Work of rebuilding the front was started Saturday, and we hope this will be completed by the time the paper is out. Remodeling work continued on the inside—so we've had carpenters, plumbers, electricians, bricklayers and masonry men in and around the shop this week, in addition to our own crew.

The new drop ceiling will likely be installed Saturday, then our lights and, perhaps, some heat in the building by the week end.

Remodeling always calls for messing up and cleaning up. In getting ready for the big doings, we've hauled some half-dozen pickup loads of accumulated junk to the dump grounds, in addition to what the trash men have hauled off for us on their rounds. We're not through, yet, we have junk in back of the building in addition to what can be seen outside.

4-H Delegation Off To Chicago

A 31-boy and girl delegation will represent Texas at National 4-H Club Congress, November 25-29. They will assemble in Dallas on November 23 and after a get-acquainted meeting and a luncheon provided by the First National Bank in Dallas, will depart by special train for the nation's number one annual 4-H meeting.

The delegates come from 23 different counties and 10 of the 12 Extension Districts in Texas. Delegation chaperons will be Marshall Crouch, assistant state 4-H leader and County Extension Agents Uel Stockard, Ellis county and Jimmy Lou Waincott, Hidalgo county. Miss Peggy Wilford, assistant state 4-H leader, will accompany two national trip winners, Patricia Hrcncir, Lavaca county and Garry Carter, Montague county. They won trips in citizenship and public speaking and were required to be in Chicago on November 23. The latter three will make the trip with the state delegation on November 30.

Director John E. Hutchison, Mrs. Florence Low, assistant director for home economics and Assistant Editor J. W. Potts will also attend the Congress. Mrs. Low will speak at a Wednesday morning breakfast sponsored by the Singer Sewing Machine Company for 4-H leaders and invited guests. Potts will serve as a member of the Congress' Press Committee.

The Congress is meeting for the 41st time and will be attended by 1,500 of the nation's most outstanding 4-H Club members. Each has been named a state winner in his or her demonstration project field. Many will receive national awards during the Congress. Delegations from many foreign countries will give the meeting an international aspect.

National 4-H Club Congress is made possible through award programs sponsored by many of the nation's leading business and industrial concerns. Funds which they provide are handled through the National 4-H Service Committee, Inc., Chicago, and the Committee, along with many State and Federal Extension Service employees work together to make Club Congress a national institution.

Mrs. Clifford N. Jenkins of Long Island N. Y., president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, addressed the delegates the first evening. Pertinent quotes include: The needs of parents, teachers and all members of the community to band together, working for improvement of the home which will give the community, state and nation greater strength.

Dr. James H. Jauncey of El Paso, pastor of the First Christian Church, spoke on "The Home and the Citizen," stressing that the needs of our young people are positive thinking and positive action. "We need to train, not entertain, our children," he said. "Teach them why our country is the best in the world."

Mrs. Alice Peek Passes At Goree; Rites Saturday

Mrs. Alice Bartlett Peek, 84, pioneer resident of Goree, passed away at 5:20 a.m. Thursday, November 15, in the Baylor County Hospital in Seymour, where she had been a patient for ten days.

Mrs. Peek was born May 9, 1878, in Putnam County, Tenn., and came to Goree with her parents on December 31, 1901 from Tennessee. She had lived in the Goree area since that time.

She married T. J. Peek in Seymour on September 10, 1903. He preceded her in death several years ago.

Mrs. Peek was a long-time member of the First Baptist Church in Goree.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Saturday from the First Baptist Church in Goree with the pastor, Rev. Benny Hagan, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. C. R. Mathis of Lenora, former pastor at Goree.

Burial was in Goree Cemetery under the direction of McCauley Funeral Home.

Serving as pallbearers were Melvin Cooksey, Les Jameson, Ed Jungman, George Montandon, Harold Jones and Cannon Roberts.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Ora Lane of Mezargel, Mrs. Effie Neighbors and Mrs. Dimple Jeton, both of Goree; three sons, Clarence of Wichita Falls, J. T. Peek of Kansas City, Kan., and Herbert Peek of Littleton, Colo.; 15 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Scythia Parmley of Goree; two brothers, H. L. Bartlett of Tulsa, and J. L. of Post.

The Munday Moguls will be defending their District 11-A football title against Everman, District 12-A champions, at 8 p.m. next Saturday at Jacksboro. And Munday fans are preparing to give strong support to the Moguls from the time the opening whistle blows. Fans will be motoring to Jacksboro from mid-afternoon until near game time.

Everman, located in the south outskirts of Fort Worth, boasts a heavy team with much power. Reports coming into the Mogul camp are that their line averages better than 200 pounds, with one

218-pound power driver in the backfield.

Everman won the 12-A championship on the strength of a penetration victory over Boswell. Their latest was a 34-0 victory over Keller last Friday night in Fort Worth.

Coach Wayne Bingham witnessed this game and met with the Everman coach afterwards. They were unable to agree on a neutral field. Bingham picked Stamford as the Moguls' home field, while the Everman coach picked Jacksboro, with Jacksboro being determined by a coin toss.

Coach Bingham won the toss to decide which team would occupy the "home side" of Jacksboro field, so Munday fans will be located there—on the side which contains the press box.

Tickets for the 11-district game arrived here Tuesday. They may be secured at the drug stores in Munday at \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for students. Fans are urged to secure their tickets before leaving and avoid the waiting line at the gate.

The Moguls have completed this season with an impressive record, having racked up a total of 186 points to their opponents 48 in season play. In district play, the Moguls garnered 154 points to 29 for their opponents. The scores ran like this, with Munday's score being first:

Rule, 20-6; Knox City, 12-0; Haskell, 0-22; Henrietta, 20-0; Holliday, 26-8; Paducah, 42-6; Crowell, 14-0; Archer City, 32-6; Chillicothe, 20-0.

Facing the weight and power of the Everman team, the Moguls are hoping for a dry field in this bidistrict game. With this in their favor, they hope their speedy backfield can overcome that power.

Grades showed a marked improvement with the continued dry weather and grades ran as follows: 36 percent Middling Light Spot, 27 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spot, 10 percent Middling Spot, 17 percent Strict Low Middling Spot.

Staple lengths for the week ran 13 percent 29/32, 47 percent 15/16, 23 percent 31/32 and 8 percent 1 inch and longer.

Samples classed for the week totaled 5,218 and the season total to date is 47,334. The season total on this date last season was 104,732.

Market activity is slow with Middling Light Spot 15/16 averaging 30.46 and Strict Low Middling Light Spot 15/16, 29.50.

Preaching Christ:

The apostle Paul in preaching the gospel, preached the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ. (1 Cor. 15:1-4.) Paul said, "For I determined not to know any thing among you save Jesus Christ and him crucified." (1 Cor. 2:2.) Paul told the Corinthian brethren that they were saved by the gospel which he had preached unto them. (1 Cor. 15:12.) Peter said, "This is the word by which the gospel is preached unto you." (1 Pet. 1:25.) By this we find that to preach the word was to preach the gospel, and to preach the gospel was to preach Christ.

What does one preach when he preaches Christ? "Then Philip went down to the city of Samaria, and preached Christ unto them." (Acts 8:5.) Note, Philip "preached Christ unto them." Does not say he preached faith, repentance, nor baptism. He just preached Christ. The best way to find out what the inspired men preached when they preached Christ, is to see what conclusion the Samaritans came to when they heard Christ preached. Verse six says, "The people with one accord gave heed unto the things which Philip preached." These people had been following after Simon the sorcerer. Verse twelve says, "But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, THEY WERE BAPTIZED; BOTH MEN AND WOMEN."
