In our opinion, Sam Rayburn—or Mr. Sam and Mr. Democrat to most of the nation—belongs among the Texas immortals.

His services to the state and to the nation are without equal, and his death was an irreparable loss to the world.

So we think it is fitting that his memory be perpetuated with the issuance of a memorial postage stamp, which is being done, according to a news story we read last Sunday.

Graudated tones of brown and blue will give a three dimensional effect to the 4-cent stamp to be issued September 16 at Bonham, Rayburn's home town, in memory of Mr. Sam. The issue date will be the 22nd anniversary of his election as speaker of the House of Representatives.

The design shows Rayburn full face, with the Capitol dome as background. The portrait is based on a photograph appearing in House Document 247 of the 87th Congress, entitled "The Leadership of Speaker Sam Rayburn."

The initial printing order is for 120,000,000 stamps.

Collectors who want first day cancellations, the article went on, may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance for cost of stamps desired to the Postmaster at Bonham. Each envelope must be marked in pencil in the upper right corner to indicate the number of stamps to be affixed. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be marked "First Day Covers Rayburn Stamp."

The Bonham Chamber of Commerce, with the Sam Rayburn Foundation, will sell first day covers for 25 cents each. Profits will be used to equip the city's new armory. The cover will carry information on the foundation and the Rayburn Library.

So Mr. Sam's face will again appear before the entire nation—and the memory of this great man will ever be before us.

Negro Charged In Burglary Here

Edward Jackson, 25-year-old DeCATUR Negro, has been charged with burglary in justice of the peace court in connection with a Thursday night burglary in Munday. The youth broke into the offices of the North Central Texas Water Authority and the Paul Pendleton Insurance Agency.

The burglary, which occurred around 10:15 p.m. Thursday, was first reported by Bill Tidwell, who heard the breaking glass. Entry into the offices was made through a rest room window. The safe in the Water Authority office, which was not locked, was gone into and a box containing some \$20 in cash, checks and bond coupons was taken and was later found in the alley.

Deputy Sheriff T. H. Clark arrested Jackson in the alley as he ran from the scene. Local and county officers searched throughout the night in an effort to discover if others were involved.

Jackson, who reportedly had served two prison terms on similar offenses, was transferred from Munday to the county jail at Bonham on Friday, and T. W. Bullington, county attorney, filed burglary charges against him Friday at Bonham.

Of a Syrian army officer it is written, "Now Naaman, Captail of the host of the king of Syria, was a great man with his master, and honorable, because by him the Lord had given deliverance unto Syria: He was also a mighty man of valor, but he was a leper" (2 Kg. 5:11). This great military man had what was regarded at that time an incurable disease.

Naaman had about every thing that one could want to make him satisfied with life. He stood at the top in the estimation of his king, like many other men, he was great with man, but not with the Lord. He was honorable and a mighty man, but he was a leper. All of his advantages in life were set at naught by one physical defect.

To a rich young man, who inquired about eternal life, Jesus said, "One thing thou lackest, go thy way, sell whatsoever thou hast, and give it to the poor, and thou shalt have treasures in heaven, and come, take up thy cross, and follow me" (Mk. 10:21). This man had asked the Lord what he must do to have eternal life. When Jesus told him to keep the commandments (the law of Moses), he said he had kept all of these things from his youth up. He had a covetous heart and was very rich, and went away sorrowful.

This prompts us to ask if this young man really wanted eternal life. He was like many people at this present time, he wanted eternal life if he could obtain it on his own terms. And remember this, "For whosoever shall keep the whole law and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all" (Ja. 2:10). One disease can ruin a life; one bad habit ruins character; one duty neglected will cause a person to lose eternal life.

As Naaman went to the house of Elisha to be healed, he made up his mind as to how it should be done. He wanted to be healed in his own way. When Elisha's servant told him to go and wash seven times in Jordan, he was wroth. He thought the prophet would come out to him, and call on the name of his God, striking is hand over the sore and heal him, but he was healed only when he obeyed God. No one can be saved by doing just what he thinks is right. He may do what his conscience approves and still not be a Christian (Acts 23:1; 1 Tem. 1:15). He must obey God.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties, the assumption by the district of any indebtedness, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county; providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro-rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less

than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district, providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed twenty-five cents (\$1) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district. "Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts." Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

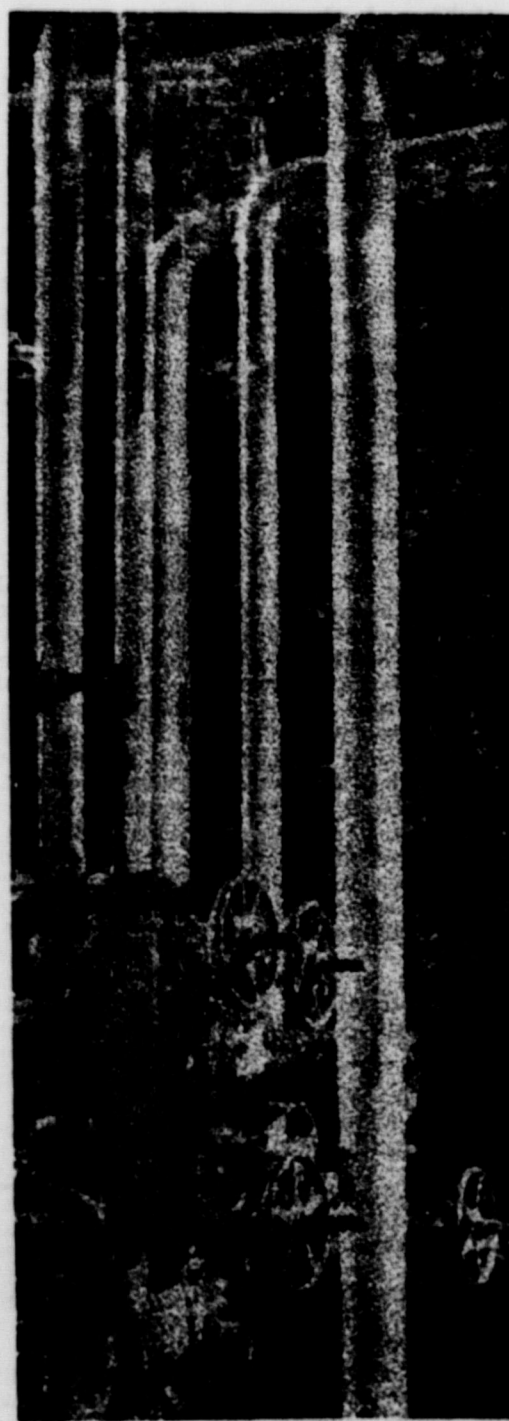

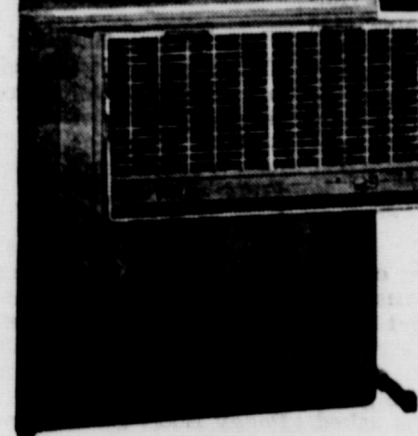

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the condi-

tions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be prosecuted in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be affected except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast thereon are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

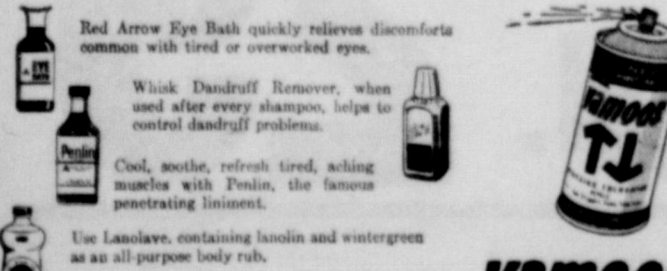

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 88 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 61-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, and providing for the total and permanent disability of persons who have received Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled be amended and renumbered so as to read as follows:

"Section 61-b-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday and have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have resided in the state for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance, and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving assistance from any other source."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article III a new Section to be known as Section 49, authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and to dispose of such storage facilities and water upon such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe; providing for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49, as follows: "Section 49d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the land and water resources of the State by the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for the storage of public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the people of the State, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49c, of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purpose of acquiring and developing storage facilities for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governmental or governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or local, public and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term contracts with the United States or any other agency of the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as State bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49c of this Constitution shall apply to the same as if they were State bonds issued under the authority of said Section 49c of this Constitution, and the interest on such bonds shall be paid from the proceeds of the sale of such bonds.

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published or recorded in the Constitution and laws of the State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 5b, providing that school taxes levied in any independent school district, the major portion of which is within Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change in the boundaries of such district, but, in the event of such change, shall be levied on the territory which is included in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation thereon.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following: "Section 5b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, or any bonds voted in any such district, but unused, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district without the necessity of an additional election. The boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonds, respectively, outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted, and such governing body shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unused bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

changed, and of interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes may be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount of or not to exceed the rate heretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest absolute population according to the last scholastic census and only the unused bonds of such district voted prior to such change may be subsequently sold and delivered and any voted, but unused, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 5b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries, and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election." "AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 5b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published or recorded in the Constitution and laws of the State.

Changes Studied In Harvesting And Ginning Of Cotton

Shifts in the cotton producing areas of Texas and changes in harvesting methods have greatly affected investments in gins, according to Progress Report 2233 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The report shows that the Blacklands and East Texas have shown the greatest decreases and the High Plains the largest increases in cotton production. The areas with great declines in production have had comparable declines in the number of gins and those areas with increased production have had opportunities for expanded investment in gins, the report explains.

Cotton harvesting has almost completely shifted from hand picking to hand snapping and mechanical harvesting and thus has created a greater need for cleaning devices in the gin to handle this cotton. This additional equipment has increased the investment that a gin owner must make, the report continues.

There are wide differences in the amount of cotton each gin handles and in the areas of falling production they are not handling enough cotton to be economical, the report points out. The gins in the Blacklands and East Texas are not being fully utilized as are the gins in the High Plains.

These preliminary studies show that model gin plants should be developed as a guide for installing and remodeling gins to get the most efficient operation under different conditions and in different areas of the state.
