Cal Stevens has a rather unusual and interesting hobby—that of collecting ball-point pens.

We'd seen his collection before, but when visiting his place on shop business last Friday he lured us into his office for another look-see. The collection has grown considerably.

Cal has received pens from a number of cities in Texas, and from several different states. People come by, are invited to view his collection, then go home and send him some more.

"Sometimes when they say they're going to send me some," Cal said, "I just pass it off as conversation, thinking they'll forget about it when they get home. But, most of the time, some more pens will come in a few weeks."

The hobby is unusual in that not many people are interested in such things as ball-point pens—especially advertising pens which have become common these days. It is interesting in that one viewing Cal's collection marvels at the many varieties displayed.

He has heard of people engaged in this hobby who have collected around 500 pens, but Cal can go them about three times better. He doesn't have an accurate count, but said Friday he had around 1,500.

His desk is placed against the west wall of his office. The collection of pens completely cover this wall from desk to ceiling, then extend along the north wall to the door and along the south wall to the window. Pretty soon he'll have to begin attaching them to the ceiling!

We haven't heard of Cal snatching anyone's pen—but if you have one of value it might be a good idea to keep an eye on him, especially if he wants to borrow one to write with.

Children especially like to look over his collection, Cal says. When parents come to the I. C. X. freight depot after a shipment and bring their children, they jump out and make a bee-line for the office and pen collection.

After seeing his collection, we gathered up a dozen that were littered up the place at home and at the office and took them to Cal. He drooled over them like we would an assortment fishing lures!

Wonder what became of the old original Reynolds pen—you know the one that would "write under water" and which made the manufacturer a reported fortune?

Among the first to sell them in Munday was Baker-McCarthy's. We fell for the advertising and purchased one. Pretty soon it wouldn't write, and we told Pitzer Baker about it. "Bring it back and get another one," he said. "It's no skin off our backs—the company will make them good."

After taking the third one back, we gave up, but we don't know what became of the pen. We imagine Cal would give a good, big chew of tobacco for one!

The Mogul cage team—bi-district champions, if you please—has been bringing the town some valuable publicity. Not only have other teams in the district had to "sit up and take notice" of the Moguls, but their "winning ways" have brought the town and school mention in the daily papers.

A good team and a good band do much to help advertise the town. The Moguls helped in this matter in football, too, finishing second in the district after getting off to a mediocre start. But back at the beginning of the beginning of the basketball season one of the daily papers ran a headline: "Munday is the team to watch."

## Attend Research Meeting In Austin

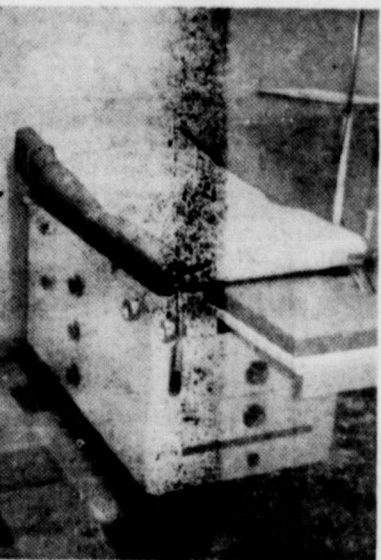
Home Martin, president of the Knox County Farm Bureau, attended the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation on Wednesday, February 14, held in Austin.

This program is financed by the cattlemen at the cost of fifty cents per cow, fifty cents per horse, ten cents per sheep, ten cents per goat and ten cents per hog.

## Eiland Memorial



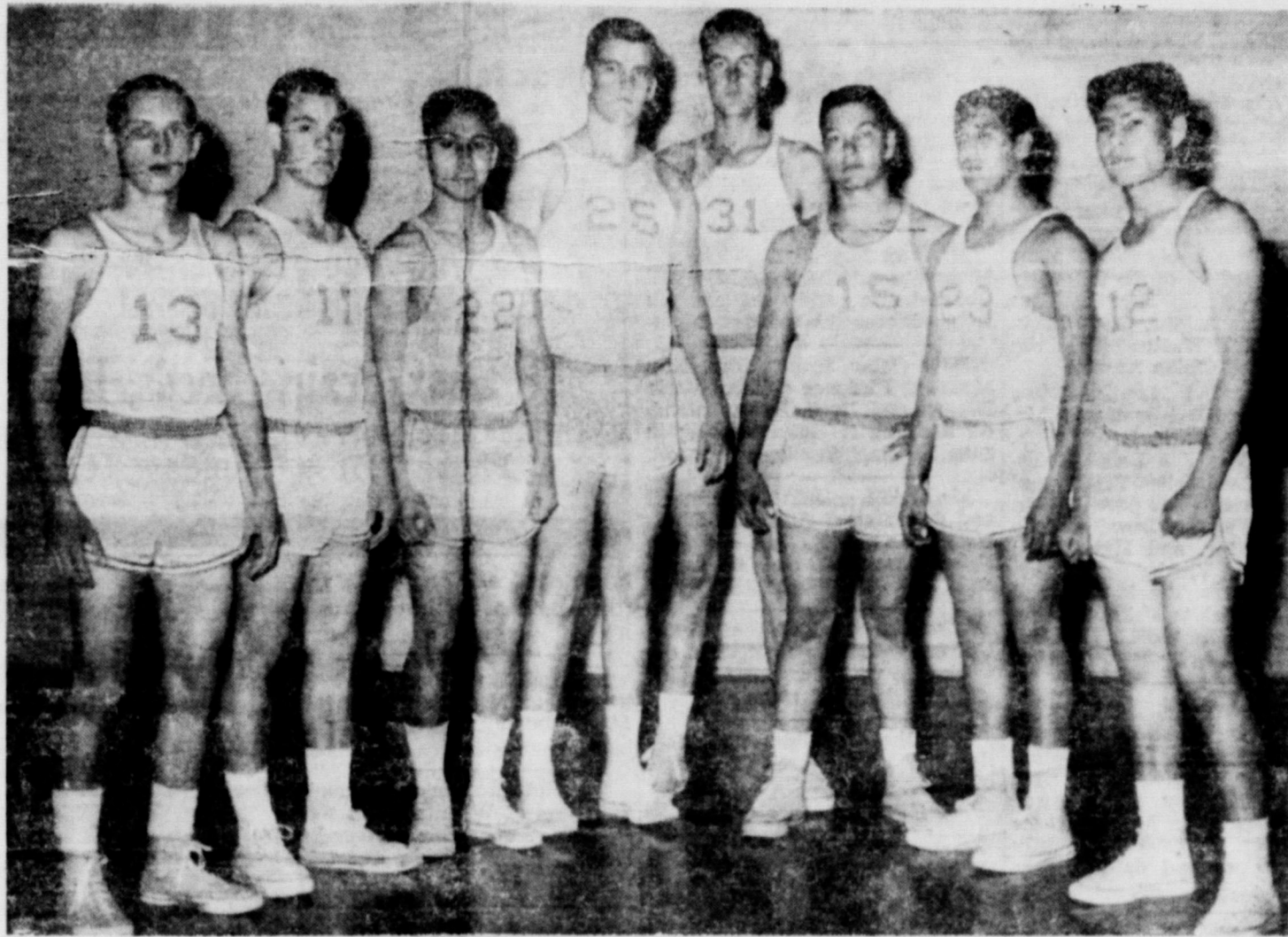

BI-DISTRICT CHAMPS—Munday High School's Moguls raced into the Class A state regional basketball playoffs Tuesday night by defeating Alvarado, 65 to 48, in the bi-

Munday is proudly sending her 1962 Munday Moguls cage team to the Regional III-A playoffs in Denton this week end—the first time in ten years!

Paced by little Pete Alcala, the Moguls won this distinction last Tuesday night by downing the Alvarado Indians 65 to 48 in the bi-district game at Olney.

Alcala, enjoying one of his best nights of the season, hit 11 field goals and nine free throws for 31 points, and was also outstanding on defense.

Alvarado was never in contention after the first quarter, but gave the Moguls a battle until the final gun.

The only times Alvarado threatened was in the first and third period. After the first quarter, the Indians trailed by only four points, but the fast breaking Moguls stretched their lead at halftime to 37-20.

The Indians outpointed the Moguls 8-6 in the third quarter for the first time in the game. Alcala tallied all six points for Munday.

The Moguls continued their hot pace and collected 22 points, while holding the Indians to 20, in the final stanza to walk away with the bi-district victory.

Although Munday's tall Wayne Belcher didn't make as many points as usual, he was one of the main cogs on defense along with Tommy Dickerson.

Belcher opened the slow moving first quarter with a jump shot. Dickerson then dribbled in for a layup, and Alcala added five points to give the Moguls a first period lead.

In the second quarter, Ralph Caram grabbed the jump ball and dribbled through two defenders for a layup. Alcala, finding the range in this period, tallied 13 points and helped the Moguls walk in at halftime with a 37-20 lead.

Bruce Pruitt, out with a knee injury, started for the first time in many weeks. He opened the pace in the fast and furious fourth period with a free throw.

The Indians, trying to force the Moguls into costly mistakes, put on a full court press, but nothing could stop the determined Moguls as they collected 22 points in the last period. The Indians gained 20 in that period for their biggest outbreak of the night.

Moguls Win District  
The Munday Moguls gallantly fought off a rallying Archer City team in the second half last Saturday night on Seymour's court and won the District III-A playoff, 46 to 43, thus becoming basketball champions of the district.

The teams had tied the best two of three series earlier and had to play the third game to decide the winner. The Moguls tied the series in a thrilling 47 to 44 victory last Thursday night on their home court.

Total January sales in Texas were \$15,310,631, which is 9.3% of the 1962 state goal of \$165,100,000.

## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

### Vegetable Demonstrations

There have been two vegetable variety demonstrations planted in the Munday, Texas area. These demonstrations were planted Feb. 12 in a continuing effort of the Munday vegetable producers to make sure that they are producing the best vegetable varieties for this area. A 14 variety head lettuce demonstration was planted on the H. H. Partridge farm and a 150 variety potato test was planted on the Jack Tidwell farms in the Munday area. Later this spring there will be a cantaloupe plastic mulching demonstration and a sweet potato variety demonstration. Last fall there was a field sweet potato variety demonstration planted on the James Smith farm. Because of the progressive efforts of the Munday vegetable producers in variety and fertilizer tests this area is becoming known as the "Vegetable Capitol Of The Knox Prairie."

### Livestock Marketing Handbook

One of the latest "bulletins" published by the Extension Service is a shirt pocket sized Livestock Marketing Handbook, MP 494 that is available in the county agent's offices. This bulletin is a ready reference for livestock producers on dressing costs and shrinkage. The bulletin has a list of do's and don'ts to minimize shrinkage and two tables that will allow a producer to quickly figure on the farm prices offered for stock that is to be sold at a dressed price or a price subject to a shrink. ## Cecil Fox Will Serve Area As Game Warden

C. L. (Cecil) Fox of Spur has been assigned to the Knox County area as game warden, several days ago. Counties in his district are: Crosby, King, Dickens and Knox.

Mr. Fox has lived in Spur since 1923, and has been associated with the game department since 1944. He has made an enviable reputation for himself as an expert on rattlesnakes.

He is president of the Caprock Peace Officers Association, which annually has a rattlesnake hunt. Fox usually cooks rattlesnake steak for the association's annual gathering.

He has made many talks and shown his color slides on rattlesnakes in all parts of the county.

He spoke at the Munday Lions Club meeting Tuesday, at which time he had a live rattlesnake with him, and gave interesting information on the reptiles.

## Year-Old Burglary Is Solved Recently

The burglary of two Munday farms almost a year ago was solved recently, according to J. W. Massey, chief of police, with the apprehension of James Hugh Leggett in Sweetwater for a Big Spring burglary.

Leggett reportedly gave statements of over 100 burglaries in Baylor, Knox, Haskell, Taylor, Wilbarger and a number of other counties.

The local burglaries to which he reportedly admitted were of Key Motor Co. on April 3, 1961, and Charles Hogsett Chevrolet Co. and Wood Ford Sales on July 10, 1961.

Massey said that all burglaries in Munday since 1959, some 40 of them, have been solved.

## Spud Planting Being Completed

Potato growers, as well as growers of other vegetables, have been very busy during the past ten days getting their 1962 crops in the ground.

Onions were planted earlier last week, and potato growers started their planting operations around February 15. Herb Partridge stated Tuesday that all growers expected to have their planting completed by Wednesday of this week.

Partridge stated that the local area's potato crop would be about the same as last year. Growers have planted around 700 acres. This includes the acreage of Munday Vegetable Growers and Colville and Renfro.

Around 30 acres of onions have also been planted, about the same as last year.

According to Mr. Partridge, a few cantaloupes, watermelons and sweet potatoes will also be planted. The exact amount has not yet been determined.

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# CAN MUNDAY AFFORD A CITY HOSPITAL?

Editorial Comment:

## Really THINK, Munday!

(Reprinted from The Knox County Herald, Issue of Thursday, February 15, 1962)

Last week we happened to be in Munday and noticed a placard in a business establishment there reading "Think It Over" and the message went on to say that Munday needed more doctors and a hospital.

We suppose this in answer to the county's desire to enlarge and fix-up the county's hospital in Knox City.

We are not too familiar with Munday's needs in this line, but we are familiar, fairly, with their tax structure.

In other words, Munday, or whoever designed and worded the message, has the mistaken idea that they would be doing something for Knox City and not themselves, if they were in favor of voting for the bond election to build something here.

This is a nearsighted picture.

What the citizens of Munday and the other communities as well as Knox City decides to do about the bond election is a matter in which more should be taken into consideration than a mere grudge or a glance through rose-colored glasses may appear to represent.

To say at this time that we are for or against any bond election is absurd, for all the plans and specifications are not yet complete. We know Munday, nor no one else can, at this time appraise the issue fairly nor accurately.

We do not want to insinuate that Munday does not need all her heart desires in everything she wants or needs, but we do question the feasibility of such undertakings—tax-wise Munday is taxed to the limit.

If they build a hospital, it will

have to be paid for by city funds, as the county already has a hospital. Second, the school situation there is still where it was—old buildings and not too long ago they were on probation for non-compliance with state schools. A bond election was held to rectify that condition, and just barely made it. (Accreditation with state standards).

At the same time the bonds were voted taxes went up to \$1.80 per \$100. Third, they are still in the middle of the dam project.

We haven't planned on Munday being in favor of spending any money on anything, let alone a quarter million dollar hospital. Anything less would be even more foolish.

The addition and renovation to the county hospital would not raise taxes—that is what the bonding company and commissioners say. The county as well as the hospital is well off for the proposed building project.

The hospital is here and it is being used and it is in dire need of repairs. That is an undisputed fact.

To let a half-million dollars go down the drain is absurd, anyway you want to weigh it.

We don't believe Munday will be able to stand another bond election—all we can do is wait and see how the bonding company sees it. Even so, it looks highly impracticable.

Architects estimate an expenditure of \$25,000 to set up an operating room, less equipment and outside walls. An X-ray machine costs approximately \$10,000. Instruments run from a minimum of \$2,500 to \$5,000. As

can be seen, an operating room and diagnostic equipment run high—\$37,500. Naturally a hospital has to have room—at least 20 to be feasible. Any less is not only impracticable, but highly improbable for practical reasons—also four graduate nurses are needed and to cap that off hospitals cost, usually \$20. per sq. yard to construct.

Last Tuesday the Munday Lions Club voted to give their full support to the proposed Munday hospital project.

Knox City's Lions have always given full support to all our civic projects and it is a most commendable gesture, but—Did you think it over?

It has also been planned that the city build the hospital and lease it to some doctors—Another fallacy that does not work. It HAS been tried, but it hasn't been carried out successfully.

Munday is in Knox County, as well as Knox City—and we are trying to have their best interests at heart along with our own. We do not believe that Munday is thinking the issue out.

Whether they do build their own or not is impracticable—it hurts no one but them—if it fails to do as they think it will.

Right now the proposal the commissioners have made seem logical and appropriate, but we, like you, don't know all the particulars—when all the facts are compiled, we like you, (we hope) will make up our minds as to what is the best for the county and vote accordingly.

As for Munday all we can say is to really THINK, THINK, and STUDY all the possibilities before going over into the brink.

## That People of Munday May Know!

The editorial from the Knox County Herald appearing on the opposite side might have come as a surprise to a number of Munday people. The proposition of a City Hospital had not been presented publicly because those investigating the possibilities had arrived at no concrete plan—therefore, had no cause of action to present the people.

To say the move is in opposition to the proposed bond issue for improving the Knox County Hospital is a fallacy. At no time have those advancing the City Hospital idea ever expressed such opposition, nor did the placard. The exact wording of this placard is reprinted below:

### "A CONVERSATION TOPIC"

Munday needs its own Hospital... For the better health of its citizens and the citizens of this area.

To insure MUNDAY having an adequate number of doctors in the future.

To unite our people in a progressive step forward, leading to better schools, adequate water supply... and a better, stronger town.

**THINK ABOUT IT!**  
This will require 100% cooperation from each citizen.

The Knox County Hospital belongs to the people of Munday, just as it does to those of any other community in the county. We have it. We need it. And, we believe, when a feasible and progressive plan for improving the Knox County Hospital is presented, Munday people, will approve.

Not many years ago, Munday's people APPROVED the bond issue for improving the county courthouse, but this was rejected in the county-wide vote. Munday's people, in the main, are progressive. They are for Munday—and they are FOR Knox County.

Regarding the City of Munday being "taxed to the limit" Mayor V. E. Moore has this to say:

"We have a tax rate of \$1.25 per \$100 valuation. This is lower than most cities in our area.

"We are now planning an extensive paving project, and our bond representative has approved our ability to pay.

"The NCTMWA is a taxing authority in itself and has no bearing on Munday's bonded indebtedness."

As a matter of public record, the tax rate for the Munday Public School District has never been over \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. Last year it was \$1.45. Records show that the school is in better financial condition now than in three or four decades.

Our school was placed on probation in 1959. Last year, the State Accreditation Committee notified school officials that all requirements had been met, and the committee reported that recommendations had been made to the State Department of Education that our schools are fully accredited. This probation did not result in a bond election. The last bond election was in 1956 and was for building a new band hall and for other improvements.

The move for a City Hospital is yet in the embryo stage. When developments merit the proposition being presented to the people of Munday, this will be done—and adequately.

Citizens of Munday have visited several towns in this area, talked with doctors and hospital authorities, and investigated the possibilities of a City Hospital from many different angles. We do not have our eyes closed as to the cost of building, cost of operations, etc.

This has not been a jumped-up proposition, but has been talked in Munday for several years. This IS the first concerted action to be taken. We do not have all the answers yet—but when we arrive at a feasible plan, the facts will be presented fully and completely to the people.

### Child Exemption On Income Tax Return Explained

Even though your child earned \$600 or more last year, you as a parent, may be able to claim him as a dependent on that 1961 federal income tax return.

This good news came today from Ormas T. Roberts, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Wichita Falls.

"If you have supplied more than half of his support, you may claim an exemption for him regardless of the amount he earned, providing he hadn't reached his 19th birthday by January 1, 1962.

"When the child is 19 or over, you still may claim an exemption for him if he was a full-time student during some part of each of five calendar months in 1961, and if you furnish his chief support. A full-time student is one who is enrolled for the number of hours which is considered to be full-time attendance."

cattle on dressed weight is gaining in popularity and by the use of this handbook the decision that a producer has to make in which method to choose can be made easier.

**Swine Program**  
David Harrison reports that the sow he has in the Knox County swine program has farrowed her first litter of 6 gilts and 5 boar pigs Feb. 17th. David is a member of the Goriee 4-H Club and his sow is the first to farrow this year.

The swine program places in the hands of 8 Knox County 4-H members a registered Duroc gilt and one boar to another 4-H member. Both boys and girls are eligible to participate in the program. The pigs are awarded on the basis of an essay contest and the facilities that a member has for caring for a pig. Contestants for the pigs must write an essay entitled "The Value of Producing Pork on My Farm as a Source of Cash Income," and sign an agreement blank that states:

- Should they win a gilt pig, they agree to feed and care for this pig under the direction of the county agent. They also agree to carry out the following:
  1. Exhibit their gilt at the county show and, if eligible, at the store area show.
  2. Have the gilt bred at the proper time to farrow a spring litter.
  3. Raise a litter and compete in the store area spring heavy litter contest.
  4. Return the choice gilt pig or \$15.00 to the program. The county agent will make the choice between returning the choice gilt or the \$15.00.
  5. Provide a certificate of registration on the gilt pig returned to the program.
  6. Keep accurate records on his swine demonstration.

Should a member win a boar, they agree to furnish free service to the other Sears-Roebuck Foundation gilts in the county for the first litters, and agree to keep accurate books of breeding records. Should they win a boar, the member agrees to show the boar at the store area show. Applications and essays are now being accepted in the county agent's office in Knox County for swine program for the 1962-63 year.

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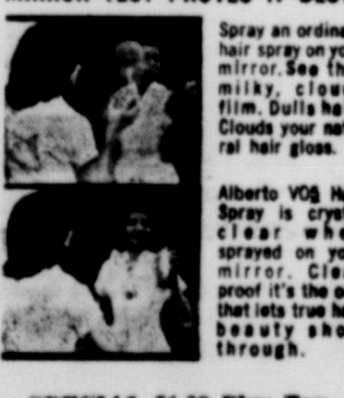
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
