Oldest Resident Of County Dies Friday; Rites Sunday

Ike Shipman, 97, of Vera, reportedly the oldest man in Knox County and resident of the county for over 70 years, died at 2:25 p.m. Friday in the Baylor County Hospital in Seymour.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday from the Vera Baptist Church of Vera with the pastor, Rev. Douglas Crow, officiating. He was assisted by

Rev. Carl Wright, retired Baptist minister.

Burial was in Vera Cemetery under direction of Elliston-Archer Funeral Home in Seymour.

Mr. Shipman was born November 22, 1874, in Evant, Texas, and came to Knox County in 1900. He was engaged in farming for many years, retiring several years ago because of his advanced age. He was a member of the Vera Baptist Church.

Always interested in community affairs, he was a charter member of the Red Springs Co-operative Gin.

Survivors include a niece, Mrs. Lola Scott of Vera, with whom he made his home; a brother, S. L. Shipman of Vera; and two sisters, Mrs. H. A. Smith of Red Springs and Mrs. M. E. Timberland of Leveland.

He reared two nephews, Elton and Galen Scott, now of Seymour.

County Farms Now Number 601 Census Bureau Reports

Knox county showed a total of 601 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 578.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 495 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural

products in the year, as compared with 483 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 763.0 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$105,021.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$8,456,265; in 1964, \$8,688,150.

2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$4,696,247; in 1964, \$7,058,800.

3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$3,760,018; in 1964, \$1,628,828.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 1 of the county's \$2,500 and over farms is incorporated.

PCA Officers To Attend April Meet

Officers and directors of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association join agricultural credit specialists from all over the state April 6-8 in El Paso for the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston annual meeting.

Rolling Plains PCA participants include board members, Lasater Hensley, Guthrie, chairman; Dean Decker, Childress, vice chairman; Mack T. Claburn, Anson; Winfred C. Mann, Clarendon; and John Paul Perrin, Haskell. Decker serves as the group's official delegate.

PCA officer participants are J. L. Hill, Jr., president; James R. Gleaton, vice president; and R. C. Cobb, vice president and secretary, all of Stamford.

Approximately 500 participants are expected for the meeting, reports PCA President Hill, which is designed to bring together representatives of 34 Production Credit Associations and 11 agricultural credit corporations.

Hill said the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, source of funds for these agricultural lending institutions, last year loaned more than \$1 billion to Texas farmers and ranchers through these credit sources.

John A. Hopkin, Stiles professor of Agricultural finance, Texas A&M University, will keynote the business session, speaking on "A Look Ahead at Financing Commercial Agriculture."

Goree Returns Incumbents To City And School

Voters of the City of Goree returned incumbents back into office in both the city council and school board elections last Saturday.

George Cotton, Goree principal, had 56 votes and W. M. Cooksey, farmer, had 37 to retain their seats on the council. S. R. Hudson, retired restaurant manager, had 29 out of 64 votes cast.

Returning to the school board were Taylor Allen, rancher-farmer, with 70 votes, and Cornell Skelton, rural mail carrier, with 55 out of 87 votes cast. Losing in the school board election were Calbert Haskins with 24, Don Estes with 17 and Manuel Ramos with 5.

The record for the world's longest beard belongs to a sheep herder from Norway. At the time of his death, it measured an amazing 17 feet, 6 inches!

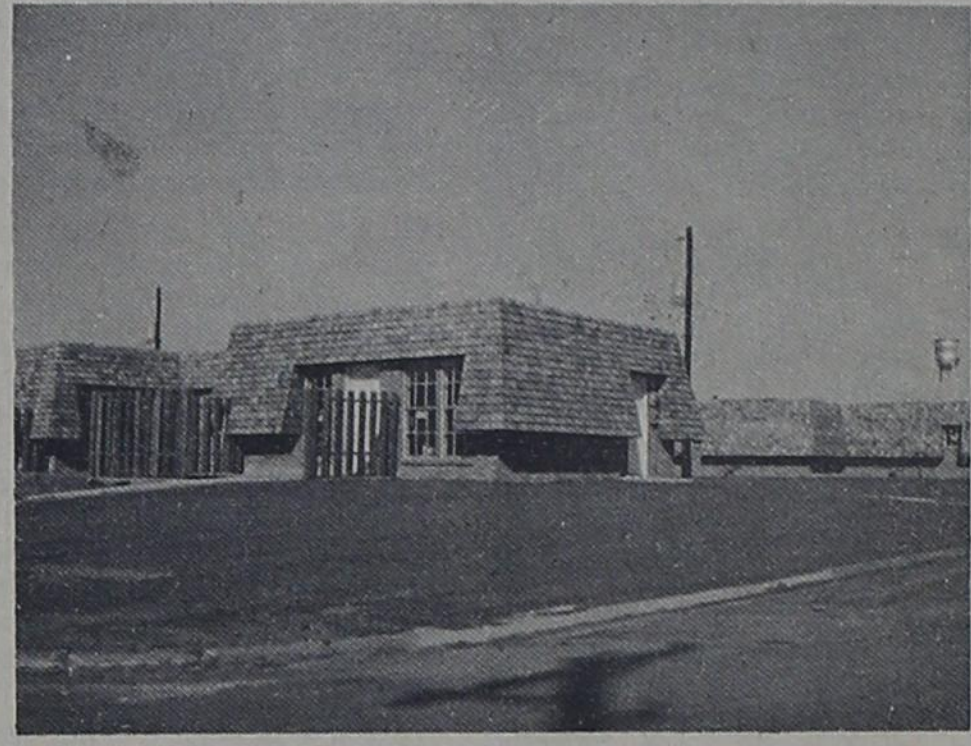
The beard was stored under his chin in a burlap sack while he was working. In order to donate the beard to be studied by scientists, his family had to give him his first shave in over 50 years!

Housing Project Work Is Ahead Of Schedule

It's all going along "according to Hoyle"—ahead of Hoyle, for that matter!

That's the impression left by Don McLain of McLain and Varner, contracting firm for the Munday Housing Project, and F. C. Gipson of Odessa, inspector for the work as it progresses.

Just this week, these men worked up an estimate of the work, what's been done and what's yet to be done, and announced that the \$484,000 project was 86.8 per cent completed, and well ahead of schedule.

Deadline for completion is July 25, 1972, Mr. McLain said Tuesday, and we're estimating that the project will be completed by May 15--over two months ahead of schedule.

"We've had some breaks weatherwise," McLain said, "and wonderful cooperation of our workers and other contractors. We had a wet period last year, and one snow, that caused us to lose around eight working days--and that's all the last time we've had."

Plumbing, electrical, and air conditioning work is being done by Carden Plumbing and Electric in Munday, while a good portion of the building materials are being furnished through Munday Lumber Co.

All rough-in work is completed and materials on the job for completing the plumbing work. All ranges and a portion of refrigerators have been installed, kitchen cabinets are installed in all rental units and a portion of them in the maintenance and management building.

"We've kinda reached the 'waiting stage,'" both Mr. McLain and Mr. Gipson said, "like plumbers waiting on someone, tile men waiting on plumbers, painters waiting on everybody, and the like."

Anyway, it's full speed ahead, the project is way ahead of schedule, and there are no unusual headaches anywhere.

Finck Succeeds Rep. Healy On Committee

Rep. Bill Finck, San Antonio attorney and cigar manufacturer, was named chairman of the powerful House Appropriations Committee by speaker Rayford Price last week in the special session of the Legislature.

Finck succeeds Rep. Bill Healy of Paducah, who has been chairman of the committee since 1963, plus another term in the 1950's.

Healy, 59, resigned Monday of last week because, he said, he had become a campaign issue in the speaker's race. In a statement to the press, Healy said:

"In the interest of establishing an orderly atmosphere in the House and in finding effective solutions to the critical problems facing our State, I am relinquishing the Chairmanship for the remainder of the 62nd Legislature. In doing so, however, I pledge to the House membership and hence

Mr. and Mrs. Mundy were here on January 14, 1972, enroute to the Rio Grande Valley.

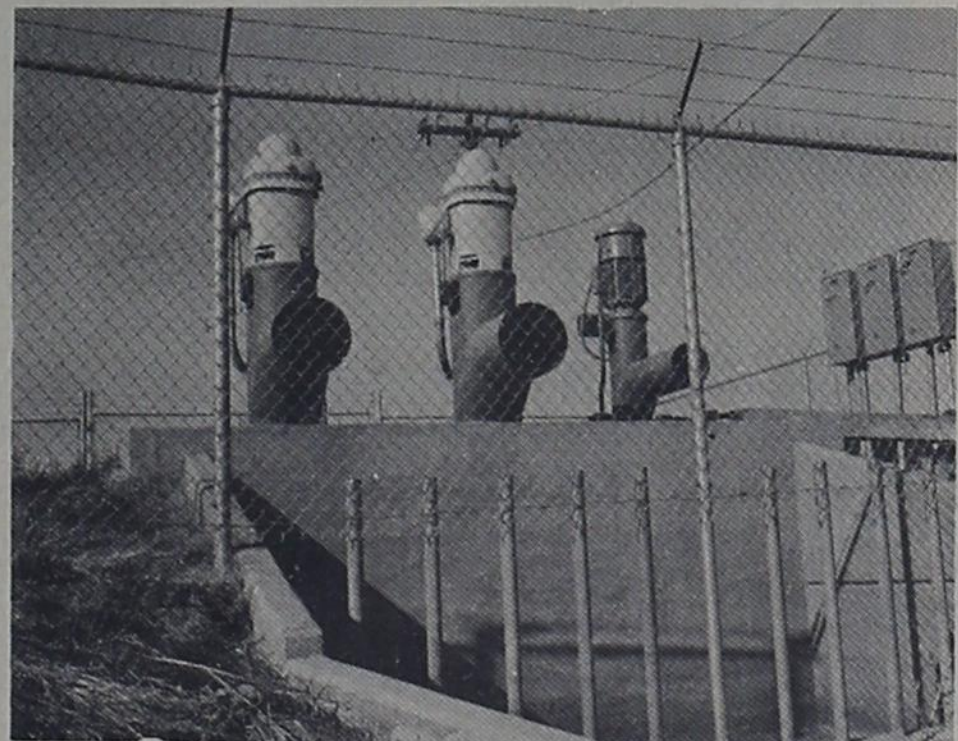
Friday, they were enroute home after this better than 2 months stay in the valley.

Letter Explains Local Flood Control Project

The following letter, which is self-explanatory, was received recently by Mayor J. E. Reeves regarding information which Congressman Graham Purcell has received on Munday's flood control project:

Dear Mr. Purcell:

This is in reply to your recent letter inclosing a letter from the Honorable J. E. Reeves, Mayor, City of Munday, Texas, concerning the proposed flood control project at Munday.

The report of the Fort Worth

District Engineer and the Southwestern Division Engineer recommending construction of channel improvements at Munday under the provisions of Section 205 of the Flood Control Act of 1948, as amended, has been reviewed in this office. Also, the final environmental statement has recently been forwarded to the Secretary of the Army for transmission to the President's Council on Environmental Quality in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, subsequent to filing the statement with the Council on En-

vironmental Quality, by the Secretary, this office will take appropriate action toward project approval.

The President's budget request for Fiscal Year 1973 includes funds in the amount of \$500,000 to initiate construction of the flood control project at Munday. However, additional funds would be required from future appropriations to complete the project.

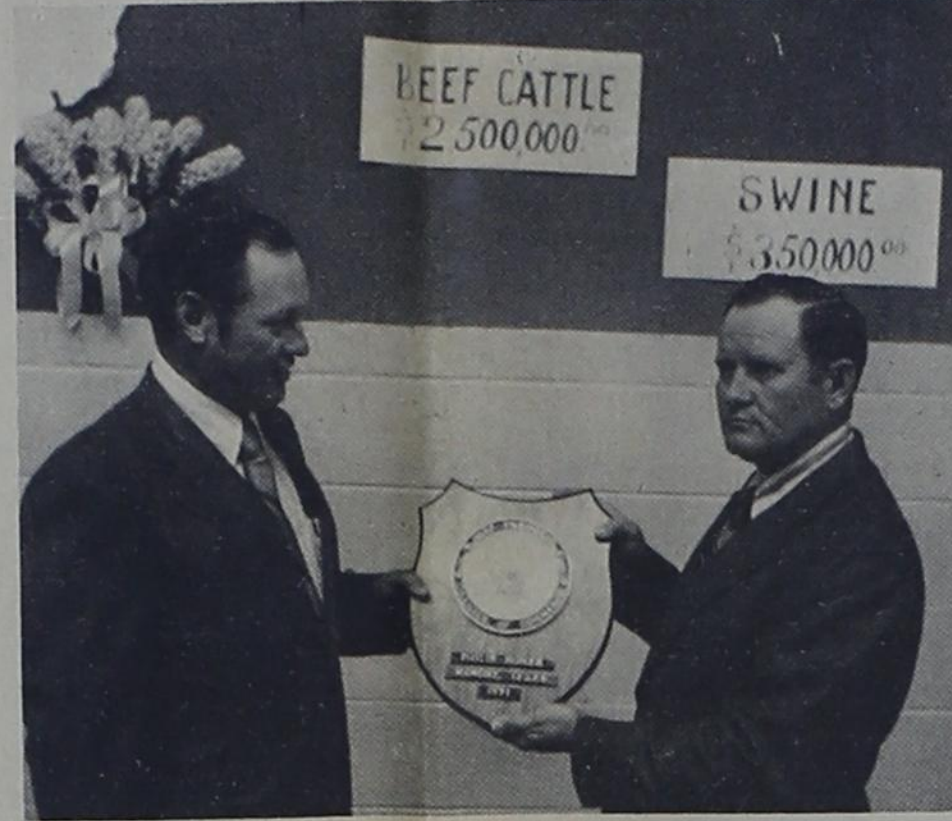

AERIAL SPRAYING OF MESQUITE DATES

The Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service County Committee has set the dates of April 10 through April 28 as sign up dates for the aerial spraying of mesquite control cost-share assistance. To receive cost-share assistance you cannot begin the spray application before May 15, 1972.

CONTROLLING COMMON BROOMWEED

Common broomweed (Xanthocephalum dracunculoides) in some years can become a serious problem on Texas rangelands. Broomweed germinates with winter rains, forms a small rosette of leaves, and grows very slowly for sometime. Rapid growth begins around mid-April, and by mid May the plants are 8-12 inches tall. Growth in height is fairly well complete by about June 15. On the average, broomweed reaches a mature height of about 18 inches, but may double that in exceptionally good years.

Results of research studies on the control of broomweed provide some very useful information. The application of 1/2 lb. of 2,4-D when broomweed was from 4-6 inches tall (around May 1) resulted in 95-100% control. Even 1/4 lb. of 2,4-D at this time reduced the stand of broomweed by 75%. Spraying the 2,4,5-T at 1/2 per acre produced 60% control of broomweed when applied on May 1, and 90-95% control when applied on May 15. When spraying is delayed to June 1, 2,4-D resulted in virtually no control whereas 2,4,5-T controlled about 85% of the weeds present at the time.


