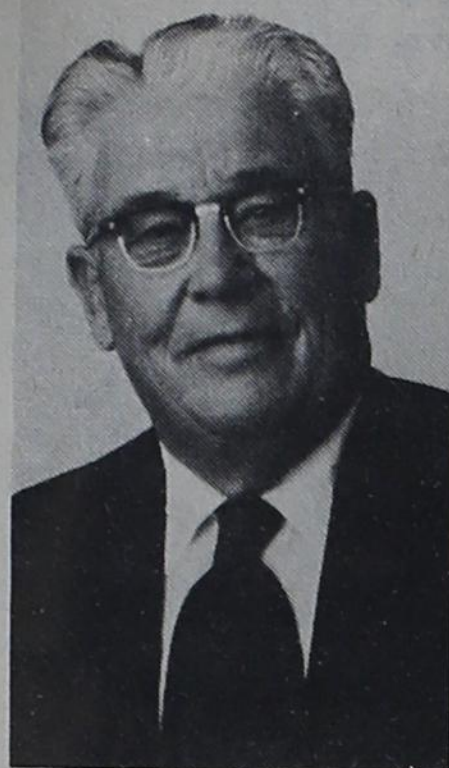

## Munday Moguls Battle Seymour Panthers To 13-13 Deadlock

### City Grants Increases In Salaries

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met in Special Session at 8 p. m. Thursday, September 1, at the Munday City Hall. Purpose of the meeting was to review salaries of city personnel and to make some adjustments where deemed necessary by the City Council to retain qualified employees in key departments.

Mayor Norman reported that, although city funds are critical, the Council believed the salary adjustments to be necessary, in some instances, for continued operation of all City Departments without interruption and to provide Munday's employees with a living wage.

A determined and agile young man, Robert Spells, fullback on the Munday Moguls, burned up the turf on Panther Field last Friday night for 98 yards on two TD scampers, then blocked a Seymour Panther punt in the final period to save his

team from defeat. The 13-13 tie was a moral victory for the Moguls, as they were supposed to be outclassed by the double-A Panthers.

Spells' first romp came on Munday's second possession in the first period when he broke loose for 42 yards,

stopping only when he crossed the goal stripe. The try for extra point failed.

The Panthers attempted a comeback, keyed by a 22-yard pass from Kirk Davis to split end Kevin Hospas that moved the host team from their own 33 to Munday's 38. There, three consecutive five-yard penalties forced the Panthers to punt. Andy Barron hit the coffin corner with a 40-yard kick that pinned the Moguls on its own 4.

Isom Murray fumbled it back to the Panthers on the next play, but a decisive goalline stand by the Mogul defense held the Panthers, the ball going over to the Moguls on downs.

Late in the second quarter, the Panthers again drove to the Mogul 35. The drive ended by a Seymour fumble, and the half ended, 6-0.

Early in the second half, Spells gave a thrilling repeat performance of the first period. On a burst through the middle he went 46 yards for his second counter, and Larry Welch added the extra point kick. Moguls 13, Panthers, 0!

Spells moved his team consistently through the third period, but the Moguls were unable to add to the score.

Midway in the final period, the Panthers finally found pay dirt. A pass, Davis to Hospas, moved the oval to the 3-yard line. Brandon Elliott punched it over, and Mike Jackson made it 7 to 13.

On fourth and 10 from the Panther 40, Willie Beamon, Panther halfback, took a pithout and made a desperation pass to Chris Styles on the Moguls' 22. They pushed the ball over on two more plays.

Jackson kicked the extra point for the Panthers, but their victory was short-lived. An illegal procedure penalty nullified the point. On the second attempt, Spells again came into action, blocking the punt and leaving the game deadlocked 13-13.

Spells racked up 214 yards in 25 plays, then saved the Moguls from defeat by blocking the punt.

It wasn't "all Spells" by any means, as other members of the Mogul team turned in good performances to have a part in the moral victory. It appeared that all the fans were "pleased as punch" with what they saw in the Moguls!

Commenting on Friday night's game, coach Jim Pope said: "We were pleased with the Seymour game in most instances. Our inexperience in spots showed up, but the kids gave a real good effort. Our leading tackle on defense was Johnny Melton; the big play award goes to Robert Spells; the defensive team received the defensive 'Head Hunter' decals on their helmets for scoring 60 per cent."

"I was disappointed in our blocking effort, but this is always behind. Hopefully, we will continue to improve in this area."

"The specialty teams were outstanding: Larry Welch performed well in his kicking, and Tony Urbanczyk did an outstanding job on punting."

### Munday Moguls To Host Rochester Steers Friday

The Munday Moguls will host the Rochester Steers, Friday night at 8:00 p. m. for the second game of the season.

While the Moguls were fighting the Seymour Panthers to a 13-13 tie the Steers were being blanked 42-0 by the Knox City Greyhounds.

### Spells Named Area Player Of The Week

Robert Spells, 195 pound senior who led the Munday Moguls' assault against the Seymour Panthers Friday night, earns the 1977 first Area Player of the Week Award, according to Vince Langford, sports writer on the Wichita Falls Record News. He had plenty of challengers among Class A and Class AA players of the area, extending north of the Red River. He was also named as player of the week in Tuesday's edition of the Abilene Reporter-News.

Langford said: "Last year, the 195-pound running back scored all three touchdowns as Munday beat Seymour for the first time since 1949, 21 to 8."

"Friday night, Spells gave an encore—and it was even better. He rushed for 214 yards on 25 carries, scored both Mogul touchdowns on runs of 46 and 42 yards, and blocked a Seymour extra point kick with 38 seconds left that would have given the Panthers a victory."

"That was one of his better games, Coach Jim Pope of the Moguls said. "His blocking was definitely better."

### Knox 4-H Clubs Offer Dynamic Youth Program

September of each year is the time that 4-H clubs are organized in Knox County. These clubs offer a dynamic program for the youth of our county, but before we discuss what 4-H actually is and does, let us see who is eligible to participate. Any youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are eligible for 4-H work, regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

4-H is a program of the Cooperative Extension Service offering an extensive array of activities for the youth of our county, whereby, they learn to work, plan and play together under skilled leadership. These young people are engaged in farming, homemaking, livestock, community or other general activities under the guidance of Cooperative Extension Agents and local volunteer leaders.

The 4-H club work is very instrumental in building qualities of leadership in youth, develops self-confidence, self-expression and pride of ownership. Youths are assisted in developing new interest, making new friends and establishing a unique relationship among fellow members and others alike. 4-H'ers learn a variety of practical skills through work with their projects or the community. Long range goals aid in development of good character and citizenship.

It should be emphasized that 4-H is not an exclusive club for the wealthy. The wide range of projects offered can be adapted to any economic group as the members can carry projects on any interest that they might have. The main requirement is the willingness to "learn by doing".

Some of the activities associated with 4-H are projects of their choice, method demonstrations, group actions, livestock shows, judging teams, horse shows, food and clothing shows, special events and recreation.

Meetings are held monthly throughout the school year and special activities during the summer. You are invited to join 4-H as members or adult volunteer leaders. Meeting dates, times and places will be explained by a circular letter distributed through the schools.

Police Report

### Health Clinic Set Sept. 14

The regular monthly health clinic, sponsored by the Munday Lions Club and the Texas Department of Public Health, will be held on Wednesday, September 14, beginning at 10 a. m. at the Munday Community Center.

Those desiring to be screened for blood pressure, diabetes and tuberculosis are urged to report at the clinic on the above date.

### WTU Granted Permit For Water Rights

A permit has been granted by the state Water Rights Commission for West Texas Utilities Co. to use water from Lake Kemp and Lake Diversion to operate a proposed coal-fired power plant.

Walter Meller, WTU generation engineer who attended a hearing before the commission this past week in Austin, said there was no opposition to the permit.

"This is just another step in the process of planning and eventually building what will be our company's largest generating plant, Meller said.

A contract for water rights in the two-lake system was signed last December by WTU, Wichita County Water Improvement District Number 2, and the City of Wichita Falls. The contract provides for WTU to consume up to 20,000 acre-feet of water per year for power generation. WTU plans to construct a 2,000-megawatt complex near one of the lakes, which are on Waggoner Ranch property south of Vernon and southwest of Wichita Falls.

Meller said a site study is "moving forward", and should be completed soon.

### Hutchinsons Employed By Munday Gin

The way was cleared on Tuesday, August 23, for the employment of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Hutchinson as managers of the Munday Gin and Seed, Inc.

Boyd Meers, chairman of the gin's board of directors, had announced earlier that the Hutchinsons had been employed subject to approval of the City Council for him to handle the gin position and maintain his position with the Munday ambulance service.

Both parties involved agreed in the belief that Bobby could handle both positions without interference with the ambulance service.

It was so noted in minutes of a called session of the City Council on August 23 that the ambulance service comes first, regardless of the gin's operation, including all duties, such as ambulance calls, vehicle maintenance, billing of patients, collection of accounts, etc.

Both Bobby and Pat will have a part in the gin's management and operations, with Pat being in complete charge when Bobby must make ambulance calls.

The Hutchinsons will continue to manage the Chickasha Elevator until after the maize harvest, then will relinquish their duties, it was stated.

Bobby and Pat have assumed their duties at the gin, and plans are going forward for making repairs and placing the gin in tip-top condition for the 1977 cotton harvest.

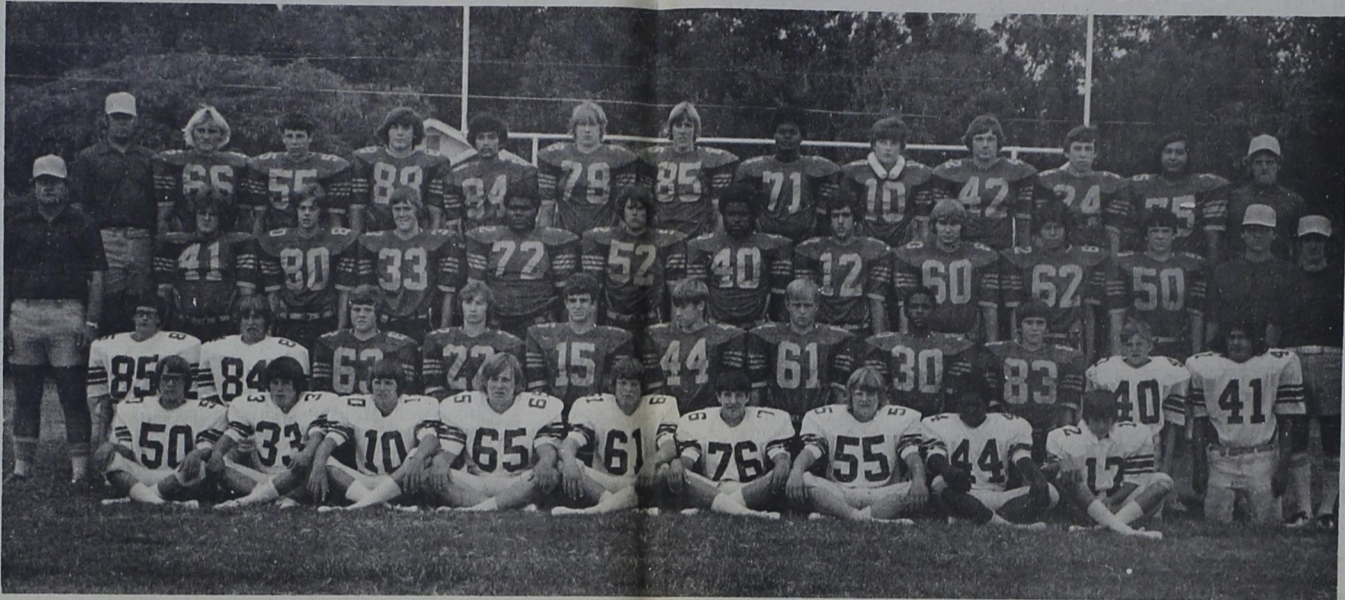

Sandy Gore of Vera and Leigh Ann McNitt of Benjamin served the guests at the reception.

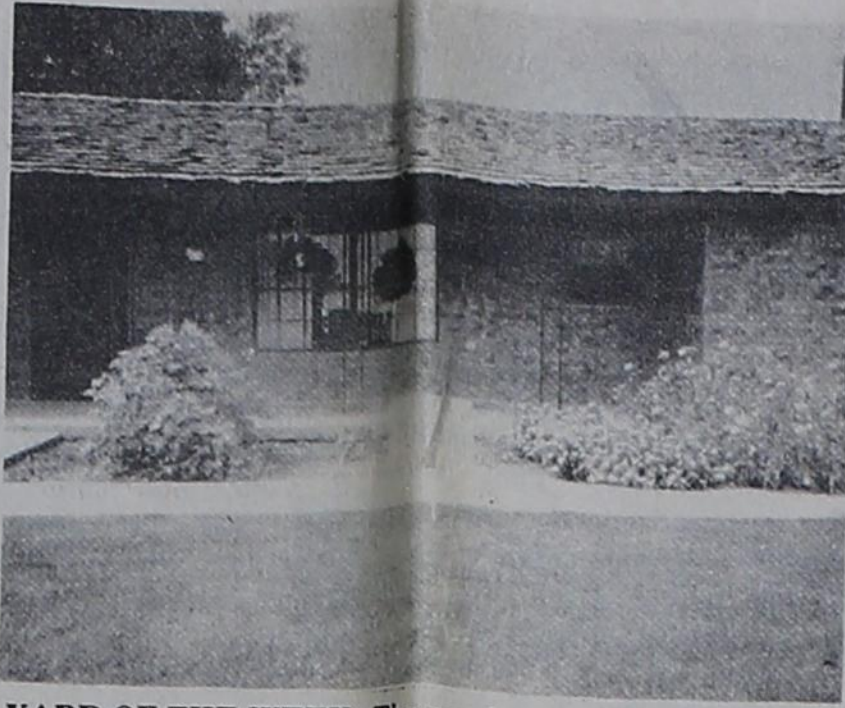
The bride is a graduate of Benjamin High School. The groom is a graduate of Knox City High School. He is employed by General Telephone Co. of the S.W. in Seymour.
