### Income Tax Meetings

There has been two income tax meetings scheduled in Knox County for Friday, January 5th.

The first meeting will be held in the county court house starting at 9:30 A.M. and the second is being sponsored by the Citizens State Bank of Knox City and is to be held at Roddy's Cafe in Knox City starting at 7:00 P. M. This will be of special interest to farmers and ranchers of the area and income tax consultants.

Cliff Bates of the Extension Service and a representative of the Social Security Administration are scheduled for the program. The farmers Tax Guide will be discussed and free copies are available. This book contains many examples worked out for typical farms in order to show how the rules work.

The guide contains many features that will be beneficial for the farmer and rancher that fills out his tax return or it can be of help to the man that has his return filled out by a professional. Page 3 of the booklet is the 1962 Tax Calendar which tells you when to pay various taxes, file tax returns, and do other things required by the law. A check list of farm income expenses appears on page 18 of the booklet.

### Knox County Jr. Livestock Show

The Knox County Jr. Livestock Show has been set for Jan. 13, 1962, in Munday. The show is a revolving show and rotates between Munday, Benjamin, Goree and Knox City.

## Former Munday Resident Dies At Winters Friday

David C. Fritz, 83, former resident of Munday, passed away at Hospital after an illness of three months. He recently underwent surgery in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Mr. Fritz was born February 26, 1878 in Celeste and lived there until going to work for the M. K. & T. Railroad as a telegrapher. He worked in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas, retiring at Munday in 1923. He was a large landowner and operated farms and ranches around Munday.

Mr. Fritz moved to Abilene in 1933. He and his wife moved to Winters in 1956.

For several years, Mr. Fritz was a trustee of the Munday school, and also was one of the original directors of the Knox County Hospital, serving on the board for several years.

He was a Shriner, a Mason and a member of the Church of Christ.

His first wife was Docia Allen Bray, whom he married November 11, 1903, at Whitewright. On August 24, following the death of his first wife in 1957, he married Mrs. Joanna Bell in Abilene.

Final tabulations showed Purcell with 8,966 votes and Meissner with 6,740. Total votes in the election was 26,639.

The district is composed of the counties of Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cooke, Denton, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, Jack, Kent, Knox, Montague, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

## L. A. Parker Asks Another Term As County Judge

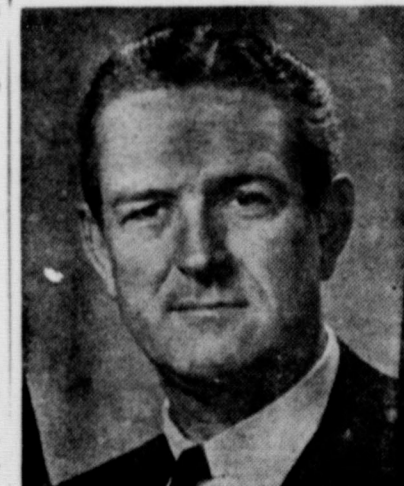

### OUT OF SWADDLING CLOTHES

The jet age of air travel has just reached its third birthday. But it certainly came out of its swaddling clothes in a hurry.

Pan American World Airways, which inaugurated U. S.-flag jet service, announces that it has flown 120,021,500 jet miles and carried almost 2,000,000 passengers since its planes entered service in 1958.

Translated into space terms this means that Pan Am's jet Clippers—of which there are 52, with the greatest jet experience in the industry—could have carried the entire population of the city of Philadelphia to the moon and back 237 times.

The Jet Clipper America, which made the first U. S.-flag jet flight from New York to Paris, has now logged more than 4,000,000 miles, or some 8,000 hours in the air. And the jet powerplants used by Pan Am have proven to be models of reliability. An in-flight failure has occurred only once in approximately every 40,000 hours. This means that a jet captain, flying an average of 900 hours a year, could fly for more than 40 years without ever experiencing an engine failure.

To sum up, a single jet clipper in a month's operations covers about 160,000 miles. That fact would startle even Jules Verne.

### IT'S THE PERCENTAGE THAT COUNTS

What has happened to food prices in the last 12 years?

The common answer would be that they've zoomed. And, of course, measured by the dollars-and-cents barometer alone that is true. But it's a faulty barometer, for it takes no account of increases in our incomes.

According to the National Association of Food Chains, retail food prices have increased less than 17 per cent since the 1947-49 period—while wage rates have gone up 72 per cent. This means that food prices declined 32 per cent relative to wages.

The point is that food is cheaper today than ever before—and, additionally, its prices have risen less than the price of most other consumer items. That speaks mightily well for the efficiency of those who produce and process our food, and those who sell it to us across the retail counters.

### JIGSAW PUZZLE

For years the people have heard Congress talk about revising the federal tax system, but the only result is more and more complicated laws and administrative rulings by the Internal Revenue Service.

Even a small business and many individuals require a lawyer or public accountant to make

out federal income tax returns. This amounts to an addition to the tax load.

Commenting on our jigsaw puzzle, federal tax system, columnist David Lawrence said, "that national growth is being impeded . . . and even discouraged" by it, and that "the greatest obstacle to national growth is the federal government itself, aided and abetted by demagogic politicians and narrow-visioned economic advisers in the government."

### A WARY EYE

If you were a retailer, or were involved in some branch of the food industry, how would you like to try to compete with a huge, completely integrated seed-through-store cooperative, financed with low-interest government loans, owning its own sources of merchandise, immune from the anti-trust laws, exempted from federal corporation taxes and forbidden to make a profit?

That is precisely the kind of organization, according to a National Association of Food Chains bulletin, that a group of representatives of certain cooperatives and farm organizations have been planning and discussing.

The super co-op, it is said, would provide a "yardstick" against which food industry operations—manufacturing and wholesaling as well as retailing—could be measured. This was the argument that was used by the sponsors of the Tennessee Valley Authority, TVA, they argued, would provide a "yardstick" for measuring the propriety of the rates charged by private utilities. They forgot to say that a "yardstick" based on tax favoritism and other special privileges is about 30 inches long. And that would be the case with the co-op "yardstick."

It seems impossible that Congress would even seriously consider the co-op idea, much less approve it. But strange things sometimes happen in Washington. That's why all of us should keep a wary eye on the nation's capital at all times.

Jno. G. Pew of the Sun Oil Company remarks: "To our critics I say: 'If you think the oil producing industry is getting the preferential break as compared with other industries, why don't you get in the producing business yourself and enjoy the advantages you think we get?' The industry is not a closed fraternity. Ours is the most exciting and challenging business in existence. It has its heartbreaks but it also has its joys. The only drawback is that many people try it and go broke."

This results in a well-fed nation and an under-

paid farmer.  
The way I see it, 1962 will be all right. In fact, 1961 was too and could have been better if I'd worked harder, but when it comes to a choice between a sorry year and working harder, you know which one I choose. I figured out long ago the worst way to whip a surplus is by piling more on top of it.
