On their return trip they fell into a ditch deeper than the others but were rescued by a jeep load of men. They made the trip back to camp, and Mrs. Armstrong stated "Now that it is over and we are back safe and sound, I see it was a wonderful and exhilarating experience, but I am glad it is in the past, I have learned that in times and conditions such as these, everyone becomes wonderful. Strangers fall in and help strangers and depart friends."

Cypert Receives Burns In Oil Well Accident Friday

I. R. Cypert, well known Munday man, is being hospitalized at the Knox County Hospital for severe burns which he received in an oil well fire last Friday.

Mr. Cypert was servicing a well southeast of Munday when the gas caught fire and ignited his clothing. He failed to extinguish the fire by rolling over, but finally removed his trousers and put out the fire. Although suffering from burns, he extinguished the grass fire around the well, then started driving back to Munday.

He met friends who brought him into town, and he was taken to the hospital.

Mr. Cypert received first degree burns about the hands and third degree burns on his right limb. He is reported to be resting nicely at the hospital.

License Lack Tops Oct. Game Arrests

Fishing without a license continued to be the major game law violation in October, according to a report of J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator of the Game and Fish Commission.

Wardens charged 114 persons with fishing without a license. There were 23 hunters also charged with hunting without a license. Hunting from an automobile, and hunting in closed season were next high on the list, with 25 violations in each category.

Ten persons were arrested for killing doves in closed season, 11 for killing quail, and 13 for killing squirrels.

In all, wardens made 295 arrests, and fines and court costs amounted to \$7,987.01. Five hunters paid fines ranging from \$50 to \$200 for deer violations. Their licenses also were revoked.

Even Santa Needs Social Security No.

Many housewives and students who will be working during the holiday season, many for the first time, should make certain that they are properly prepared to go to work, according to Erton F. Ttate, Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Office.

If you are planning to work and do not have a social security number, now would be a good time to get one. If you work in employment covered by social security, you need a social security account number.

If you have had a number before, and lost the card, it is very important that you have the same number on your new card, so you will be properly credited with all of your earnings.

Women who have social security cards, but have married since they last worked, should be sure to have the social security office change the social security records. A new card with the original number but the proper name will be issued to each one.

While it is generally known that farmers in this country are the most efficient in the world, the rate at which they have progressed in recent years is one of the most significant developments of the century.

As research develops new techniques, materials, and machinery, and education speeds their adoption by farmers, production per acre and per man-hour is stepped up vastly.

Per-acre yield of 18 leading field crops, for example, is 71 per cent more than 20 years ago. It rose almost 40 per cent between 1944 and 1959.

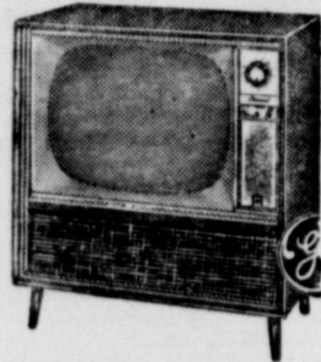
