Odd Bits Salvaged By The Editor

It would be next to impossible to name, and thank, every individual or business firm that made a contribution to the success of the Sabin polio vaccine program in Knox County.

There were those who did the planning and organizing, and worked closely with doctors of Munday and Knox City in getting the program organized. "We've got a heck of a lot of work to do," said one of these members when the program was first outlined.

There were those who did volunteer work at the school each of the two Sundays when the Type I vaccine was being administered. We think there were around a dozen people doing this volunteer work in the school gym last Sunday when we paid our visit.

There are those who made other contributions. Locally, the M System Store of Munday donated and delivered sugar cubes for administering the vaccine. Three cases, or a total of 8,420 cubes, were donated.

Then J. T. Whitworth of Morton's Foods furnished the tiny paper cups at a nominal cost. These cups, as you remember, contained the sugar cubes—and the sugar wasn't touched by hand as you transferred it to the mouth.

These were not all, by any means. Other grocers of Munday have been lined up, and have cheerfully agreed, to furnish the sugar, or whatever the need may be, for the other rounds of the immunization program.

According to figures furnished us, a total of 5,646 persons received the vaccine on these two Sundays—4,471 on September 16, and 1,175 on September 23. It is estimated that this is around 75 per cent of the county's population.

Some were gratified, and some were disappointed, at this response. The percentage in Wichita County ran about the same, and authorities there were plumb gratified. But some who did some hard work locally were disappointed in the number from Knox County. They had hoped for at least 90 per cent immunization.

Our guess is that the Canadian scare caused some to steer away from the program, although it was highly publicized that the Type I vaccine was entirely safe. Anyway, we think the program was, in a measure, highly successful.

A phenomenon of this time of year was reported to us the latter part of last week. Mrs. A. C. Boggs told us that they had a peach tree blooming in their back yard—and it also contained some small peaches.

We were asked what freak of nature caused this to happen—but we had no answer. We've heard of this before; in fact, we recall that a number of years ago a limb containing blooms and fruit was brought into the office—and after the tree had produced one crop of fruit. Yes, it happens occasionally, but we don't know why.

Those in charge of the Munday United Fund are making plans this week for opening the drive to raise the fund's 1963 budget. This drive will open on Monday, October 8, and will continue for one week.

The budget is slightly less than that of last year, \$5,300. We've said it before, and we'll say it again—we like the United Fund way of raising money for those important and necessary agencies. Raising it in one concerted drive is much better than having about a dozen drives throughout the year.

There are some nine agencies included in this year's drive—and three, Heart, Cancer and Polio, have asked not to be included.

The fact that some agencies will not accept the United Fund method of raising their share of money in a community drive always been disappointing to us. If the money is raised and turned over to them; then, in our opinion, the method of raising it should not be questioned.

Moguls Romp Over Knox City Friday Night

The Munday Moguls blanked Knox City last Friday night 12 to 0 by staying with a consistent ground attack and speedy line plays to rack up their second victory in two tries this season.

They will journey to Haskell next Friday night for a tilt with the Indians. Tailback Pete Alcalá and Fullback Louis Flores paced the attack with a touchdown apiece and rushing yardage of 94 and 85 respectively.

Knox City quarterback Eddie Williams, who had score four TDs in two previous games, and 1961 all-district fullback Charles Bateman were held in check by the hard-rushing Moguls. Williams picked up 65 yards on 22 carries, while Bateman had 42 yards in 14 tries.

The Moguls contained Knox City within its own territory in the first quarter, then lost an opportunity for a touchdown by losing a fumble to the Greyhounds on the Knox City 17. Soon after the second quarter began, Munday fumbled again, this time on the Greyhounds' goal line with a mass of Knox City players recovering.

The Moguls' first TD came on Flores' six-yard burst through the line, capping a 42-yard drive in eight plays with 6:32 left in the first half. Wingback Bruce Pruitt's conversion run, failed.

Knox City controlled the ball until almost halftime, driving from its 40 to the Munday 23 following the kickoff. There, halfback Brack Shaver lost a fumble to Mogul center Jackie Booe and tailback Bill Stewart.

The Greyhounds ground out the drive on short yardage, picking up four first downs en route. Munday's Alcalá returned the second half kickoff to his own 21 and from there the Moguls moved the ball 79 yards in nine plays for the touchdown. Alcalá outraced Shaver, halfback Joe Reyes and tackle Freddie Smith five yards on a pitchout around left end for the score. Knox City blocked Pruitt's conversion attempt.

Alcalá also sparked the TD drive with a 23-yard sprint from his 23 to the Munday 46. Quarterback Doug McGrady kept the ball on a 17-yard rollout to the Knox City five to set up the second touchdown.

A possible Knox City third quarter TD was blunted by a holding penalty. The Greyhounds' Johnny Montandon recovered a fumble by Flores on the Munday 27. Five plays later Williams passed to end Fred Penman on the 10 and Penman drove to the three. But the 15-yard penalty nullified the play.

In the final quarter, the Greyhounds drove from their 19 to the Munday 14 where Williams passed over Penman's head in the end zone on fourth down. Williams spurred the march with a 34-yard rollout around left end to the 15.

Outstanding defenders for the Moguls were Alcalá, Flores, and Ricky Couch in the secondary, and Booe in the line. Smith paced Knox City line play while Bateman and Shaver stood out among the backs.

Haskell Suit To Be Decided At Later Date

Judge Sterling Williams of Snyder, sitting for 39th District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman, took under advisement at Haskell last Friday a suit asking for an injunction against the City of Haskell.

The suit, filed in August, seeks to prohibit Mayor J. E. Walling, Haskell aldermen and the city secretary-treasurer from disbursing city funds for legal fees to prosecute any suit against the North Central Texas Water Authority.

Plaintiffs, among whom is listed former Texas A&M College football great John Kimbrough, allege that city officials are hiring officials to fight the water authority, of which Haskell is a part.

Friday's hearing lasted from 5 until 9:30 p.m., after which Judge Williams asked that written briefs be filed. He did not say when he would return his ruling.

Weather Bureau Records Kept Here 50 Years; Hill's Kept Them 25 Years

An enjoyable job for H. P. Hill of Munday, and one he's been doing for the past 25 years, is keeping weather bureau records for Munday. And during these years, Mr. Hill has not missed sending in even one report!

H. T. Paukert, of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Fort Worth, was here last Friday to make minor repairs to the weather bureau equipment, at which time he presented Mr. Hill a 25-year service pin in recognition of his 25 years of service.

Mr. Hill has been keeping the

records as official weather observer since July 1, 1937. He first sent his reports to Houston, but now to the Weather Records Processing Center in Kansas City, Mo. In his monthly reports, he gives the high and low temperatures daily, and the amount of rainfall when it rains.

Mr. Paukert's records show that local reports to the weather bureau started September 1, 1912, with the late R. L. Gaines in charge. Then November 30, 1915, W. A. Bolling, an employee of the Munday Times, started sending in the reports. The job was then transferred to A. E. Whittemore, who served until June 30, 1937.

During this time, only the amount of rainfall was recorded. The thermometer recordings were added when Mr. Hill took over. Mr. Hill had kept records prior to this time, furnishing them to the First National Bank and other interested citizens. After becoming the official observer, he used some of his own instruments for a while, then the weather bureau started furnishing and maintaining them.

An added service which Mr. Hill recently started giving his community is that of furnishing the weather data to T. V. Channel 3 in Wichita Falls. He telephones his report in daily, except Saturdays and Sundays, and the temperatures and rainfall are broadcast over this station on the 5:55 p.m. weather news report.

Mr. Paukert expressed appreciation of the Weather Bureau for Mr. Hill's valued 25-years of service—and the Munday community is just as appreciative. He's been very loyal to this job, which he says he enjoys. If he's ill, Mrs. Hill does the reading for him. If they're out of town, he asks his brother, Sherman Hill, or some friend who is familiar with the instruments to take the readings and make the recordings.

United Fund To Open '63 Drive On October 8th

Paul B. Pendleton, publicity chairman, announced Monday that the Munday United Fund will open its drive for 1963 budget funds on Monday, October 8. A concerted drive to raise the budget will continue for one week.

With a budget of \$5,300 for next year, the following agencies will be benefited:

Medical Research Foundation, Muscular Dystrophy (Munday Fire Department), Texas Rehabilitation Center (Gonzales Warm Springs), Salvation Army, American Red Cross, Boy Scouts of America, Texas United Fund, Inc., City-County Library, and Youth Summer Program (Boy's baseball and girls' program).

Three agencies, the Heart, Cancer and Polio funds, are not included in this year's budget. These agencies requested that they not be included, and they will probably conduct their own drives during the year.

The youth program was added because President Kennedy and Gov. Price Daniel have asked that each community set up a physical fitness program for youth. On the Governor's committee for this purpose are two local men, Mayor V. E. Moore and Supt. Willis Apple.

Mr. Moore is also campaign chairman for the United Fund drive, and serving with him in addition to members of the United Fund board, are Mrs. W. R. Moore, Jr. and Mrs. Jeff Anderson. Further details of the drive will be announced next week.

1,175 Receive Vaccine Sunday

A total of 1,175 persons received the Type I Sabin oral polio vaccine in Knox County last Sunday, which was "make up Sunday" for those who were unable to take the vaccine on Sunday, September 13.

It was reported that with the additional persons taking the vaccine Sunday, Knox County has just about 75 per cent coverage. Munday had a total of 735 to receive the vaccine, while Knox City had 440 persons Sunday, according to reports given the Times on Monday. This makes a total of 5,646 persons taking the vaccine during the two Sundays. No announcement has been made as yet regarding the other types of vaccine, and it is supposed they will be administered as scheduled.

Another guest speaker for the Matron's Club will be Royce Adkins, District Attorney, who will speak on "The Status of Women," in observance of Law

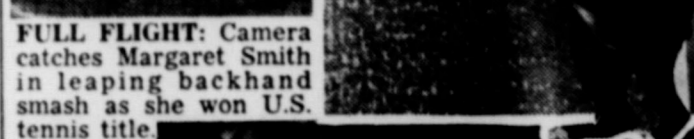
