

Result: The tree was uprooted. Our experience was an altogether different one. We deliberately, though painfully, de-

stroyed our trees. Back in the 1940s -- before we'd ever built our home, we had admired a box elder tree in the Lee Haymes yard before he built his present home. One day, Lee said he had some volunteer sprouts in his flower beds, and we could have all we wanted just for the diggin'.

We went up one cold morning in early spring, and broke the ice in his flower beds to dig up four of these fast-growing shade trees.

We carefully measured the front of our lot without the services of a surveyor and set out the trees. We carefully watered and nurtured them, and they responded nicely. Then we decided to build.

One of the trees was right smack in the middle of where our driveway would be, and it had to come up. Another was planted outside our east premises because of miscalculations in our survey. When the Bud Nelsons built their home, this tree was destroyed.

Still that left us with two lovely trees that furnished lots of shade in front of our house. We caught ourself slowing down the protection of those trees, so we could "work in the shade"

Screwworms could reach record levels ths year due to the unusually mild winter just ended unless livestock producers take special precautions, warns the director of the Screwworm Eradication Program based at Mission, Texas. Livestock surgery is a primary reason for many screwworm cases. Animals should be inspected frequently, all wounds should be treated, and all worm samples should be sent to the Screwworm Lab. A recent screwworm case has been reported from Haskell County.

FLORATAM GRASS SOLVES PROBLEMS

Texas homeowners have a new weapon for battling chinchbugs and St. Augustinegrass Decline (SAD) in their St. Augustine lawns, says a plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Floratam, a new variety of St. Augustinegrass developed by the Florida and Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations and released in 1972 to commercial growers, is now available at most local nurseries. The new grass is also toler ant to downy mildew and grey leaf spot, but brown patch and rust still pose problems. It is also less hardy than Common St. Augustinegrass.



What and where is litter? The Penal Code of Teras defines it: "Any person who shall dump or otherwise dispose of trash, junk, garbage, lefuse, unsightly matter, or other solid waste on public highways, rights -of-way, or other public or private property, or into any inland or coastal waters of Texas without written consent of the owner, his agent, or the public official in charge bereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$15 nor more than \$200. Every law enforcement officer of this State and its subdivision shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this Act."

"We should remember that seed cost is a relatively small percentage of the total production cost," he adds. "It can become very costly when it contributes to replanting, slow seedling growth and skippy stand. Quality planting seed is the basic ingredient in a good cotton crop. It is just poor management to use anything less than the best."

This warning comes from Dr. many years. M. E. "Cotton" Meadows, Jr., director of the Mission-based screwworm eradication program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Meadows also cautioned producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other manmade wounds to prevent screwworm infestations.

"Thirty per cent of all laboratory confirmed cases so far in 1974 have been collected from manmade wounds (dehorning, branding, docking and the like), and every effort should be made to prevent wounding animals during the screwworm

season," Meadows said. The USDA veterinarian emphasized that the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association also solicits the cooperation of all livestock owners in an all-out effort to eliminate the screwworm fly. In a special resolution approved by the industry organization at its recent annual meeting in Dallas, all livestock owners of the southwest were urged to support eradication effort



ABOUT YOUR SS

Persons receiving social security benefits can earn more in 1974 without having their benefit payments withheld than they could in 1973.

Henry Chustz, Manager of the Vernon Social Security Office, wishes to emphasize that the amount of earnings has been increased to \$2400 in 1974. In 1973, the exempt amount was \$2100. Anyone who receives social security payments and expects to earn more than \$2400 should notify the social security office if he has not already done

Chustz also points out that if annual earnings go over \$2400 in 1974, social security withholds \$1 in benefits for each \$2 in earnings above \$2400. Additionally, no matter how much you earn a year, you can get full benefits for any month in which you do not earn \$200 in wages and you don't perform substantial services in self-employment.

He also reminds those beneficiaries whose 1973 earnings exceed \$2100 to file a report with the social security office on or before April 15. Late filing may result in a penalty in addition to the normal withholding of benefit payments.

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
