### Sabbath Or Lord's Day; Which?

The Jewish Sabbath came upon the day before the first day of the week. "In the end of the Sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, . . ." (Matt. 28:1). The Jewish Sabbath came on Saturday.

God commanded the Jews only to keep the sabbath as a day of rest (Deut. 5:1-3, 12-14). On the Sabbath the Jews were forbidden to even kindle a fire (Exod. 35:3), or to work (Exod. 35:2), etc.

This Jewish Sabbath was taken away when Jesus died on the cross. "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross. . . . Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the sabbath days" (Col. 2:14-16). Jewish Christians were no longer to be judged for neglecting to keep the Sabbath, because the law that commanded it had been nailed to the cross. Yet some Christians continued to observe the Sabbath after they became Christians. Paul expressed doubt about these. "Ye observe days and months, and times, and years. I am afraid of you, lest I have bestowed labor upon you in vain" (Gal. 4:11-12).

What about Christians in our time, do they observe any special day? Yes, we are to observe the first day of the week, commonly called "the Lord's day." How do we observe this day? Just as the early Christians did. "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread Paul preached unto them. . ." (Acts 20:7). Christians observe the first day of the week by meeting to partake of the Lord's supper and to worship as did the early disciple in studying God's word.

Christian's do not speak of the Lord's day as the Sabbath. Nor do they speak of the Lord's day as the Christian Sabbath. The Sabbath came the day before the first day of the week. The Sabbath was a day of rest for the Jews. The Lord's day is a day for Christians to come together and worship God, and we are not to forsake that assembly (Heb. 10:25).

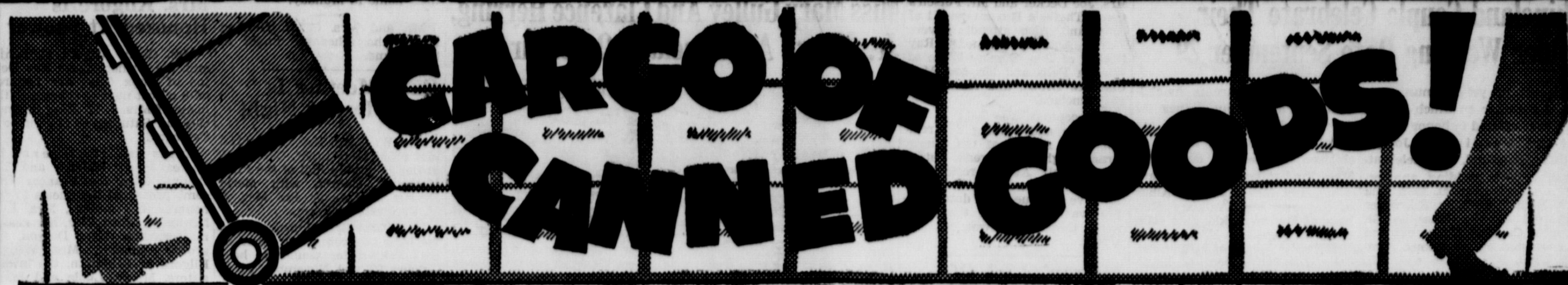

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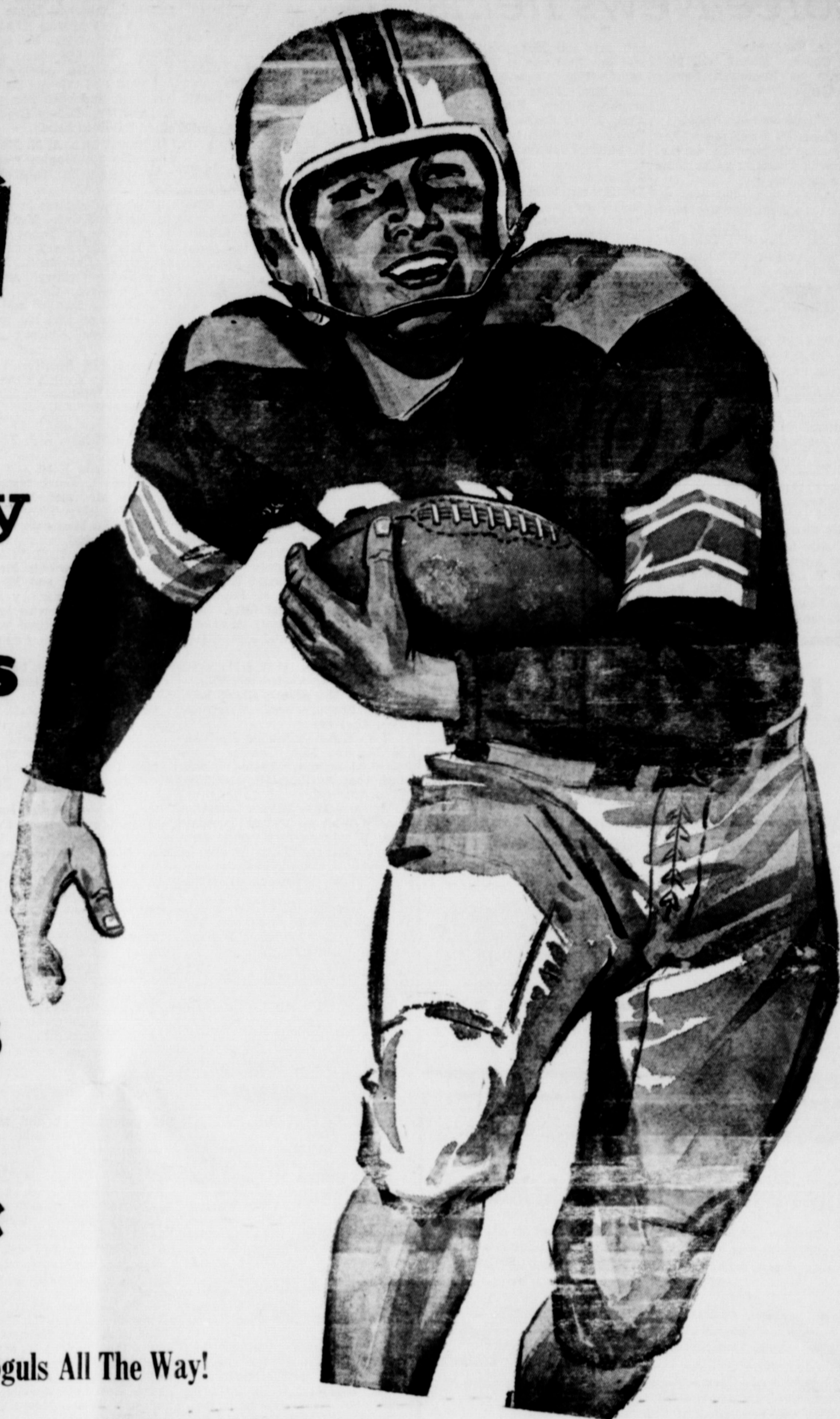

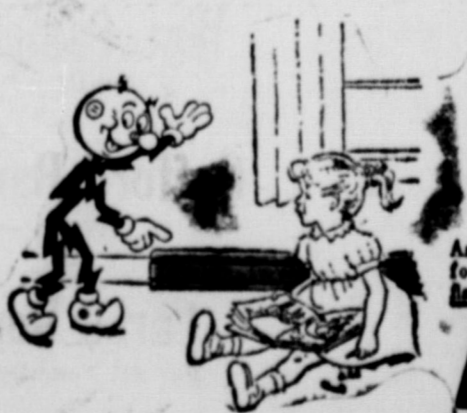

grass farm yesterday sitting down resting my mind from all the current crises of the world when a pleasant October breeze blew a newspaper into my yard and I picked it up and skipped the front page headlines and was going through the inside pages when an article caught my eye. "Computers Will Work On Farms," it said, and I read it immediately. "Farms of the future will be handled largely by computers," it continued.

"This is just what I'm looking for, I told myself, but then I got to the next paragraph. "Computers will be used by farmers to tell them when to plant crops, what to feed the animals, and how much water is needed by the crops."

"I've never fully understood the point in these big electronic computing machines anyway. I know they can figure up in a few seconds the answer to a problem it'd take a man years to figure, but the way I get around needing such a machine on this farm is, I just don't think up any problems that big. Why don't they turn these machines loose on the problem of Cuba?"

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## Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Joe W. Doby, Knox County Agent

**Screwworm Eradication Program**  
Trustees of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation say that if producers do not raise the remainder toward a goal of \$3 million, the eradication effort may not be carried to completion. The foundation is conducting a fund raising drive this month to raise \$1.2 million. In a drive last fall and spring, producers chipped in \$1.8 million.

C. G. Scruggs, president of the foundation, explained that the program is being financed by the federal government matching non-federal funds on a 50-50 basis. When the federal funds were appropriated, it was stipulated that as soon as non-federal funds were not available on a matching basis, federal funds could not continue.

He emphasized that the foundation is not asking those producers who have already contributed their full 50 cents per animal unit to give again, although many of them have indicated their willingness to do so.

"We hope to raise the money by giving those who have not yet contributed, or have not invested their full share, a chance to do so," he said.

B. B. Campbell, secretary-treasurer of the Knox County eradication program, reports that livestock producers and sportsmen contributed \$1,583.33 toward a quota of \$4,434. Each producer is asked to consider the cost of treating animals for screwworms and the obvious advantages of eradication in making his contributions toward a screwworm free southwest.

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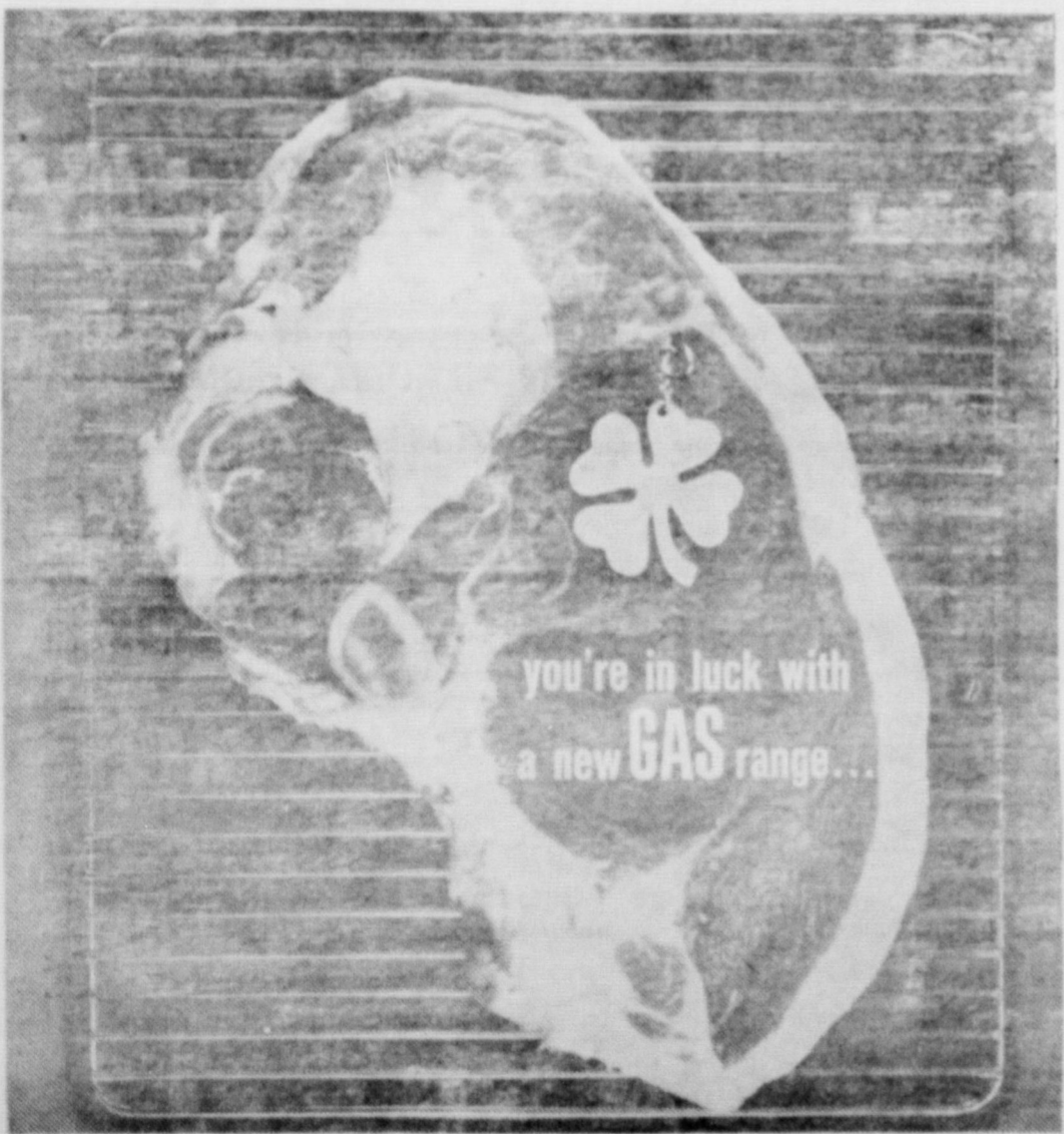
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
