EARLY SEASON COTTON INSECT CONTROL

Thrips, cotton fleahopper and early cotton boll weevil are insects to consider when making a decision if you should apply early season controls.

On late planted cotton in the county producers should be inspecting the crop soon after it reaches a stand for thrip damage. If thrips are present and damaging the leaf buds between the cotyledons before the four leaf stage, control measures should be applied.

As cotton reaches the first square setting stage, near six weeks of age cotton fleahoppers often keep the plants from setting an early crop by destroying the tiny squares as they start to develop. When above 25 cotton fleahoppers per 100 plant terminals are present producers should consider early control applications.

Three Leggett boll weevil traps established in Knox County May 7 to May 14 indicated some over wintered boll weevil emerging by May 14 and fairly heavy emergence between May 14 and May 28. Mrs. Carl Chafin removed 248 cotton boll weevil from one trap 2 miles Northwest of Knox City that were caught between May 14-27. The other traps with Sam E. Clonts 5 1/2 miles North of Knox City and Gerald Brown 1/2 miles North of Rhineland caught their largest number in the May 21-28 period. Numbers trapped since the May 28 date have been low indicating that emerging numbers have declined greatly, or the cotton boll weevil started finding cotton attracting them more than the traps. Producers should inspect fields closely at the first 1/3 grown square stage and indications of even small numbers of boll weevil at this stage, control practices may be beneficial. One early boll weevil application at this early stage should also benefit in cotton fleahopper control. After this application producers should strive to stop all applications through the mid season.

EAR MUFFS FOR FARMERS PROTECT HEARING

A pair of lightweight acoustical ear muffs can help protect against hearing loss from prolonged exposure to tractor noise. They can be obtained at safety equipment and sporting goods stores.

The ear muffs can help reduce hearing losses even if worn only part of the time. Wearing the ear muffs interupts the continuous stress that causes hearing loss.

Danger signals on hearing noises that persist for a few tractor following a day's work. Another sign of trouble is when your own speech seems muffled

after you've been around loud noise for an extended period.

Researchers have put the level at which noise becomes potentially damaging at 85 decibels -- to be potentially dangerous to hearing. RAINS, WARMER WEATHER INCREASE SCREWWORM THREAT

Screwworm cases are continuing their northward trek across Texas, and producers are reminded to re-double their efforts against the costly livestock pest.

"Texas has just recorded 590 posivite cases in May, or 67 per cent of the total cases it has experienced this year to date," warns Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., veterinarian in charge of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission.

"With rains received over a number of areas recently, the moisture is expected to increase the opportunities for more worm cases, unless producers really watch their animal and treat all wounds," Meadows says.

Until the beginning of May, only 282 of the flesh-eating worm cases had been indentified in the Lone Star State. Only 54 positive cases were reported by the Mission Lab in May, 1973.
