

"But the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some SHALL DEPART FROM THE FAITH, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils." (I Tim. 4:1). Paul was inspired but he certainly did not understand that a person could not fall away from the faith. If a person who has fallen away from the faith is saved, why should not God just save everybody? God is no respector of persons.

"Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine, continue in them, for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee." The Holy Spirit (speaking through Paul) said that Timothy would save himself by his teaching. Can a man refuse to teach the truth? God did not destroy a man's free will when he became a Christian. Truth is always in harmony with truth. It is true that Timothy would save himself by what he taught. Therefore the doctrine that teaches that what we do has nothing to do with our salvation is not in harmony with the truth. "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel (unbeliever)". (I Tim. 5:8). Can you imagine a man that is worse than an unbeliever walking the streets of gold in heaven?

"For some are already turned aside after Satan." (I Tim. 5:15). If a person can turn aside and follow Satan and still reach heaven, why should God cast Satan out of heaven?

The apostle Peter thought a child of God could be lost, "For if after they HAVE ESCAPED the pollutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and over come. THE LATTER END IS WORSE WITH THEM THAN THE BEGINNING. For it had been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than, after they have known it, to TURN FROM THE HOLY COMMANDMENT delivered unto them. But it IS HAPPENED unto them . . ." Peter said it did happen. What happened? Some who had escaped the pollutions of the world (been saved) through the knowledge of Christ had gone back into the world, had been overcome and their "latter end was worse than the beginning."

Peter said again "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness, but is long suffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." (II Peter 3:9). This was written to those of "like precious faith" as Peter had. (II Pet. 1:1). Christian friends, take heed. The Lord is not slack: He is longsuffering to YOU-WARD. WHY? He does not wish any of YOU ("of like faith") to perish. How different this is to the doctrines of men today.






