opportunity to help in this movement.

The field is constructed of material that will require a minimum of upkeep in future years.

Without this field, local boys of Rhineland, Goree and Munday were through with baseball when they became 13 years of age and ineligible for Little League. A program is now provided the youths until they graduate from high school. Munday High School will use the field in Inter-scholastic League play and will play their first game against Paducah on the night of May 12.

Munday will field one team in league play against Haskell (3 teams) Rule, Rochester, O'Brien and Knox City. Another local team will play against Crowell (2 teams) and Seymour.

The first league game will be on the night of May 30.

J. L. Stodghill is commissioner over all teams, Lee Roy Leflar is president of the Teen-Age Team, while Joe Lane is president of Little League. Other officers are Clint Norman, secretary and O. O. Putnam, treasurer.

In the teen-age group, Lonnie Offutt and Phillip McAfee will be managers of the south team, and Walter Coffman and Ronnie Skaggs, the north team.

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WE AIN'T SEEN NOTHING YET

The best way to solve community development problems is to get all kinds of local organizations working together on a comprehensive, do-it-yourself program. That is the view of Arthur H. Motley, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

On the highly specific side, he said that legislation now pending in Congress "could kill chambers of commerce and other local voluntary organizations working for community development . . . (and) could eliminate independent local government."

That's quite a statement. But Mr. Motley has evidence to support it. More than 250 local subsidy bills are pending. They provide Federal aid for repairing streets, sidewalks, bridges, parking lots, recreation facilities, garbage disposal facilities, sewage and sanitation facilities, police and fire protection, and many other local matters.

The thinking behind such proposals can only be that the Federal government should do everything. If that is to be the case, local government along with civic groups might as well shut up shop and call it a day. Then, in the matter of Federal taxes, controls, and regimentation, it will be a case of "we ain't seen nothing yet."

BROAD AS THE UNIVERSE

A more-than-superficial significance can be read into a late AP news photograph.

It shows President Kennedy throwing out the first baseball, to start the major league season in Washington, D. C. He thus followed a pleasant custom that goes back to the Taft Administration.

Beyond that, the significance is in the men seated on either side of the President. One is a leading member of his own party, Senator Humphrey. The other, however, is a leader of the opposition—Senator Dirksen.

Mr. Dirksen, needless to say, will disagree with the President and with Mr. Humphrey on many an occasion, and will do his honest best to defeat various of the laws they support—just as he did his honest best to block the President's bid for office last November. But that does not stand in the way of a mutual friendliness and respect.

In many a nation there is no opposition to those in power—the former opponents are either exiled or dead. In a free nation, political opponents go together to a sporting event. This difference is

as broad as the universe and is the distinguishing characteristic of free men.

NOT THE CULPRIT

Are you one of the people who think that profits represent a very big price of what we pay for commodities? If so, a statement taken from a publication of the Merchants and Manufacturers Association will prove enlightening: "According to Internal Revenue statistics, business generally, in the United States, makes three cents profit on every sales dollar after taxes.

"The percentage of profit varies somewhat from industry to industry. According to the Harvard Business School Division of Research, in 1959 the net profits for food chains worked out to about 1.4 per cent of the sales dollar. That means that it came to 14 cents on a typical \$10 bag of groceries.

"In other words, the profit on food is so small, that if it were entirely eliminated the average customer wouldn't recognize the fact that it was gone."

In other words, if we're looking for a culprit to blame for inflated prices, the profit item simply won't fit. It would be an extremely minor factor in the overall price picture.

The current volume of mail runs to 65,000,000 pieces a year. In the next half century, says Postmaster General Day, it can be expected to double, creating "fantastic" mechanical problems in moving and delivering it. He invites the nation's industrial engineering and research talent to join with government in solving the problems.

According to President Keith Funston of the New York Stock Exchange, the Exchange Community has just experienced the busiest first quarter in its 169-year history. Also, some 15,000,000 individuals now own shares in publicly-held corporations as against 6,500,000 only nine years ago. The number of shares listed on the Exchange has more than doubled in the past six years for a total of 6,500,000,000.

The latest Gallup Poll, taken during the August 25 - September 3 period, indicates that the Presidential race is a toss-up, with 48 per cent of the voters leaning to Kennedy, Johnson, 47 per cent to Nixon-Lodge, and 5 per cent undecided.

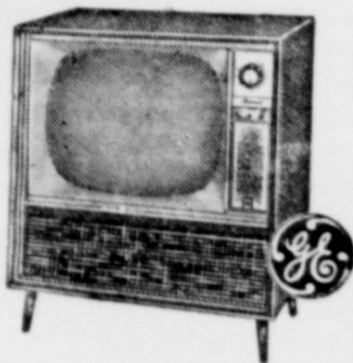
