The family moved to Anneta, where they lived five years, and then to Poolville, in Parker County, and Joe Tidwell again attended Post Oak school, in the school house which had been

built since his first year. In January, 1895, at the age of 22, Mr. Tidwell married his childhood sweetheart, Miss Rosa Webb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Webb, in a home ceremony. The Tidwells had eight children, six of whom are still living.

In 1912, tragedy struck when two of their children died within one day of each other and were buried on the same day in Friendship Cemetery in Knox

The Tidwell family came to Knox County in 1907, traveling in a covered wagon to settle on a farm seven miles northeast of Munday, where they lived until Mr. Tidwell retired in 1956, The pioneer couple made 52 crops on their farm; and, when interviewed, Mr. Tidwell said his most thrilling experience was the purchase of his first two-row cultivator and planter, but reminesced that he kept one horse and a Georgia stock plow for garden-

I have received word that there have been rumors spread that Precinct No. 2 was from \$20,00 to \$55,000 in the red.

This rumor and statement is untrue. The County Treasurer's Report which was published in both Knox County newspapers recently, gave the true condition of the various precincts and the county's financial report. As a whole, the county is in better shape than it has been for some time. As for Precinct 2, we are better off now than ever, all things being considered, with 1936 tax evaluations and rising costs in everything.

As of May 14, 1962, Precinct 2 had \$986.19 in the Lateral Road Fund and \$7,650.18 in the Precinct 2 Fund.

As for outstanding warrants, your precinct owes on only two pieces of equipment — a road grader, purchased new last year, and a loader. Payments are due on the motor grader twice a year, on May 15 and Dec. 15. A check for \$1,800 was mailed last Saturday for the motor grader and the next payment of \$1,500 will be due Dec. 15. The loader will be paid off on 5-15-65, with two payments each year

Naturally our finances are small for we aren't prorated as much money as precincts one and four, but actually, our finances and equipment are well above

Many religious leaders of our day may offer their creeds, discipline, or church manuals as a basis for unity. Each, no doubt, would have its merits; however, each would have one common flaw it has been written by man. Therefore we plead for men to turn from all such "guide books" and let the Bible, the word of God be our basis for unity. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness; that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good work." (2 Tim. 3:16-17).
