This was the theme carried out in this year's annual banquet. The programs, printed in our shop, carried out this theme—but we had nothing to do with the huge heart.

This was the work of Barton Carl; who, according to his statement, put in about two days in shaping the heart, cutting it out of the biggest cardboard he could find, and forming the letters.

Barton is one of the C-C directors. Other officers and directors—and these include Mrs. Don Combs, secretary—also put in a lot of work in preparing for the banquet; which, in our opinion, was one of the best in recent years. We think, too, it drew the largest crowd in some time.

We'd heard Fred Husbands speak on several occasions, mostly at the annual breakfast which W. T. C. C. gives for members of the West Texas Press Association. We didn't go to the banquet expecting a batch of jokes that brought side-splitting laughter. We knew Fred Husbands wasn't that type of after-dinner speaker.

But he left some thoughts that people of Munday could use to advantage for months and years to come. Closer work with the Chamber of Commerce in bringing people into the smaller towns to trade was one of them. His statement that "the same ribbons of highways that bring people into your town to trade can also take them elsewhere" is one which we've expounded for some time.

"I've been in business here for many years. People know I'm here." We've also heard that statement. We believe, though, that the time is passed when people trade at a certain place just because it's been there for years. People usually go where they're invited!

We think Munday's merchants have been doing a pretty fair job of inviting people to Munday to trade. If not through the columns of this newspaper, then by their monthly "Bargain Day" promotions.

Let's keep inviting people to Munday. Most of the things—not all of them, of course—that can be bought in the cities can also be bought in Munday. And our town won't grow when our people go elsewhere to trade!

We extend our congratulations to those of our town who received awards and recognition at the banquet: V. E. Moore for the "top citizen" award; W. E. Braly for 25 years of service as Munday's W. T. C. C. director, and J. Weldon Smith for his untiring volunteer work in making last year's United Fund drive such a success.

People like these are good for the community, but as Mayor Moore said in accepting his award: The work and accomplishments are not done by one person alone, but with a group of dedicated people working together. That's something we all can do—work together and cooperatively for the betterment of our town and community.

Local C-C officials received a letter from George Moffett after the banquet, in which he said, in part: "... I thought last night's meeting was one of the best Chamber of Commerce meetings I ever attended. The speaker gave about as good an analysis of the proper scope of Chamber of Commerce activities as I have ever heard. You had a good program, and those present listened with interest. Last, but not least, your program was not too long drawn out."

## Cotton Classing Service Available

Growers who wish to have their cotton classed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture under provisions of the Smith-Doxye Act should apply for these services as soon as their cotton is planted, says Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist.

The Smith-Doxye Act provides for one free classification for each eligible bale of cotton. Samples must be submitted by a bonded sampler or by a public warehouse which issues negotiable receipts, explains Elliott.

Each cotton improvement group, except those in southern Texas, must file an application with the cotton classing office serving its territory not later than August 1. Those in counties south of a line from Dimmit to Karnes to Matagorda must file an application by June 1.

Prompt application filing is necessary because time is needed for each group to arrange for submitting samples by an approved sampling agent to the proper classing office, says Elliott. At least 15 days are required to process applications and deliver sampling supplies.

Application forms for these services may be obtained from county agents, cotton classing offices of the Cotton Division of the AMS, or from the area office in Dallas.

## Bond Sales Are High In February

Savings Bond sales in Knox County totaled \$26,768 during the month of February, according to W. E. Braly Chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee. "Total sales in the county for the first two months of 1962 were \$48,550." This is 23.3 per cent of the year's quota.

"In Texas, bond sales were \$13,560,394 in February, and sales for the first two months of the year were \$28,871,026. This figure represents 17.5% of the state's sales goal for 1962."

At a recent meeting in Washington, Secretary of Treasury, Douglas Dillon, pointed out "... Our ability to meet aggression in the world ... will depend to a large extent upon the power of our economy. Buying bonds is a way in which every American can contribute directly to his nation's economic strength. For those who ask what they can do to help their country, here is a beginning step—an important step ... The person who buys a bond is both thrifty and patriotic."

These words spoken by the Secretary of Treasury re-emphasize the need for the purchase of Savings Bonds by all Americans," Mr. Braly pointed out.

## Local Farmer Gets Rural Heroism Award In Saving Son From Icy Pond

DALLAS — A Knox County farmer who pulled his 7-year-old son from an ice-covered farm pond and saved his life with artificial respiration Monday received the Texas Rural Heroism Award.

Alonzo (Al) Cartwright, who farms five miles from Munday in northwest Texas, was presented the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council plaque in ceremonies at the annual meeting of the Texas Safety Association. Bud

Fichte, assistant editor of The Progressive Farmer and chairman of the Council awards committee, made the presentation.

Calvin Pigg, farm director for WBAP, Fort Worth, and president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, said there were 12 nominations from over the state for the third annual Rural Heroism Award.

Cartwright received the award for the bravery he exhibited Jan. 27, 1961, in saving the life of his son, Pat. The elder Cartwright was mending fences when he heard screams from his son who had fallen through thin ice in a nearby stock tank. The boy tried to swim to shore, but was prevented from doing so by the ice which had formed in the sub-freezing temperatures.

Rushing to the boy's aid, Al Cartwright saw his son couldn't make it to shore, so he plunged into the icy, 20-foot deep water in an effort to rescue him. Prevented by heavy clothing from reaching his son, Cartwright returned to shore and shed his boots and heavy coveralls, then leaped into the icy water once more to pull the now-unconscious lad to safety.

The father applied mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration until his son showed signs of life. Then, he drove the boy to Munday and a doctor.

Dr. D. C. Eiland, who credited the father's quick actions with saving the boy's life, worked for about four hours on young Pat before the youngster regained consciousness. Pat was then (Continued on Last Page)

### JAIL—FOR FARMERS???

The federal government can't run the nation's farms, and its ineptitude has been brilliantly demonstrated by the failure of one farm program after another for the past 30 years. The taxpayers now have a \$2.7 billion investment, not counting storage and handling charges, in 1.4 billion bushels of wheat and feed grains—almost a three-year domestic supply.

It has been estimated that the administration's new farm program could cut wheat surpluses 225 million bushels a year. If accepted by Congress and the farmers, the new plan will enforce rigid production controls and marketing quotas on both wheat and feed grains.

The Secretary of Agriculture has said that a provision providing jail sentences for farmers who fail to keep proper records will strengthen the program. This highlights an interesting point about benefits from government that all groups seeking or accepting federal largess should take to heart. Federal control follows federal money. One thing is sure. If you accept political favors, you had better control enough votes to put the fear of the polls into the politicians granting them. Otherwise the road may become rocky, indeed. And now, jail is suggested as an indoctrination method—in the U. S. A!

There can't be free farmers when government controls eliminate the free market system—agriculture will wind up as some form of communal project, under the thumb of a political boss.

### BIG LIE

A great many people believe—as public opinion polls prove—that the owners of industry get the lion's share of earnings, and that the workers get the short end of the stick. They've been told that, time and time again, by enemies of our free enterprise system.

This is comparable to the "big lie" that was so effectively used by Adolph Hitler.

Allen W. Rucker, a national authority on industrial costs tells a different story. It goes like this:

In a recent year, for every production man-hour worked in this country the produced value was \$3.87.

Outside costs, such as depreciation and taxes, came to \$1.92. So there was \$3.95 per hour of work left to divide.

Of that \$3.95, wages and related benefits accounted for \$2.27. Salaries and related benefits accounted for \$1.15. So the earnings for owners,

which was the profit, came to 53 cents.

Putting it another way the toll users got 86.6 per cent of the divisible income—while the tool owners and providers got 13.4 per cent.

Does that look like exploitation of labor?

### CHANGE THE TUNE

How often do you hear our public officials and college professors, who are molders of opinion, forthrightly champion the private enterprise philosophy that made these United States a better place in which to live?

Too many of them promote schemes that glorify big government, and make the individual and industry more and more subservient to insatiable bureaucracy. Thus, they sow the seeds of socialism, and break down confidence in our free enterprise system.

Let's stop short-selling our capitalistic economy if we hope to retain individual opportunity and academic freedom, otherwise both will disappear in a socialized cesspool. Shout our virtues to a world weary of having gargantuan government on its back.

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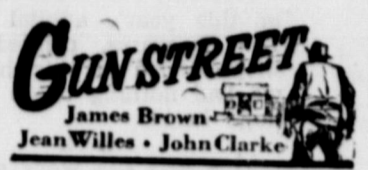

### Fires Dangerous To Land, Wildlife

Destructive grass fires now are being reported over portions of Texas, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

One of these fires destroyed approximately 2,000 acres of grass on the Gene Howe Wildlife Management Area, in the Panhandle area of Texas, on March 3. The fire got its start off the area when an overheated exhaust pipe of a pickup truck ignited some of the dry grass on a neighboring ranch. The fire spread, destroying not only the 2,000 acres of grass but also 15 miles of fence, which included 83.10 miles of boundary fence.

"Aside from the heavy economic loss in grass fires, the loss of wildlife is very heavy, particularly at this time of the year," said Dodgen. "Many landowners now are building fire roads along fences bordering on highways. Grass fires frequently are started by persons who toss cigarettes from cars onto the grass along the right-of-way. Other fires are caused by careless campers, who may toss aside a cigarette or match. The grass is dry and the wind is high. As a result, we come up with scorched earth which is profitable to no one."

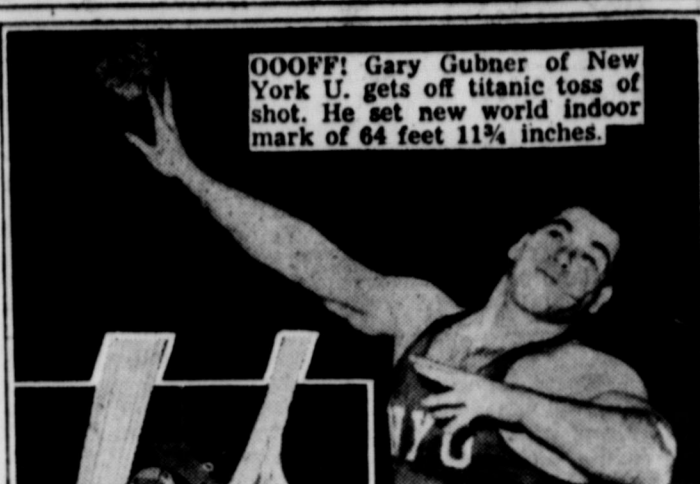

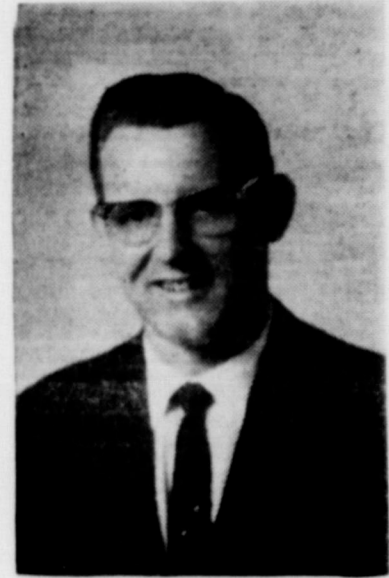

## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Jack Moore, Knox County Agent

### Knox County Feed Grain Program

March 31st is the last day for farmers that plan to participate in the feed grain program to sign their intention to participate forms. Farmers that intend to sign the intention are urged to do so as soon as possible and avoid the last minute rush while the farmers that have not decided whether to comply should decide prior to March 31st.

The personnel in the County ASCS office can give details of the program if there are any questions and the county agent's office has forms available to help the farmer decide from a profit basis whether to comply or not to comply. Each farm is different and each farmer should make his own decisions. In a check of the Knox County ASCS office Monday, it revealed that there were 720 feed grain farms in the county with a total feed grain base of 49,705 acres. There has been 129 farms indicated that will have 4,288 diverted acres. These farms account for 10,984 acres of the county's feed grain base and although the farms that have indicated participation will divert 39% of their base this represents only 8.6% of the county base.

### Vegetable Demonstrations

Friday, March 30, Herbert Partridge will plant a plastic mulching demonstration on his farm mulching cantaloupes and watermelons. There are several advantages to the use of plastic some of which are: weed control, water conservation and speeding up maturity. The Knox County vegetable producers are interested in seeing if they can get melons and cantaloupe on the market at a more advantageous time for them.

By the use of the plastic, it is hoped that vegetables grown through the plastic will be available for shipment to the market at the same time that the Monday potatoes will be available for shipment to the markets. Anyone interested in seeing the plastic laying machine that was developed at A&M College is welcome to visit the demonstration and view this machine in operation.

James Smith will plant a tomato variety test this Spring. There was a 13 variety sweet potato variety test bedded out March 21st. Information on these demonstrations will be available as it is determined and the public is invited to watch the demonstration plots as they grow.

### Fact

In 1920, Texas harvested 4,345,000 bales of cotton off of 12,323 acres while in 1959, Texas harvested 4,416,000 bales of cotton off of 6,325 acres. Average lint yield in 1920 was 169 pounds per acre and 334 pounds of lint in 1959.
