Banquet Highlights

In storage in the Chamber of Commerce office are two sets of hinged panels, the type used as "screens" in some places of business to screen off a given area. The front of these panels were formed into mock windows.

Callie Ann Combs, manager-secretary, envisioned use of these panels as a backdrop for the Chamber of Commerce banquet on Tuesday of last week. With the use of other storage items - butterflies and tulips - Callie Ann and

her helpers made these panels into four beautifully decorated windows, with the bottoms being formed into window boxes of tulips in bloom and with butterflies frolicking about in the upper portion.

Annelle Myers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billie Jake Myers, graciously consented to paint a mural to separate the panels. This work of art was entitled "Our water, yesterday, today and tomorrow."

Representing "yesterday" was a windmill situated in a rather arid area, furnishing water for livestock. For "today" the artist created an irrigation drainage canal, with tubing siphoning water from the canal onto growing crops. As "tomorrow" Annelle painted a lovely lake of water, representing the Millers Creek Reservoir that is furnishing soft water for the towns of Goree, Munday, Knox City and Haskell.

Centering the two panels was this artistic creation of Annelle's, and these formed a backdrop for the chamber banquet. Out-of-town guests at the banquet were from Knox City, Stamford, Seymour, Midland and Haskell.

The all-girl ensemble providing special music was composed of Sheri Adams, Christi Smith, Teresa Cypert, Linda Welch, Leslie Franklin and Zanelle Franklin.

People wondered what sort of speech Charles Thornhill of Haskell would have made if he'd had time to prepare for it!

It developed that guests from Austin failed to show up, having cancelled out because of turbulent weather conditions in this area. They could not get flight clearance out of Austin. Hon. Mark White, attorney general, and Hon. W. S. Healty, state representative, were booked for this flight.

It was revealed at the banquet that Thornhill was called at 5:20 p.m. by Robert Nix and urged to fill in for the banquet. He graciously consented, and was in Munday with a speech ahead of the 7 p.m. deadline!

He began by stating he wanted to share some ideas of what a community can and should do.

Among these was "desire" in the place of money - a willingness to buckle in and tackle a project, to develop an idea. Another was "dedication" because if we accomplish anything we must have dedication to a cause.

Still another was "integrity", which gives you the ability to live with yourself, even after success comes your way.

"Persistence" he also

cited, giving the names of many who refused to give up after repeated failures. Among whom were Woolworth, Thomas A. Edison, Willie Mayes, Abraham Lincoln and Columbus.

"Success", he said, "is not money or material things; it's what is important to you, and not what others term success."

A final attribute cited by the speaker was "commitment": a willingness to get involved in the community, committing yourself to success, to Munday and to the nation.

An interesting thought left the crowd: "If your mind can conceive it, and your heart believe it, then you can achieve it - because you are somebody!"

An added pleasure was the repeat performance of Miss Nancy Patterson, accomplished musician, who furnished inspirational organ music during the dinner period. She is claimed as "one of our very own", being the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Patterson, Jr.

Concluding his tenure of office, Billy Kingston reviewed a few of the accomplishments for this area: 1. completion of the Haskell-Knox underground water study, started in 1974, showing an abundant supply of water in the Seymour aquifer that is replenished by rainfall; 2. the heavy rains in early spring filled the great excavation east of Munday, thus completing the Miller Creek Reservoir, and 3. the same rain proving the true value of Munday's \$1 million drainage ditch in carrying water out of Munday and eliminating flooding conditions.

Robert Nix, new president, then pledged continued efforts to secure industry for Munday, to secure a doctor for the town, and for a successful membership drive in the near future. He asked the membership to get behind all beneficial projects.

Nix also presented the retiring president's plaque.

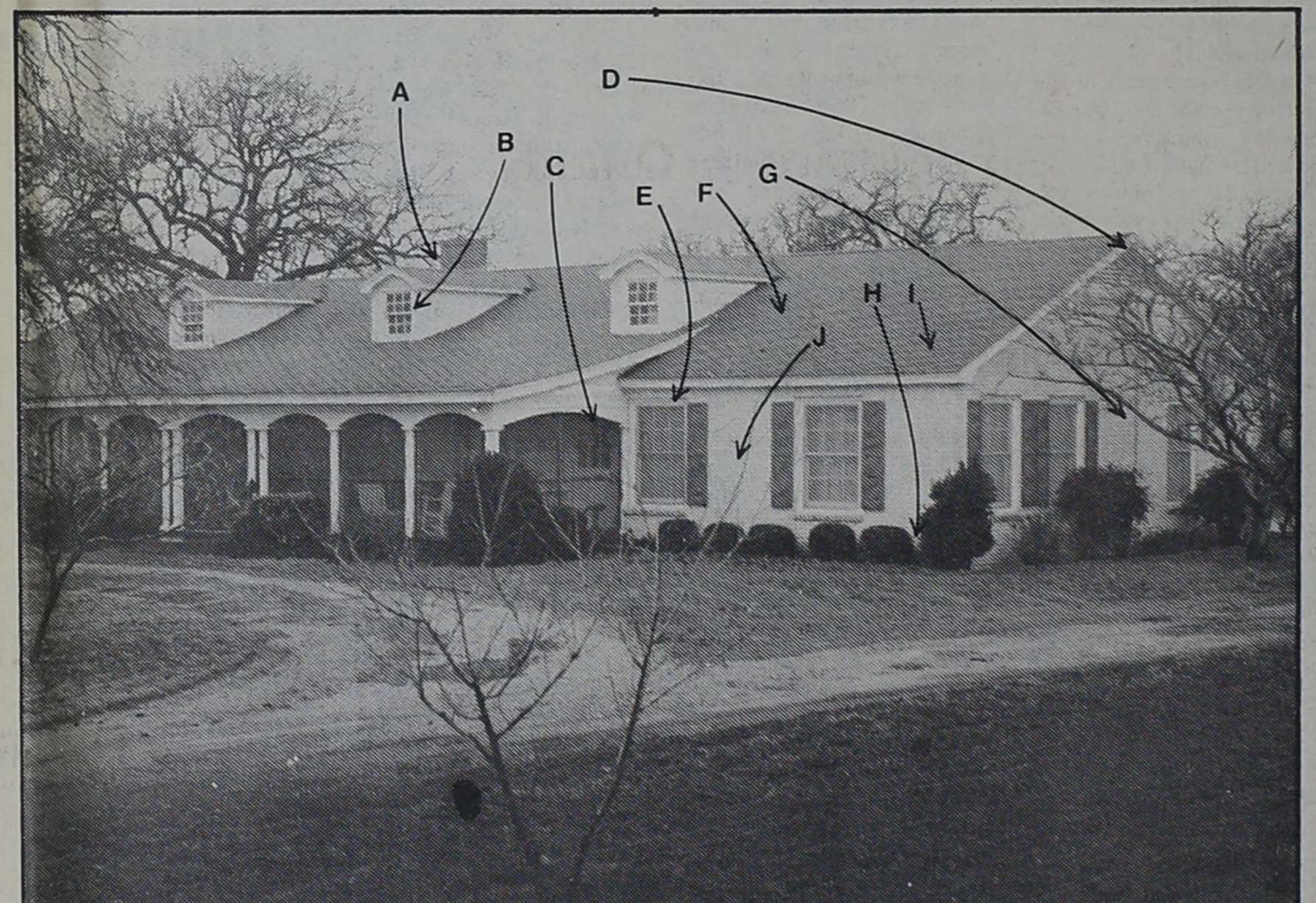

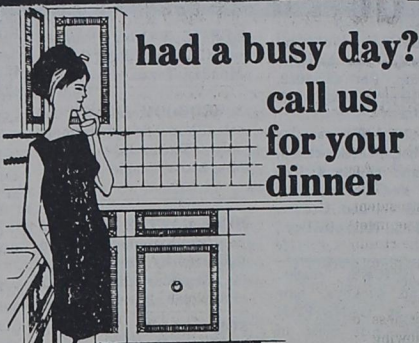

Check Social Security Earnings

A record of the earnings reported for every person who has worked in employment or self-employment covered by social security is maintained at social security headquarters, Mr. James H. Harper, Social Security Branch Manager in Vernon, said recently. The accuracy of these records depends in a large part on the accuracy of the reports made by employers. Starting with 1978 wages, reports are made just once a

year, using Form W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement). Before 1978, wages were reported four times a year.

Employees can check their copy of the W-2 Form to make sure their employer completed the form correctly and showed all earnings covered by social security if that figure is different than their total earnings.

If the employee has any question about whether the form is properly completed he or she should check with his or her employer.

People can also check their own social security earnings record to make sure their past earnings have been properly reported. All they have to do is ask for a copy of the postcard form 7004 at any social security office, fill it in, sign it, and mail it.

In return they will receive a form showing their earnings for recent years, along with total earnings reported since they started working under Social Se-

curity. If the information does not correspond with their own records, they should contact social security right away. They should furnish all the information available about their earnings.

People can get a Form 7004 at the Vernon Social Security Office, located at 1701 Cumberland. The telephone number is 817-552-9346. If you live in Childress, Paducah, or Quanah, you may call toll-free by dialing the operator and asking for enterprise 6-5013.

SMALL BREEDER FLOCK

A hen's nutrition is a vital element in the hatchability of her eggs, says a poultry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. When fully developed poultry embryos fail to hatch, it's usually because some essential element was missing from the hen's diet. Therefore, hens should be fed special "breeder" rations rather than "laying" rations.
