






Floods, disaster, turmoil, foolishness, are-evaluation of the hippie movement! We don't know what it's com-




Death rode the route of Highway 277 as it entered the city limits of Munday at about 4a.m. Friday, resulting in the death of two men.

Killed in the crash of a large truck, operated by the J. H. Rose Truck Line Corp. of Houston were the driver, Gary F. Gale, 22, of Morris, Okla., and Freddie M. Carroll, 29, of McCamey, who was asleep in the truck's "sleeper."

The truck, entering the city limits from the northeast, failed to negotiate a curve in the highway just about three blocks north of Munday's city hall, crossed a bar ditch, broke a utility pole at the ground and crashed into a large tree as it overturned.





A resident of Wichita Falls for 12 years, Sharp was born March 23, 1909, in Hardeman and merchant.


