Naaman had about every thing that one could want to make him satisfied with life. He stood at the top in the estimation of his king, like many other men, he was great with man, but not with the Lord. He was honorable and a mighty man, but he was a leper. All of his advantages in life were set at naught by one physical defect.

To a rich young man, who inquired about eternal life, Jesus said, "One thing thou lackest, go thy way, sell whatsoever thou hast, and give it to the poor, and thou shalt have treasures in heaven, and come, take up thy cross, and follow me" (Mk. 10:21). 

E IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature may by law authorise the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county.

"If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district: provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property-tax-paying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at sub-guicine sections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation.

PROPÓSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all belious shall have printed thereon the following:







ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by asking thereto the following:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change of any kind in the houndaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all threable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public tree schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded in debtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were veted; and such governing body also shall have the power, vithout the necessity of the State Constitution and the district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were veted; and such governing body also shall have the power, vithout the necessity of the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy time. 
