One afternoon many years ago, we returned to the office from a trek about town, and an employee asked: "Did you see your old friend, Boyce House?" "No, and I've never met Boyce House," we replied. "That's funny," she said, "he talked like you were a long lost buddy."

That was the way with Boyce House. Anyone associated with the newspaper business was like a long lost buddy to him.

We later met Boyce House, however, and had a number of pleasant visits with him at press gatherings, the State Fair in Dallas, and other places.

In addition to being a writer and former newspaperman, House was well known as an after-dinner speaker. We had him here one time as speaker for our annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

On one occasion, we stepped up when Boyce and another newspaperman were engaged in conversation. "Do you know Mr. Edgar?" Boyce was asked. He turned to us and said: "Yeah, I work for him."

Of course, he referred to his column, "Boyce House Gives You Texas," which we were running regularly in this paper. House was "working" for the Munday Times when we came to Munday in 1938, and had been since that time. His column appeared in a number of Texas newspapers.

It took a fling, at politics, unsuccessful. He didn't make the runoff in his race for lieutenant governor in 1942, but in 1946 he ran Allan Shivers a close second.

Some time after that, he began barging for his column, just about enough to cover the expense of mailing. We bought a year's supply for \$9.00, we believe. He later started sending them out "for free" again, and we remarked: "Well, Boyce House is fixing to get into politics again!" He never did.

He went to Hollywood at one time and served as technical advisor and writing consultant for the MGM film, "Boom Town," based on the Burk Burnett oil boom. He maintained a full schedule of engagements until late last summer, when he suffered his first heart attack.

We not only lost "an employee" but a close friend in the death of Boyce House. He was a friend to everyone engaged in the newspaper profession.

We found the following interesting item in Paul Crume's "Big D" column in Sunday's Dallas Morning News:

"While visiting her daughter, Mrs. Will Scott Richter, here during the holidays, Mrs. E. F. Heard of Goree got interested in a young Negro who was being turned away from the mailing window of a postal substation because he couldn't tell the clerk what the illegible address on a package was.

"Maybe I can read it for you," she said. It was easy. The package was sent in care of the Ross Bates Farms at Goree.

"I'll be going right past there tomorrow," said Mrs. Heard.

In case you haven't realized it, we headed right smack into a brand new year. We didn't give any hilarious greeting, but we greeted right through the year into the new.

Consequently, we didn't get our early dose of B. E. peas! Boy's-Eye View Of N.Y. World's Fair Symbol



Scale model of Unisphere, symbol of the New York 1964-1965 World's Fair, captures rapt attention of the young Adams brothers, 9-year-old Graham and Willie, 2, of Islip, Long Island, in the Administration Building. The 13-story stainless steel globe, encircled by moving simulated satellites, will be erected, as a gift of United States Steel Company, at the theme center of the giant international exposition which will cover 646 acres of Flushing Meadow Park in Queens, New York City. Recognized as the greatest World's Fair in history, the exposition, opening April 22, 1964, is expected to attract 70,000,000 visitors to exhibits of the Federal Government, the States, foreign nations and industry from all over the world.

Boyce House, Bragginst Texan Of All, Dies At Fort Worth Home On Saturday

Boyce House, known as the bragginst Texan of them all, was found dead in his bed at his hotel apartment in Fort Worth last Saturday.

The 64-year-old author and humorist, whose books of Texas tales have sold hundreds of thousands of copies, apparently died of a heart attack. He had picked up his morning newspaper and gone back to bed to read it. A maid became concerned when he failed to rise and discovered him dead shortly before noon.

House suffered a heart attack last September and had been in ill health in recent months.

He was active as executive vice president of the Association of Consumer Finance Companies of Texas until his heart attack.

Although he had written on various topics, it was House's compilations of tall Texas tales that brought him renown. Most of the stories were familiar ones, but House maintained that people would rather hear stories they've already heard than new ones.

"Texans at heart are really modest," he said, "but when we tell the plain, unadorned, unretouched truth about our incomparable state, we are accused of exaggerating."

House started writing in 1935. It was the publication of "I Give You Texas" in 1943 that gave him his first big boost. The book sold 130,000 copies, many of them to Texas overseas fighting the war.

Then came "Tall Talk from Texas" and "Texas Proud and Loud." Many others followed.

House was born in Piggott, Ark., where his father was a printer and editor of a weekly newspaper. He spent his early boyhood in Texas, grew up in Memphis, Tenn., and returned to Texas in 1920.

He became editor of Eastland's daily newspaper in 1921, and it was there in 1928 that he broke the story of "Old Rip."

Old Rip was a horned frog which had been placed in the cornerstone of the Eastland County courthouse 31 years before. The building was being torn down and the man who had entombed the toad—then-county clerk Ernest Wood—believed it would be found alive.

House, although dubious, saw the possibilities of the story and set it before his readers. A crowd of thousands gathered to view the opening of the cornerstone—and the horned frog was found alive.

They named it Old Rip and took it on a national tour which even reached the White House. President Coolidge was kept waiting 10 minutes for a chance to see the toad.

Grandfield, Okla., Man Takes Over Management Of Theatres In Munday

W. R. (Bill) Petty of Grandfield, Okla., has taken over the management of the Roxy and Roy theatres in Munday, as well as Sunset Drive-in Theatre.

He assumed management on Monday, January 1, under a lease agreement, with option to buy, with Mrs. P. V. Williams, owner of the local theatres and Clyde E. Williams of Knox City, co-owner with Mrs. Williams of the drive-in theatre.

Mr. Petty, who owns and operates a theatre in Grandfield, Okla., has had some 30 years of experience in the theatre business. He operated theatres in both Abilene and Wichita Falls for a large theatre firm, as well as theatres in several other places. He has operated his own business for the past ten years.

Mr. Petty will continue to make his home in Grandfield, although he will spend a portion of his time with the local theatres.

His wife, the former Wilma Dean Griffith of Munday, is in charge of the Grandfield theatre, while Mrs. Daisy Looney will continue as manager of the Roxy.

Work will start immediately, Mr. Petty said, on overhauling and remodeling the drive-in theatre, and it will open around March 15 with the showing of all new pictures.

Both the Roxy and Roy theatres will also be remodeled on the inside and painted on the outside. When this work is completed, the new manager plans to have the Roxy open every night. For several months it has been closed on Wednesday and Thursday of each week.

"We plan to bring the people of this area the best in theatre entertainment in the future," Mr. Petty said, "and we invite your continued patronage."

Water Authority Advised Of Plans To Appeal Case

L. B. Patterson, president of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, was advised last Friday of plans to appeal the recent ruling favoring the authority to the Court of Civil Appeals.

The suit, filed in August 1960, by J. E. Walling, Jr., and others, sought to have the water authority declared invalid, contending that levying of taxes by appointive directors of the authority violated the state constitution, that directors should be elective.

Tried before Judge Sterling Williams of Snyder in 39th District Court at Haskell, Williams ruled in favor of the authority. The 1960 verdict was appealed and the case was sent back for trial by the State Supreme Court, which held that plaintiffs should have been heard by the lower court regardless of merit of their case.

Judge Williams heard the case again on November 13, 1961, with attorneys for both sides presenting their pleas and filing written briefs. On Friday, December 15, Judge Williams advised attorneys for both sides that he would rule for the NCTMWA.

Regarding the appeal of the case, Millard Parkhurst of the law firm of McCall, Parkhurst, Crowe, McCall and Horton in Dallas told Mr. Patterson:

"I have a carbon copy of a letter from Mr. King to the District Clerk in Haskell, requesting preparation of the transcript for the appeal of this case to the Court of Civil Appeals. I suppose you have been advised of this step, but I wanted to make sure."

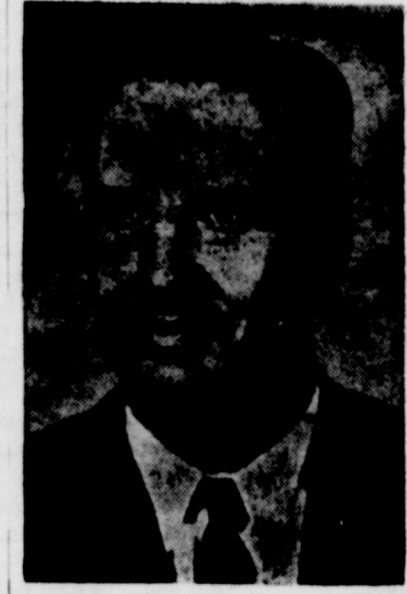
In making his announcement, Mr. Snailum said: "I have lived in the county and in the precinct for 40 years, and am well known to a big majority of the voters in this precinct."

WHAT WILL BE THE ANSWER?

Developing a new drug is a long and costly process. The price tag can run into the millions. One pharmaceutical company, for instance, has invested \$7,500,000 in cancer research since 1939. In 1959 alone it invested \$500,000 for that purpose—while total sales of its five anti-cancer drugs amounted to less than a third as much.

For the prescription drug industry as a whole, research spending reached \$206,000,000 in 1960. No other industry plows back so large a portion of its income into research—about nine cents out of every sales dollar. The result is remedies produced and sold under brandnames—pneumonia, influenza, tuberculosis and diphtheria among them.

It's hard to believe that anyone would deliberately want to stop this kind of progress—progress which produces such rich rewards in freeing people from pain and disease, and extending life. Yet a proposed federal bill would put up a massive road-block in the way of research-oriented manufacturers of brand-name drugs. Among other depressive provisions, the patent law would be changed so that the period during which the inventor of a new drug could hold exclusive rights to the product would be reduced from the present 17 years to three. Thereafter, the inventor would be compelled to license any "qualified" drug manufacturer to make and sell the product.

Who would spend vast sums to develop a new product when he could—without risk—market one whose value was already proved? That is the basic question this proposed bill raises—and the health of innumerable men, women, and children will depend in whole or in part on the answer that is finally given.

FREE MONEY HOAX

An Oregon newspaper recently published a letter from a state senator, in which he touched on the state's tax and revenue problems. He said: "What Oregon needs is a source of revenue which will meet the state's needs while not driving business out of this state in the process. Substantial federal aid to education meets this description. It would supply tax relief to Oregon, while at the same time having uniform effects upon the tax climate of every state."

Here is a scheme which would simply rob Peter to pay Paul. The inference is that federal money comes free, and amounts to a net gain to the taxpayers of the state receiving it. Federal aid to education would have to be paid for by increased taxes levied on the taxpayers of all the states, including those receiving it—plus the bill

for the heavy costs of federal administration. The free money hoax applies to all the proposals for extending a paternalistic, do-everything-for-everybody, welfare state. The federal tax bill is already more than the grocery bill for millions of families, and the more government gives away the higher it goes.

HIGHER TAX—LOWER REVENUE

It has long been feared that soaring gasoline taxes would result in lower gas consumption and a reduced tax return to government. Now the evidence is piling up—and it indicates that this is precisely what is happening.

Pennsylvania provides an outstanding example. The state's gasoline tax rate was recently boosted by a whopping 40 per cent. And gasoline sales during the first nine months of this year were down 41.2 million gallons as compared with the same period of 1960.

There is no real doubt that an excessive tax is the cause. The four neighboring states of New York, Maryland, Delaware and New Jersey, all showed increased gas consumption, and all have tax rates lower than Pennsylvania's. Conversely, the two adjacent states of Ohio and West Virginia, which have the same gas tax rate as Pennsylvania's, also showed gallonage losses.

What it all amounts to is that the individual has some measure of control over any sales or excise tax. In the case of gasoline he can drive less, or he can trade a big car for an economy compact—and great numbers of motorists have been doing just that. It's an example of the principle of diminishing return. Up goes the tax, down goes consumption and revenue, and all concerned lose. One can only hope that legislators, state and federal, will heed this obvious lesson and act accordingly.

THE PERTINENT QUESTION

The First National City Bank of New York recently said: "... When account is taken of all levels of taxation, our statement seems to hold that the United States can lay claim to the highest personal income tax rate in the world.

"... The question is often raised as to whether we can afford to reform our tax structure. A more pertinent question is whether we can afford not to if we want to spur people to get ahead by exerting their energies and ingenuity. The necessity of a thorough revision of our tax system involves not only our domestic economy vitality, but our ability to preserve American leadership in an increasingly competitive world."

CHURCH OF CHRIST

GOREE, TEXAS

"AND THE LORD ADDED"

Turn to the second chapter of Acts and read the incident of that memorable day. Peter was the chief spokesman and in his sermon he showed that Christ was the promised Messiah and that God made him both Lord and Christ. The people who heard the sermon "pricked in their hearts and said unto Peter and the rest of the apostles, men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Then in verse 41 we read "They that gladly received his word were baptized; and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls." Now verse 47: "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."

Please notice the scriptural teaching. When the people heard the gospel and obeyed the same, they had the promise of the forgiveness of their sins. When they did what the Lord told them to do to be saved, the Lord added them to the church. The word of God nowhere indicates in the least that a man is saved by one process (as many teach today) and joins the church by another. The Lord takes care of both.

If men cannot save man, neither can they add him to the Lord's church. When a man obeys the gospel of Christ, he does not need to seek membership in the church of his choice. The Lord saves him and adds him to His church. No man nor group of men can keep a saved man out of the Lord's church. 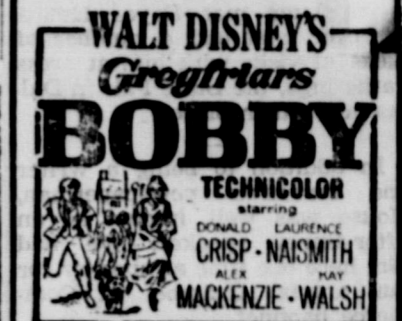

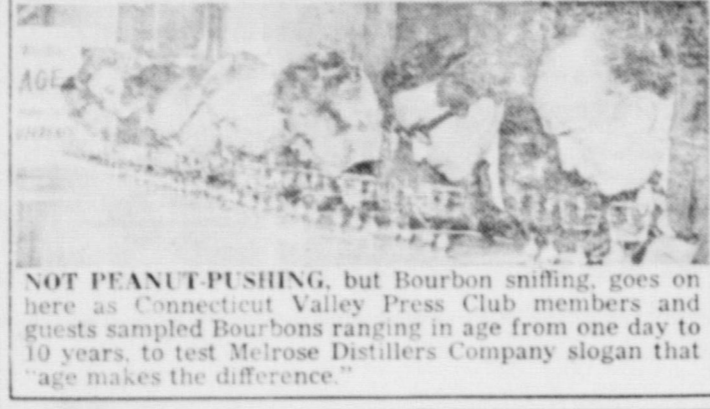

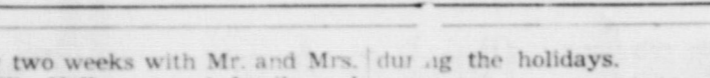

Good Records Help On Income Report

Taxpayers who kept good financial records last year should have no trouble preparing their 1961 federal income tax return, Omas T. Roberts, Administrative Officer, of the Wichita Falls office of Internal Revenue Service, stressed today.

Complete records are especially important, the IRS representative said, to taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions in filing.

Accurate expense records are especially essential if a taxpayer's return is selected for audit.

All records should be retained for as long as they may become material in the administration of any internal revenue law.

Another advantage, he declared, is that taxpayers with good records can complete and mail their federal tax returns as soon as they receive their W2 withholding tax certificates, thus eliminating last-minute searches for such papers as the April 16 filing deadline draws near.

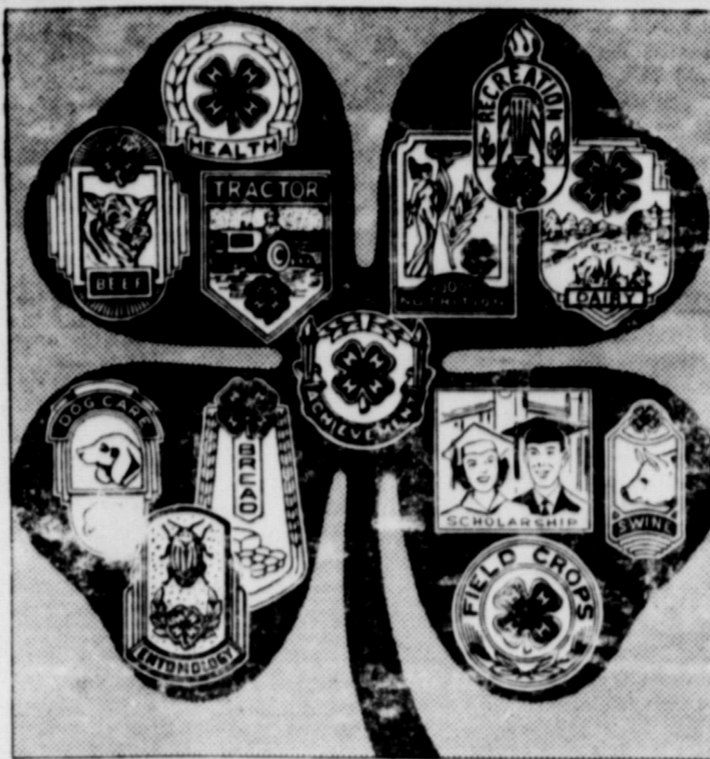

Scholarships Aid Outstanding Youth

mer 4-H'ers. This is a slight increase over last year, the committee reports.

All 4-H award winners are named by the Cooperative Extension Service. Funds for awards come from private business firms and educational foundations, and are administered by the National 4-H Service Committee.

Among the award sponsors are: Ford Motor Co., Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp., E. As the 4-H Club year draws to a close, well over 1,400 top-notch boys and girls look forward to winning the most exciting award of their 4-H career: a sponsored trip to the week-long National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. More than 200 will receive scholarships at this event.

One 4-H Club member in 14 will qualify for a county medal this year, predicts the National 4-H Service Committee, while the ratio for national scholarship winners will be one in approximately 10,000 members.

The coveted medals shown here represent 12 different 4-H award projects. More than 50,000 boys and girls in virtually every county in the U.S. who have done outstanding work in one of these areas will earn a medal, according to the committee.

Altogether, there are nearly 60 national 4-H projects and scholarship programs participated in by 23 million club members. Last year a total of 166,000 medals were won.

Only members over 15 years of age who have been in 4-H at least three years can compete for scholarships and other awards. Younger 4-H'ers are eligible for medals only, one of the first badges of county recognition.

At the national level, around \$115,000 in scholarships will be presented to qualified 4-H youth and young adults who were for-

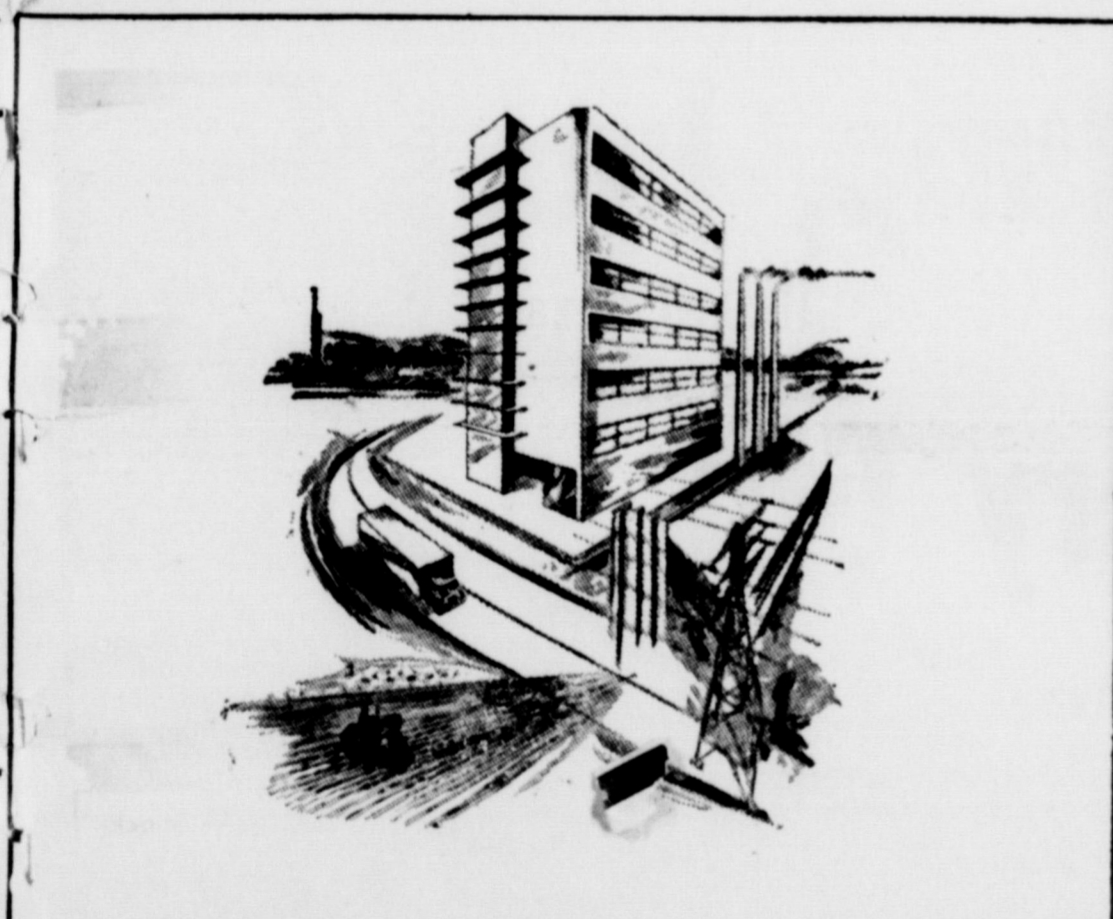

Have you ever searched your memory for the very earliest events which you can recall?

Some of the events in my life are so early that actually I can not recall them; but from having heard them related vividly, I feel that I remember them.

Such as the time that, carrying my pink parasol, I marched down the church aisle, the parasol still raised, to the very first row.

Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Jack Moore, Knox County Agent

Crane Problem

District Judge L. M. Williams of Knox City states that he has tried the "Caw Caw" method of scaring cranes off of the wheat on the Williams ranch west of Benjamin.

Jack Idol, manager of the League Ranch, tried this method last year and states that there was no damage caused by the cranes last year. The cranes annually destroy or reduce the yields on acres of wheat each year in Knox County.

A "Caw Caw" is simply a length of fuse rope and a series of fire crackers. The fuse rope comes in varying sizes depending upon how fast that you want to burn the rope. The most common size is about 3/8 inch and burns at the rate of four feet in six to eight hours. The fuses of the fire crackers are inserted in the rope and when the rope reaches the fuse on the fire cracker, the fire cracker drops to the ground with the resulting explosion.

Charlie Groves, farm foreman, sets up the Caw Caw by using two lengths of concrete reinforcement rod about 4 feet in length in the ground and about 3 feet apart.

Charlie has been using old bailing wire and stretching it between the rods as if to form a small clothes line, then he hangs the fuse rope to the line and arranges it so that it will not touch the ground while it is burning. In some cases, it has been necessary to make several such settings per field, on both the Williams and the League ranches.

Judge Williams states that the cranes can hear the explosion of the fire crackers farther than a human and also it seems to scare them worse if there has been no one around when the fire crackers go off. Jack Idol states that it cost about \$35.00 last year, including labor.

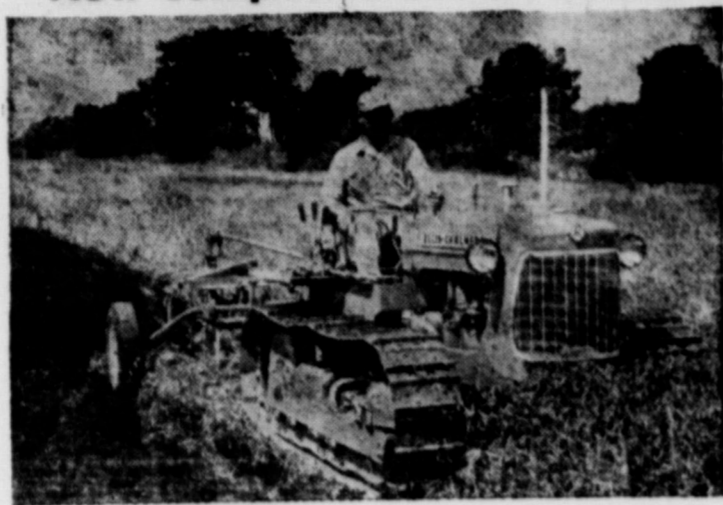
