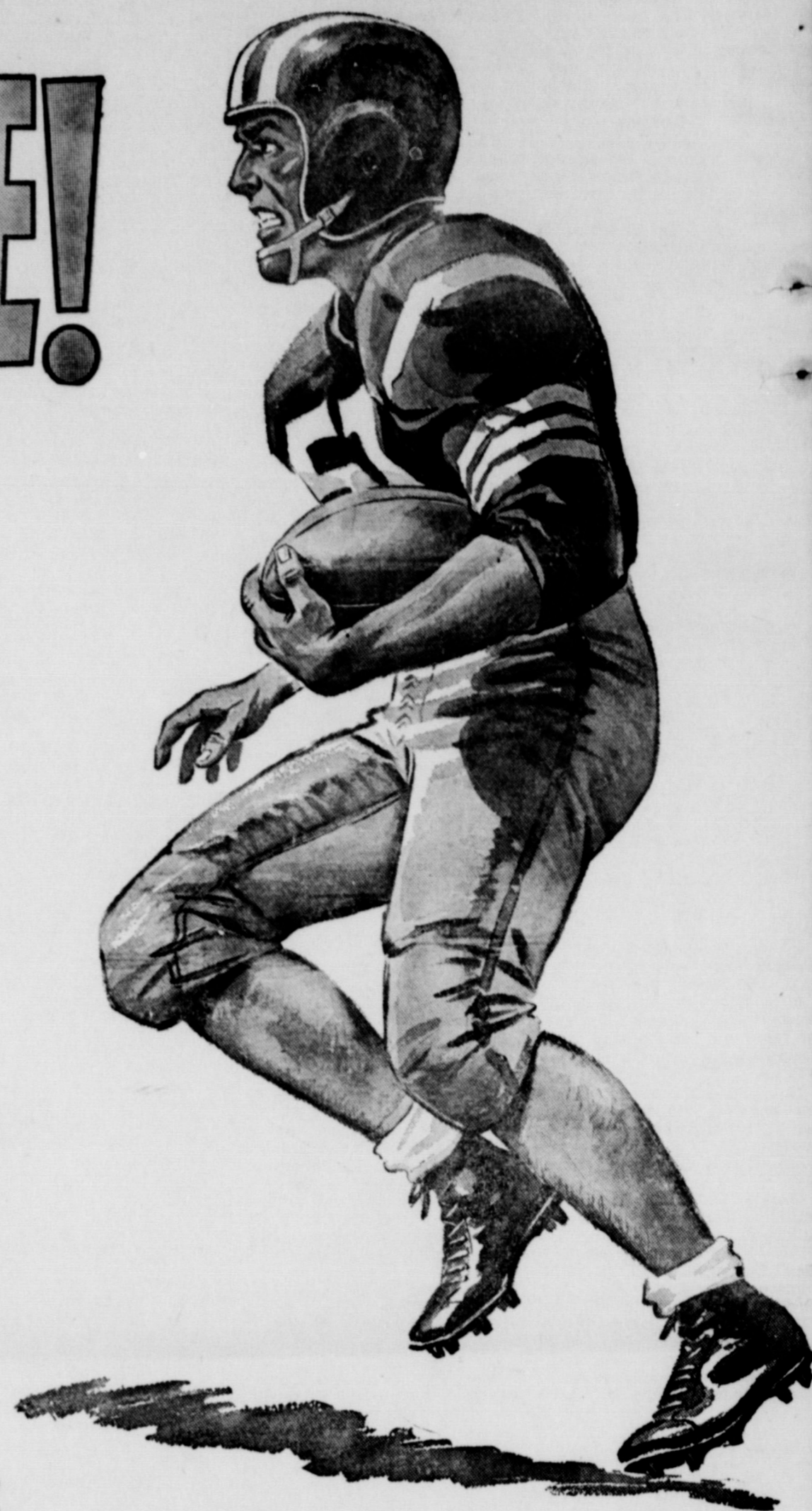

Knox Prairie Philosopher Finds That He's An Expert On Just How To Help Congressmen Escape Backaches

Dear editor: People are always looking to Washington for advice and information, but occasionally Washington ought to look out in the country for advice and information for itself.

For example, I was sitting under a tree on this Johnson grass farm the other afternoon, just stretching my legs and resting by back, and since I figured I could still do that and read a newspaper at the same time, I pulled out a paper and started reading.

What startled me was an article saying a Washington doctor has been advising Congressmen and other officials on how to take care of themselves, to keep from developing backaches and general muscular strains. In the first place, this doctor said, "a too-high chair will cause pressure on certain blood vessels in the thigh and may lead to severe cramps in the calf, initiating a painful muscle spasm sometimes with far-reaching consequences." I have known this for years. If

Taxes In Texas Not As Heavy As Other States

The Munday Times has received the following statement from Sen. George Moffett, concerning the new tax law:

"The tax law which became effective Sept. 1st, has not only placed proper financial support under the states school system, but also provides new money from which Old Age Assistance checks will be increased three dollars per month. The old people will now receive the highest average monthly checks ever received in Texas.

"Texas teachers will not only receive a substantial salary increase, but will also have one of the very best teacher retirement systems in the entire U. S.

"The new tax bill also will, over a two year period, wipe out the present large state deficit. This deficit was caused in part by the heavy decline in revenue from the crude oil tax, which now brings in thirty million dollars per year less than it did in 1957.

"However, the revenue from the tax on natural gas at the mouth of the well is rising slowly. It now yields over fifty eight million dollars per year. Attempts to place a special tax on the natural gas leaving the state have twice been declared illegal by the U. S. Supreme Court, and its doubtful that this special kind of a tax be made to stand up.

"All states joining Texas have a higher gasoline tax than our state, yet we have better roads. All neighboring states also have a state income tax, as well as a sales tax. Texas is better off tax-wise than any of its neighbors. The Texas legislature is generally slow to vote new taxes, unless the need is clear. As time passes on the need for smoothing out the rough spots in the new tax bill will appear. The Governor has indicated that he will call another session to make the proper changes. This seems a wise course. I hope it is followed.

Dave Hunters Are Finding Few Birds

Dove hunters in the North Zone have found slim picking so far since opening of the season September 1, according to reports to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator of the Game and Fish Commission.

In some areas where the grain sorghum harvest has been underway, doves seem to be fairly plentiful. Waterhole shooting, however, has been very skimpy.

According to reports from Oklahoma, dove shooting there has been very good. It is expected that with a change in weather conditions, many of these doves will be moving on south.

Feed then is the problem. If dove weed seeds are ripe and there is plenty of feed to hold doves, they may remain scattered through the northern zone, according to game wardens who have been watching the whole dove situation.

Outlook for a good quail season this year still is good, according to many of the wardens.

"Medicine To Produce Health Has To Examine Disease"



Modern practice of medicine differs greatly from ancient methods. A research team of scientists, pharmaceutical chemists and physicians are continuously studying the causes of the different diseases.

Once they are known, it is only a matter of time before cures are discovered. Physicians now have better methods of diagnosis and treatment.
