## Chemical Plant At Knox City Holds Opening

Around 700 persons attended the opening of the Wood Chemical Plant at Knox City last Saturday, and enjoyed a catfish supper which was served from 5 to 7 p.m.

W. R. Wood, president of the firm whose headquarters are in Lubbock, announced that the plant is now ready for shipping fertilizers and insecticides anywhere.

Two buildings 96 x 50 feet have been built one mile south of Knox City, each will contain 7 bins that will hold as much as 150 tons of fertilizer. The company blends their products to suit the soil of the land where it is to be used.

A. A. Cox of O'Brien is the manager and at present there are six employees. At the peak of production a total of 15 or more will be needed, Wood said. Everything in the plant is the most modern type of machinery. It is located near the Santa Fe Railway and a spur branch has been built to accommodate the plant.

## Rural Carriers To Distribute Cards On Livestock Survey

Acting Postmaster Geraldine C. Koenig reminds rural patrons of the Goree Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Miss Koenig explains. "It's important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Miss Koenig concludes.

### Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

County Agent Jack Moore reports that because of extremely favorable weather conditions for screw-worm activity, screw-worms have spread into Central and West Texas, most of the counties in the Edwards Plateau and about half the counties in the Trans-Pecos area.

Moore says that plans are being made to expand the sterile screw-worm fly release area to include most of the infested area. The majority of the sterile flies being produced will be released in a barrier zone which will encompass the northern edge of the screw-worm infested area.

Mr. Moore encourages all livestock producers to inspect all livestock regularly, to treat all wounds promptly, and to collect ten or more worms from deep in the wound and bring them to his office. He points out that the more screw-worms that are killed by chemical treatment, the fewer sterile flies will be required to overwhelm the native flies.

**From A Pastor's Study**

Christianity, which should be the unifying factor or force in our community and society above all other forces, has become, in some communities, the source of division. This is due largely to the fact that many ministers still preach a narrow denominationalism . . . and even a negative message that produces sullen and belligerent "Christians."

Worst of all, many of these Christians feel that they have the magic key to eternity (which is a type of protracted self-righteousness; our modern Pharisaism). These self-righteous ones condemn other people to Hell because they are not "one of them"; thus they seem to claim to hold the key to Heaven and Hell — at the same time.

Of course, we all recognize that such an attitude is not a good witness to Christ, but is rather "playing Christ," . . . trying to assume the role of God (called by psychologists a "Messiah complex"), and standing in judgement upon fellow human beings and Christians.

Many persons call me "Brother Finch" as I make my way about the Country-side, and this warms my heart. The term should mean that we are bro-

thers in Christ . . . bound together by the common bond of love in Christ, standing in unity before the world, making the same witness. Those factors which divide us are our common sins, and we also stand unified in our guilt.

The fact is that, no matter what we call our churches, we all stand before God as unworthy sinners, saved only by His grace. As we seek to be The Church in our little churches, we should recognize that it is more nearly correct to say that none of us have all the truth, but that in our imperfect, condition we press on toward the upward call of God in Christ, giving thanks for the light and understanding that we do have, but praying constantly for more light as we live to the best of our abilities with what light we have.

Christians are constrained to make a profession of Christ by what we are as well as by what we say.

I am not convinced of one's valid witness if he is sullen and close-mouthed. Christians, of all people should be able to communicate — and have communion one with the other—in the name of the Christ whom they corporately profess, not exclusively possess.

## Seventy Relatives and Friends Help W. J. Tidwell Celebrate 90th Birthday

Seventy relatives and friends, forty of whom came to dinner, gathered here to honor a nonagenarian, W. J. Tidwell, who celebrated his 90th birthday recently. Two old friends, almost 90, came from Parker County

to be with him. His nephews and friends originated the idea of having the birthday dinner and brought in most of the food. They are: Mr. and Mrs. Roy Butler of Bomarton, Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Butler

of Goree and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Butler of Anton. Mark Simpson and "Aunt Mollie" Webb, Mr. Tidwell's sister-in-law, spent the afternoon recalling incidents of their early childhood.

Mr. Tidwell was born in Henderson County in 1872, the son of William and Martha Tidwell. When the Tidwell family moved to Jack County, Joe Tidwell attended his first school at Post Oak at the age of eleven, walking three and one-half miles to school. The school was unique by today's standards, in that it was held under a brush arbor and the term was for three months of the summer. It was at Post Oak School that Mr. Tidwell met the girl he married.

The family moved to Annetta, where they lived five years, and then to Poolville, in Parker County, and Joe Tidwell again attended Post Oak school, in the school house which had been built since his first year.

In January, 1895, at the age of 22, Mr. Tidwell married his childhood sweetheart, Miss Rosa Webb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Webb, in a home ceremony. The Tidwells had eight children, six of whom are still living. In 1912, tragedy struck when two of their children died within one day of each other and were buried on the same day in Friendship Cemetery in Knox County.

The Tidwell family came to Knox County in 1907, traveling in a covered wagon to settle on a farm seven miles northeast of Munday, where they lived until Mr. Tidwell retired in 1956. The pioneer couple made 52 crops on their farm; and, when interviewed, Mr. Tidwell said his most thrilling experience was the purchase of his first two-row cultivator and planter, but reminisced that he kept one horse and a Georgia stock plow for gardening.

The couple celebrated 64 wedding anniversaries. Mrs. Tidwell died in September, 1959.

The loader will be paid off on 5-15-65, with two payments each year.

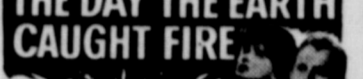

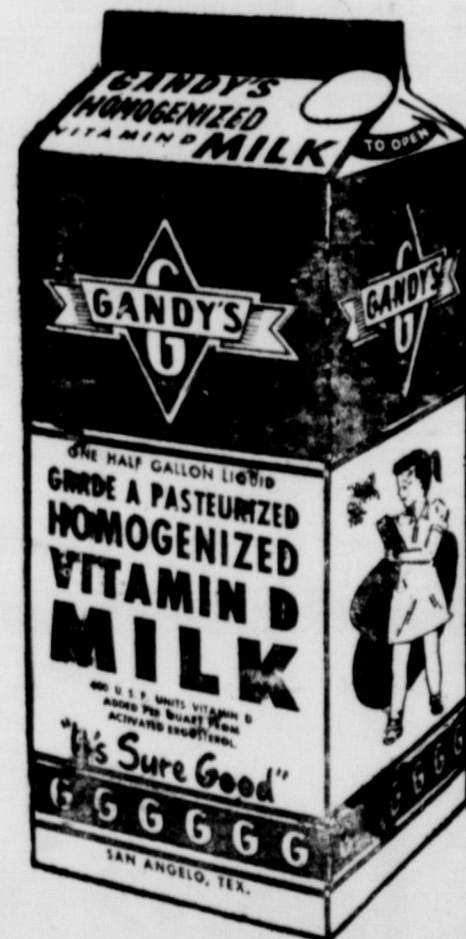

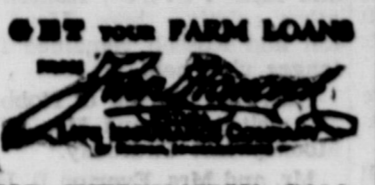

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek reviews the withholding tax situation this week.

Dear editor: Gradually, over the years, Washington has gotten around to figuring out the surest way to collect income taxes, namely, every time a pay check is written. Just withhold it. This way the tax payer doesn't have to wait till the end of the year to pay it or the government to spend it. I wouldn't say everybody is happy under this arrangement but it seems to work. That is, it holds the national debt to 300 billion instead of 600 billion.

At any rate, I was interested in reading about a new group the government wants to put under withholding taxes—the people who get dividends and interest payments. According to Washington, around 800 million dollars a year in taxes could be collected if this income was subject to withholding. I don't know enough about

Washington to know whether this new law will go through, but I was just thinking, if it does, that'll just about wind up the possibilities for any further withholding taxes, with one exception.

That's farming. And what I'm wondering is, just how will Washington go about setting up a withholding tax on farmers? I've never known a taxing agency to get stumped before, but this may be the time.

they can find, plus \$15 worth of corn, and sell them for \$175, or a gross profit of \$10, not counting my labor, depreciation on my fences, expense of hauling them to market, etc. How much withholding tax should I pay? Or say I don't take them to market at all, just sell them to a neighbor? The trouble is most of my neighbors just ain't equipped to handle withholding taxes. They don't have any government forms around the house.

It won't work. As I see it, farmers will remain the only group of people in the United States the government will have to trust to pay their income taxes on their own on a twelve-month basis.

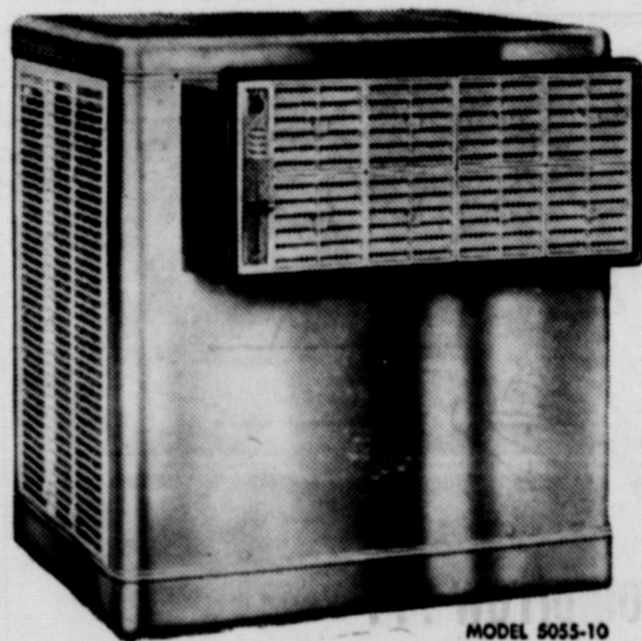

**Social Security Benefits In Knox \$42,940 Monthly**

Old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits are becoming increasingly important as a community resource according to Erton F. Tate, District Manager of the Wichita Falls office of the Social Security Administration.

\$42,940 is paid monthly in social security benefits in Knox County. This is an increase of about 24 per cent over last year's figures. While the benefits are intended primarily for the beneficiaries' economic security, they help business in the community generally. Most of the money is spent immediately for food, clothing, and other necessities.

At the present time, social security benefits are being paid at a rate of over one billion dollars a month. "There are several rea-

sons for the increase," said Tate. "There are more aged people; benefits are now payable at age 62; and less social security credit is needed to meet the eligibility requirements for benefits."

The average old-age benefit nationally for December, 1961, was \$74.04, for a retired worker. In the State of Texas, the average benefit was \$68.23.

The figures below show the number and amount of each type of benefit being paid in Knox County, as of 1-1-62, the date of the latest available tabulation:

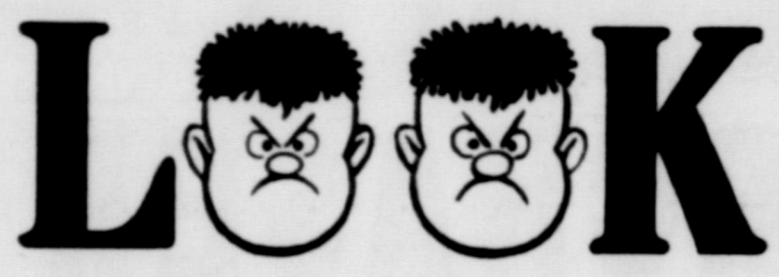
