

Farmers who have trouble getting a good stand of cotton can improve their chances by following a few simple rules, says Dr. C. Wendell Horne,





### Tax Man Sam Sez

The Internal RevenueService computer is a meticulous machine. If the computer has to have a schedule or a form to support some statements it doesn't hesitate to ask for the missing documents. The IRS error report coming from the computer center in Austin points out that many North Texas taxpayers have started an unwanted correspondence session with the computer.
