Odd Bits Salvaged

We have in mind three important dates, which everyone should remember.

The first of these is next Monday—labor day—which will be a holiday for some people. Although it wasn't included as an official holiday for Munday, some places, including the local schools, will be closed.

The importance of this date is that you should drive carefully if you're going places. Holidays usually result in heavy traffic fatalities over the nation.

"Drive Lighted and Live!" is the four-word suggestion being offered for Texas motorists. This slogan was devised in 1959 by a Victoria rancher and businessman, R. B. Roos. He proposed a very simple approach: "Ask Texas drivers to burn their headlights during the daytime holiday hours as a sign (1) that they were driving safely and legally, and (2) as a reminder to other motorists about the same thing.

There came to our desk on Monday a news picture showing a human skeleton riding beside an auto driver. This skeleton represents the "hitch-hiker Death," and drivers are admonished not to take him along on their holiday trips.

About the only place we expect to be driving Monday is from home to work and from work to home, but you may be planning on going someplace. Be careful!

The next date coming up is Saturday, September 8th.

That's the date on which qualified property tax-paying people of Knox County will decide whether or not bonds will be issued for an addition to the Knox County Hospital and improving its present facilities, and for much needed repairs to the county courthouse at Benjamin.

There's no doubt in our mind but that these two projects are badly needed. Our county hospital is, and has been for years, below state standards and much improvements should be made. The new wing, adding some nine rooms, six with adjoining baths and one with private bath, to the present facilities is also needed, in our opinion.

Our courthouse was in need of repairs a few years ago, when voters saw fit to defeat a proposed bond election for this purpose. It has not improved as the days have gone by. Architects, our county officials and others who seem to be "in the know" have said that much of this repair work is "essential" if we, the people, are to protect our investment in the court house building.

They say there will be no increase in taxes if the bonds are voted. We've heard some argue that the bonds will have to be paid off by taxes—and although no increase is anticipated, we'll be paying for the next 30 years. That's true, but that does not mean an increase in our present rate.

It would be kinda foolish for us to expect taxes to be lowered, anyway. We know of very few instances when this was the case. Several years ago, our drainage ditch taxes were lowered.

We won't attempt to tell you how to vote—but vote on Saturday of next week.

The third date is Sunday, September 16. That's when we'll all be taking that Sabin oral vaccine on a little lump of sugar, or diluted in water. Those pushing this project want 100 per cent immunization in the county—and that's as it should be.

Ages run from six months to 115 years! They tell us it's important for older people to receive the vaccine as the children. Although older people may never have polio, they may serve as carriers of the germs.

Be at the local school on Sunday, September 16. It won't take but a few minutes of your time—and it may be the most important few minutes you will ever spend!

## Stodghill And Baker Resign Positions As Directors Of Local Drainage District

After having served for 15 years along with the late R. D. Atkinson as directors on the local drainage ditch, we have decided to resign and ask that three new directors be appointed.

During the past 15 years, this drainage ditch has saved the town of Munday thousands of dollars in flood damage, and is still doing a good job, such as the recent heavy rains that fell in the Thorp community that would have flooded many business houses had the ditch not been in operation.

Many citizens think the culverts are stopped up when the water is rising in the local

streets, but they are not and, any one who will drive down to the Wallace place just west of Lake Creek can see that the ditch is carrying all the water it is built to carry. If more culverts were installed and the water allowed to get away faster it would wash out the east end of the ditch and damage farms in that area.

Travis Lee has just finished auditing the books, and any one interested in seeing the financial condition of the drainage ditch may see a copy of this audit in the county treasurer's office or at the city secretary's office.

The local city officials and our commissioner, Mr. George Nix, have cooperated in every possible way throughout the years and we know they will continue to do so.

The local city council will soon recommend three new directors to be appointed by the Commissioner's court, and we feel they will be glad to have some citizens who have the time to apply for this job. Like most other local civic jobs, it does not pay any salary, but we need the ditch and hope it will continue to get the job done.

## Sunday, September 16, Is Date For County-wide Immunization For Polio

One hundred per cent participation is being sought in the county-wide administration of the Sabin oral vaccine against polio on Sunday, September 16.

In Knox County, the vaccine will be given at the Munday school gymnasium and the Knox City school gymnasium on that day.

This protection against the dread disease is provided by consuming a lump of sugar on which three drops of the sabin vaccine have been placed. Young babies will be given the drops directly on the tongue, and those who

cannot take sugar may be given it diluted in water.

The campaign is being sponsored by the Tri-County Medical Society, and various civic organizations are giving their assistance. All persons from three months to 115 years are urged to take the vaccine, including all those who already have received the Salk shots.

A make-up date will be set for those who fail to get the Type I vaccine on September 16. Type II and Type III will be administered at a later date.

No charge will be made for the vaccine, but members of the Medical Association, who are buying the vaccine, invite donations of about 25 cents per person to help defray the purchase cost. Any excess money will be used for purchase needed equipment for the Knox County Hospital.

It was pointed out that older age groups very rarely contact polio, but are frequently carriers of the disease; therefore, it is important that they also receive the vaccine.

Rev. Fortenberry was born and reared in Knox County and was very active in the Methodist Church in Knox City for years. He will be remembered by many in Knox City.

## Shortage of Water Looms in Munday

Munday is on the verge of a critical water shortage, according to an announcement made several days ago by Mayor V. E. Moore.

"Our water wells are pumping to capacity," he said, "and without any extra water at all. The pumps are pumping sand, too, which is always the case when

supply in the wells begins running low."

There was some let-up in water consumption during the cooler weather which hit during the week end, and this brought a slight relief in the situation, with less water being used in air-conditioning, etc. But the only thing that will bring us out of the near-critical stage is a good general rain.

"Our water reserve, which we must have on hand in case of fire, reaches the critical stage almost every day," Mayor Moore said, "and we ask that citizens use water very sparingly—and not waste any—or we will be in water trouble very shortly."

With all facilities going at full capacity, there is very little gain on the water reserve, even at night. Careful consumption of water may avoid a rationing situation.

"We're not asking for water rationing at this time," Mr. Moore continued, "and maybe we can avoid it by carefully watching our consumption."

## Joe Doby New County Agent

Joe Doby has been appointed Knox County agricultural agent, effective September 1, according to a joint statement made last week by the Knox County Commissioners Court and J. G. Simmons, district agent.

Mr. Doby replaced J. A. (Jack) Moore, agent in Knox County agent for the past several years, who is transferring to Hudspeth County.

Mr. Doby has served as assistant agent of Grayson County since 1958. He has also served as ranch manager, operated his own farm, and has been assistant herdsman at Oklahoma State University. He has a B. S. degree in animal husbandry, with a minor in agronomy, from Oklahoma State University.

Mr. Doby is married and has three boys. The family belongs to the Presbyterian Church.

The new county agent served two and a half years in the Marine Corps during World War II.

## U. S. Bond Sales At High Figure

Bond sales in Knox County totaled \$8,137 during July according to W. E. Braly, chairman of Knox County Savings Bonds Committee.

Total sales during the first 7 months of 1962 were \$169,539 which represents 84.8% of the 1962 sales goal.

Texas July Savings Bond sales of \$12,516,786 were the highest monthly sales since March. Total sales for the state during the first 7 months of the year were \$89,237,662. This figure represents 54.1% of the state sales goal.

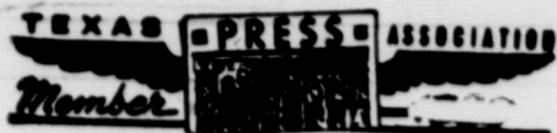

### What Will Be The Results If We Refuse Scriptural Baptism?

Jesus commanded it (Mark 16:16; Matt. 28:19-20). If I refuse to obey Him, what will be the results? John 12:48 "He that rejecteth Me, and receiveth not My words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." When Jesus was preaching and baptizing, many refused to be baptized; what about them? Luke 7:29-30 "And all the people that heard him, and the pharisees, and lawyers rejected the counsel of God against themselves, being not baptized of him." "If refusing to submit to the baptism of John was rejecting the counsel of God, what is it to refuse the command of God's Son? Let's read Heb. 10:28-29 "He that despised Moses' law died without mercy under two or three witnesses; of how much sorer punishment, suppose ye, shall he be thought worthy, who hath trodden under foot the Son of God, and hath counted the blood of the covenant, wherewith he was sanctified, and unholy thing, and hath done despite unto the Spirit of grace.

To reject his commands would be to reject Him. We would be treading under foot the Son of God. Let's see what the apostle James has to say. "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." How could one be guilty of breaking the whole law, if he only offended in one point? Let's read the next verse: "For he that said, Do not commit adultery, said also, Do not kill. Now if thou commit no adultery, yet if thou kill, thou art become a transgressor of the law." James 2:10-11. When we reject one command, we have rejected the authority behind that command, then we have rejected the authority behind all his commands. When we have done this, then we have rejected the Lord Himself. Therefore if I accept faith and repentance, but refuse, reject baptism, then I might as well reject the others, for the same Lord gave ALL THE COMMANDS. Baptism is no more important than faith, repentance, confession, or any other command the Lord has given, but it is JUST AS IMPORTANT, for this command came from THE LORD, not from men.

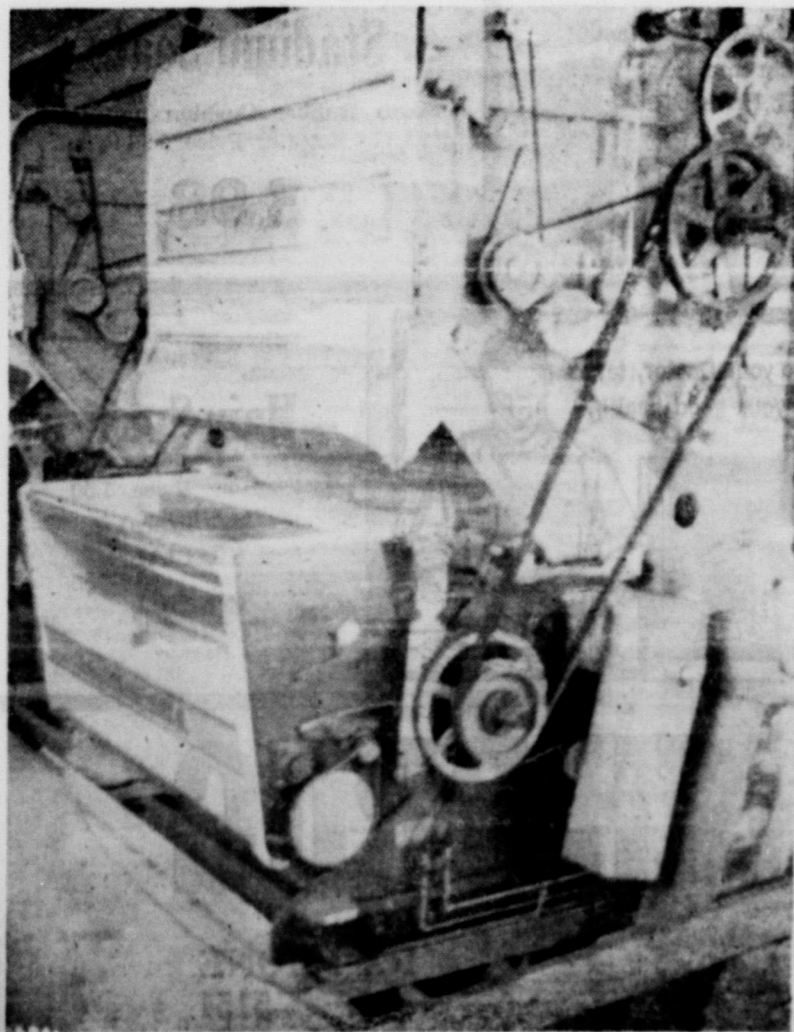

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Bowled Over By The Big City Writers Ideas On A Solution To The Farm Problem

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek has gotten hold of another big city newspaper, with the following results.

Dear editor:  
If I lived in a city surrounded by all those unsolved problems like traffic, lack of tax money, crime, congestion, crowded schools, parking, etc., I'd devote my time too to solving the farm problem, and it was with considerable interest I ran into a newspaper which a puff of August wind turned up out here on this Johnson grass farm the other day with an article in it by a big city columnist discussing the farm problem. He has a brand new explanation for the farm surplus.

Now up to now, I've been contending all along the farm surplus was due to the fact us farmers are just more capable than say for example the space scientists. Everybody from President Kennedy on down admits the Russians are ahead of us in space, just as everybody from Mr. Khrushchev on down admits us American farmers are ahead of the Russians in food production. I don't want to brag, but there are the facts.

But this big city columnist has a different explanation altogether. According to him, "all this productivity in American agriculture is not necessarily the result of progress." He claims that "federal policies have been drawing into agriculture the small-town banker, the small-town doctor and anybody else after a fast buck."

In other words, it's all those small-town bankers and small-town doctors and lawyers who have bought up the farm land and produced the surplus in

order to make some fast bucks. Wasn't us farmers at all.

Now I don't want to criticize this city columnist, and after all, you've got to remember that one of the most inviting things about the farm problem is that anybody can offer a solution to it, safe in the knowledge that nobody else has found the right answer either, but what I'd like to know is where are all these bankers and doctors and lawyers who are making all those fast bucks by farming?

Now I know some bankers and doctors and lawyers who own some land, but it has been my opinion that all of them together haven't added over two inches to the mile-high surplus, and as for making any money, fast bucks or slow ones, I'm afraid that city columnist hasn't had an opportunity to examine their farm ledgers. And I notice very few of them are giving up their jobs in town to really go whole-hog after those fast bucks out in the country.

Another nice thing about the farm problem is that it puts city columnists in the same class with country columnists when it comes to finding a solution, and if I lived in a big city with all those city problems closing in on me, I'd attack the farm problem myself at least twice a week and sometimes on Sunday.

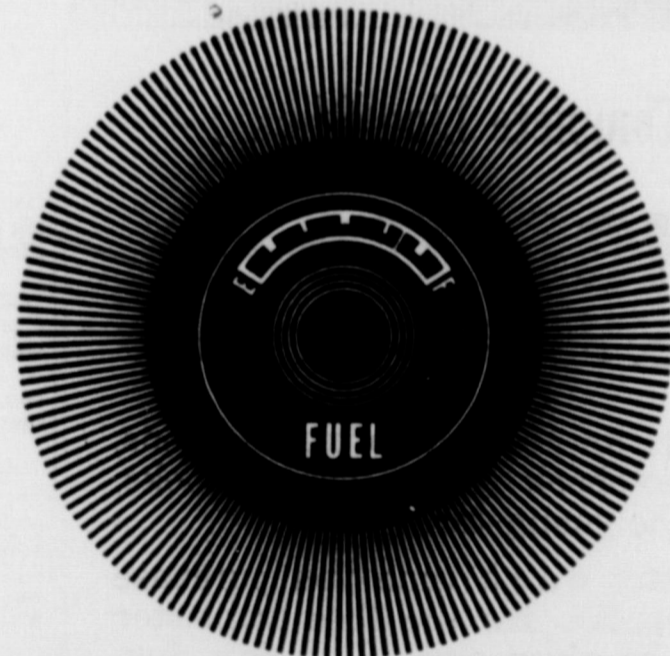
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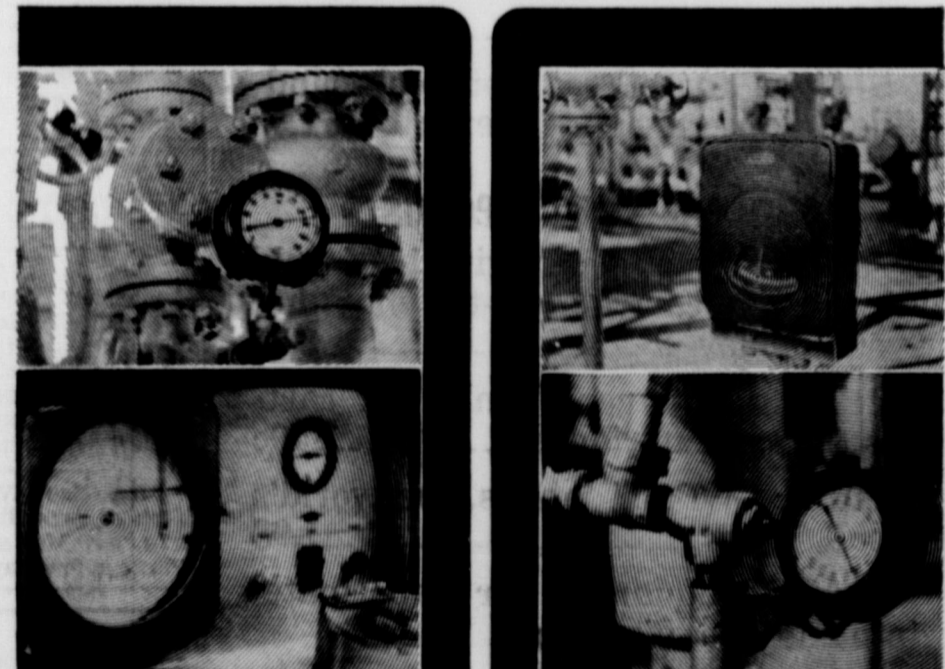
