Odd Bits Salvaged By The Editor

"This is not a happy occasion." So (reportedly) said James H. Meredith, 29-year-old Negro, as he started to attend classes after enrolling in Ole Miss last Monday.

Events of the past several days, or weeks, was shaded only, if shaded at all, by the racial uprising in Little Rock, Ark., some time ago.

It wasn't a happy occasion for Ole Miss or the people of Mississippi, either. We believe we've seen integration coming for several years, but the people of the Old South find it hard to agree with it.

Even before we heard President Kennedy's speech Sunday night, it was evident that opposition forces in Mississippi were giving away to the laws of the United States, and that Meredith would be enrolled.

From the President's talk, we gleaned this message: There are laws that we don't like and laws that we like, but it is our responsibility to respect and obey the laws of the land, whether we like them or not.

Meredith became the first Negro student to be enrolled in the University of Mississippi. Perhaps his future in the university won't be too bright, but if he exhibits the same stubbornness he showed in getting enrolled, he will probably finish the semester.

The regrettable part of it that events leading up to his enrollment caused the eyes of the U. S. and of the world to be focused on Oxford, Miss., and caused at least two deaths.

"They ought to do like Goree did," we heard someone say last week, "take it to the vote of the people — then schools would become integrated without any trouble."

Folks around Munday are generally happy over the fact that a Munday High School senior, Miss Anita Flores, 18, was selected as Fiesta Queen at the first annual Fiesta Mexicana in Quanah last Saturday.

When the Quanah boosters were here on the Saturday before, the queen candidate talked to the group over the P. A. system in both English and Spanish. Then Jesse G. Smith, president of the Munday Chamber of Commerce, took the mike and remarked something like this: "We're sending our candidate to Quanah, and we aim to take the money!"

We confronted Jesse Monday morning and asked him if he wasn't just popping off when he made that statement. "Well," he said, "I felt that we had as good a chance as anybody."

It took quite a bit of effort upon the part of this candidate, and a number of others, to have her entered in the contest—but we reckon it was worth it. Today, possibly the town of Munday is known to people in places where the name had never been heard.

Most editors like to state facts in their papers, but few of us ever go so far to voice a misstatement of fact as Mark Twain did once.

In his reporting days, Twain was instructed by an editor never to state anything as a fact that he would not verify from personal knowledge. Sent over to cover an important social event soon afterward, he turned in the following:

"A woman giving the name of Mrs. James Jones, who is reported to be one of the society leaders of the city, is said to have given what was purported to be a party yesterday to a number of alleged ladies. The hostesses claim to be the wife of a reputed attorney."

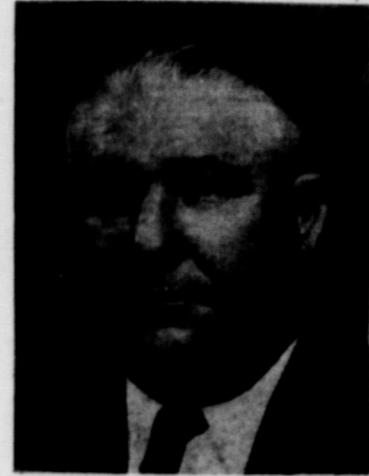

Mogul fans turned out strong for this game, which was the first defeat for the Moguls this season.

John Kimbrough, Haskell fullback, broke into the scoring column for the Indians in the second quarter on a 2-yard plunge but missed the extra point.

Later in the quarter Haskell had the ball on the Munday 5-yard line but lost the ball on fumble.

In the second half Kimbrough added his second touchdown of the night, racing 4 yards with quarterback James Davis hitting end Joe Thigpin on a pass play for the extra point.

Weather Slows Cotton Harvest

Damp weather continues to slow the harvest of cotton in the Area services by the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Munday, Texas according to A. D. Peebles, Acting Chairman.

Sample receipts for the week were 3,752 as compared to 3,476 last week. On this date last season the office had classed 23,604 samples with 8,670 being the total for this season.

Micronaire readings improved this week to give 80 percent reading 3.5 and higher.

Grades improved over last week on cotton harvested during dry weather. SLM LT Spots made up 44 percent of the weeks classing and LM LT Spots accounted for 25 percent.

Staple lengths ran 48 percent 31/32, 25 percent 1 inch and 19 percent 15/16. Market activity is slow with SLM LT Spot 1 inch bringing around 30.35 cents and LM LT Spot 1 inch around 29.00 cents per pound.

If that's all Khrushchev had, it sure would solve the Russian problem, and I doubt if Congress would be passing resolutions against the shipment of tommyhawks to Cuba.

Don't run down the primitive farmer. He may hold the world's future in his hands. Every survival shelter ought to contain a good wooden plow and a strong woman to pull it.

Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Joe W. Doby, Knox County Agent

"A screwworm-free southwest will cost an estimated \$12 million," Mr. J. D. Smith, Truscott, chairman of the county animal health committee, reported this week.

Of this, livestock producers and sportsmen will raise \$3 million and the rest will come from state and federal sources, Mr. Smith said.

The screwworm eradication program entails the release of sterile screwworm flies by airplanes. The sterile male flies mate with naturally-occurring females, thus producing infertile eggs. The program is a cooperative venture of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Texas Animal Health Commission, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and agencies in other southwestern states.

Mr. Smith outlined the expenditures that are required to wipe out the livestock pest that does an estimated annual damage of \$100 million. From February 14, 1962—with the first sterile screwworm flies were released in Texas—until July 1, a total of \$1,850,000 was spent.

Program officials expect expenditures of \$4,700,000 during the year of July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963. Broken down, this amounts to nearly \$1 million for meat, blood and honey to raise the sterile screwworm flies at Mission, Texas; \$550,000 for fly dispersal; \$2,050,000 for salaries and travel; and \$1,100,000 for plant maintenance, utilities and other services.

After July 1, 1963, officials anticipate a cost of \$5,450,000 for final eradication and establishing of a barrier zone which will keep flies from entering the United States from Mexico.

Mr. Smith said that if producers contribute on a basis of 50 cents for each head of dairy and beef animal and 10 cents per head of swine, sheep and goats, the remainder can easily be raised.

Mrs. L. B. Campbell, Sr., Knox City, is the treasurer of the Knox County screwworm eradication program. All contributions should be turned over to him or to Mr. Smith. Mr. Campbell reminds all contributors that these are deductible on your income tax.

Wildlife enthusiasts are reminded that they will reap the benefits of a screwworm free southwest also. The deer population is expected to zoom upward

and this will mean more deer to harvest each year.
