Nor is it a strictly unselfish wish, since the patients and students stand to gain hours of enjoyable employment—if the hunters send the deer hides to the annual buckskin collection.

Haskell Fine of Kerrville, chairman of the Volunteer Services Council which sponsors the collection has sent out thousands of shipping tags giving specific directions for donating the hides. They are available from most Chambers of Commerce in the hunting country and other spots where hunters gather.

If the sportsman skins out his own kill, he is asked to throw a handful of table salt on the raw side of the hide, allow it to drain, roll and tie or package it and affix a tag addressed to: Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 South Lamar, Austin, Texas.

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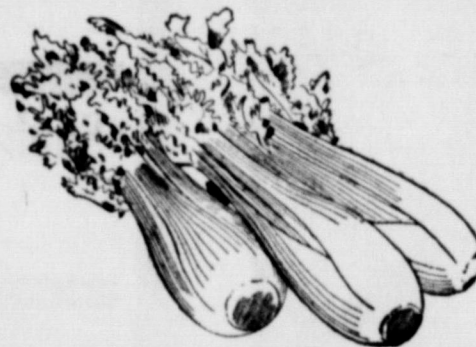
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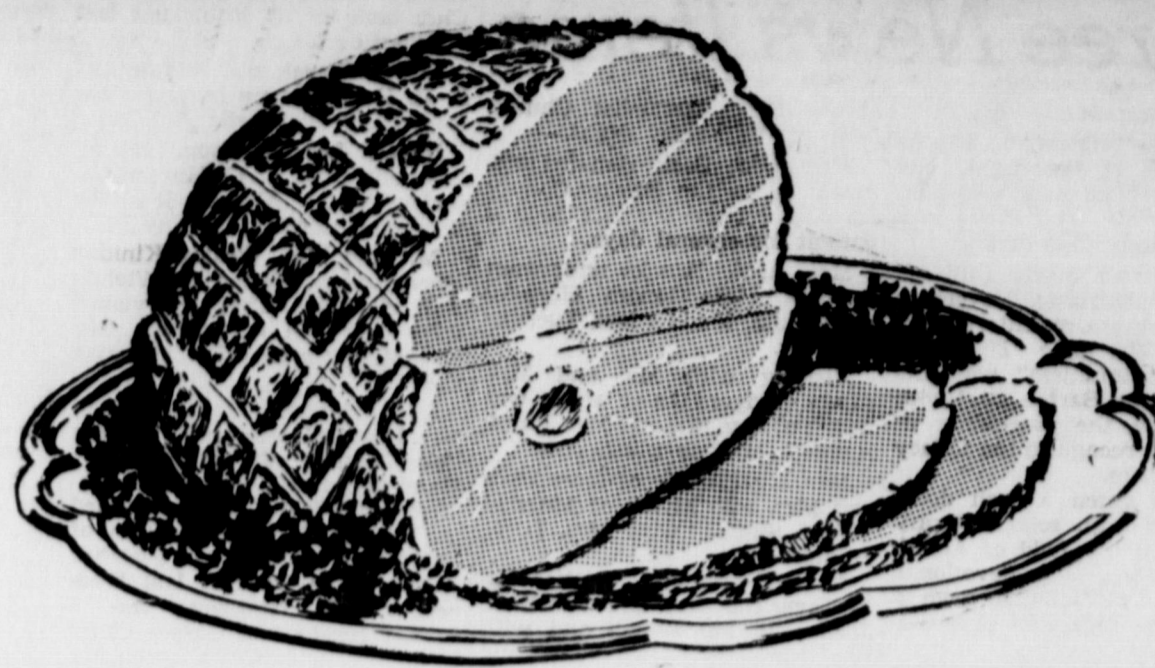
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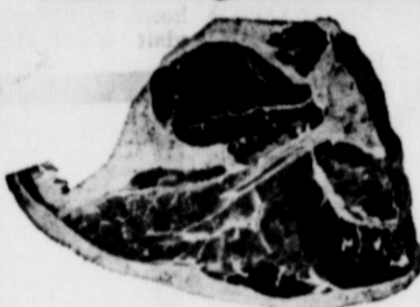

Knox Prairie Philosopher Favors Government Experiment Of Bringing Weather Forecasters Closer To Home

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek drops international affairs and discusses the weather this week.

Dear editor:
Some people don't think the world makes any progress, but it does.

For example, take weather forecasting. A while back a little shower caught me out in the open without a raincoat and I got soaking wet. What I was doing was changing the props from the north side to the south side on a fence of mine. You'd think a fence would lean in the same direction all the time but mine leans one way a while then leans the other, and it keeps a man pretty busy sighting down it to see which side to put the props on.

At any rate, the day had been clear and sunny until I suddenly looked up to discover a cloud had turned up and rain was pouring down.

After I got home and dried out I pulled out a newspaper I'd been saving for a rainy day which is a lot easier than cash and read a long article on a new experiment in weather forecasting.

According to it, the government is experimenting with more community forecasting stations. It's one thing, it said, to get the weather report for a general area covering a fourth of the state, but what farmers need is a station that'll forecast the weather right at home.

This will be a great improvement and a sample of progress. I don't mean to say the local station will be any more accurate than the big-city station, when you're living on a globe that's traveling through space as fast and far as this one is every 24 hours, it's possible to predict what the weather ought to be tomorrow but a lot easier to tell what it was yesterday and a man is still going to get caught in a rain, but the progress comes in being able to pinpoint the blame.

There's very little satisfaction in getting mad at an anonymous weather bureau in a nearby city, but when somebody living in your own community says it's going to be clear tomorrow on your own farm and it rains, you've got something to go on. You can call the bureaucrat up and tell him what you think.

In many cases, forecasting the weather is like predicting who's

Legal Notice

NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the following acts are injurious to ARTICLE 696 VERNON'S TEXAS PENAL CODE.

Whoever shall leave the carcass of any animal, which died in the actual possession of such person, within five hundred yards of any private residence, or in any public road or highway, or in any street or alley of any town or city, or within fifty yards of such public road, highway, street or alley, shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

ARTICLE 696A VERNON'S TEXAS PENAL CODE

It shall be unlawful for any municipal corporation, private corporation, firm or person to dump, deposit, or leave any refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on any public road or highway in this State or permit the same to remain within or nearer than three hundred (300) yards in any public road or highway in this State, whether the refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk being

dumped, deposited or left, or the land upon which refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk is dumped, deposited or left, belongs to the person or persons so dumping, depositing or leaving it or not; provided, however, that the provisions of this Act shall not affect farmers in the handling of anything necessary in the growing, handling and care of livestock, or the erection, operation and maintenance of any and all such improvements that may be necessary in the handling, thrashing and preparation of any and all agricultural products.

Any violation of this Act by any person, firm or private corporation, shall upon conviction, subject the offender to a fine of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$200.00, and each day of any such violation shall be treated as a separate offense. In the event of any threatened or probable violation of it shall be the duty of the County or District Attorney in the county in which such violation is threatened, to bring suit for injunction to prevent such threatened or probable violation. Any person affected or to be affected by any such threatened or probable violation shall have the right to enjoin such violation or threatened violation. The enforcement of the remedy hereinabove provided by injunction shall not prevent the enforcement of the other penalties provided in this Act. (See Article 696 and 696a of the Vernon's Texas Penal Code for complete law).

It is requested by the Commissioners' Court of Knox County, and the Knox County Sheriff's Department that all violations be reported. Violators will be prosecuted.

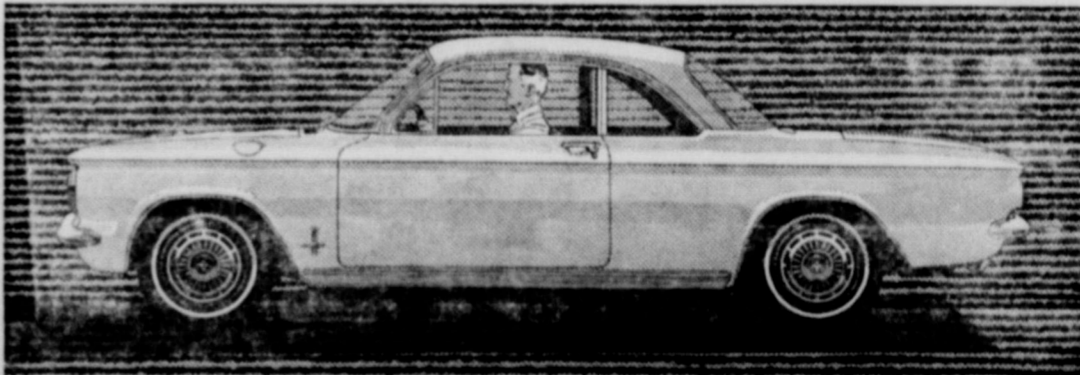

Farm Home Loans Are Available For Development

L. J. Cappleman, state director of Farmers Home Administration, has announced that loans may now be made to farmers for providing recreational facilities which will enable these family farmers to supplement their farm income.

Loan funds for recreational enterprises may be used to develop

land and water, construct buildings, and to purchase land, equipment and other related recreational items including the payment of operating expenses. Recreational enterprises which may be financed on family farms include camping grounds, swimming facilities, riding stables, vacation cottages and lodges, lakes and ponds for boating and fishing, docks, nature trails, picnic grounds and hunting preserves.

Each loan is scheduled for repayment within a period consistent with the borrower's ability to repay, taking into account his income from farming, recreation enterprises and any other income

he may have. The maximum repayment period of the loan depends on what the funds are used for and the security provided for the loan. Repayments on loans secured by real estate may not exceed 40 years. Repayments on loans for non-real estate purposes may not exceed 7 years. The interest rate is 5 percent per year on the unpaid principal.

The county or area committee of the Farmers Home Administration determines the eligibility of the applicant. The committee consists of three farmers who know rural farming and credit conditions in the local area.

Technical management assistance will be provided with each loan. The amount of the loan depends upon the applicant's needs and repayment ability. A borrower's total principal indebtedness for intermediate-term FHA loans and equipment and operating expenses may not exceed \$35,000. A long-term loan secured by real estate may not exceed the normal value of the farm and other security, minus any debts against this property and may not exceed the amount certified by the county committee. In no case may such a loan plus other debts against the security property exceed \$60,000.

A farmer may apply at the County Farmers Home Administration Office located at Seymour, or any Tuesday from 11 a.m. to 12 noon at the ASC office in Knox City. There he will be given an application and the supervisor will be glad to answer any questions he may have.

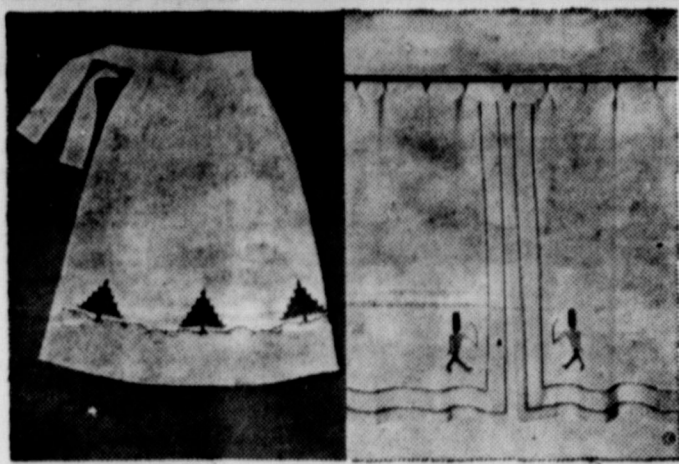

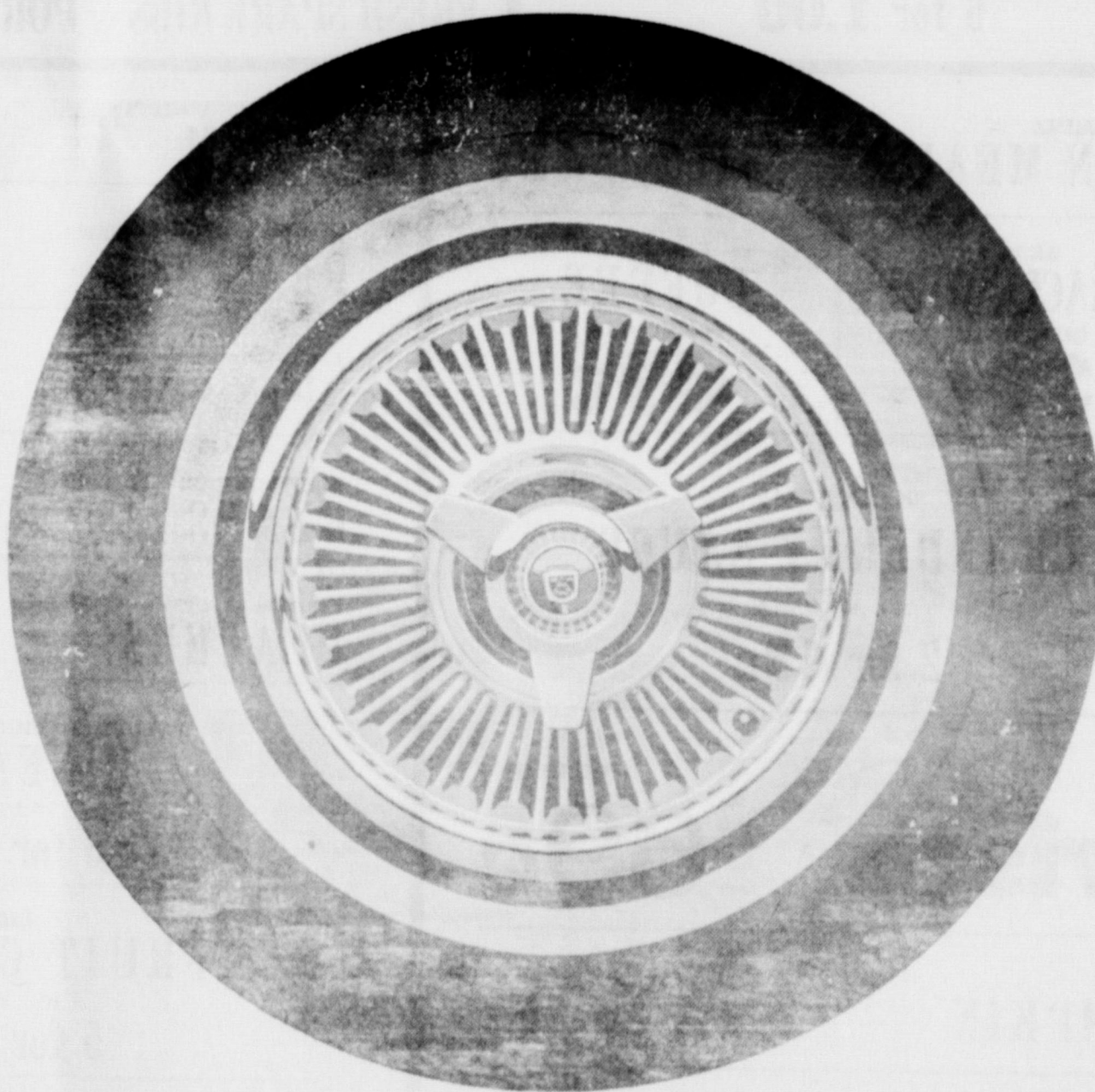
