A brief resume of the three amendments are as follows:

Proposition No. 1: House Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The Secretary of State would appoint the number of notaries, and authorize terms of office at not less than two years nor more than four years.

Proposition No. 2: House Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive

department. Proposition No. 3: Senate Joint Resolution to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. This would allow the Legislature to provide for issue and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed

## Cotton Report

Cotton harvest operations have built up considerably at Abilene and through the cotton belt during the last ten days, reports B. B. Manly of the USDA Abilene Cotton Classing Office. Market prices dropped during the week ending October 26, from 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents per pound. Cotton brought 8 to 9 cents above the CCC loan rate, as the week ended. Grade 31, Staple 31, Mike 35 to 49 brought 55.25 to 55.75 cents per pound. Staple longer than 32 and cotton that miked below 35 were not in great demand, and did not bring as much premium over the government loan as the shorter staple. Grade 31, Staple 33, Mike 35 to 49 brought from 58.55 to 58.80 cents per

Samples classed this week totaled about 35,000, bringing the season total to around 70,000. At this date a year ago, 4,000 had been processed; however, two years ago on this date 222,000 had been processed. The crop two years ago was the largest this area ever produced, at around 850,000

Quality of samples processed showed changes reflected by new areas of production, other than the areas around Tom Green and Runnels Counties. The predominant qualities were as follows: Grade 31, 54 percent; Grade 40, 7 percent; Grade 41, 27 percent; and 4 percent Light Spotted. Staple lengths were: Staple percent; Staple 32, 43 percent; and Staple 33, 5 percent. Micronaire readings were 87 percent in the 35 to 49 category; with 11 percent below 35, and 3 percent above 49.

Fiber strength averaged 84,000 pounds per square inch for the week and 86,000 for the season. Cotton is considered strong with readings from 85,000 pounds per square inch and up.

the Moguls found themselves at the small end of a 6-0 score. The Wildcats, trying to win their first game of the season, shut down the Mogul offense in the first half and outgained their hosts throughout the game.

The third-quarter spurt by the Moguls, on two long drives, accounted for most of Munday's yardage and the advantage was too much for the fighting Wildcats. After taking the second half kickoff, the Moguls drove 65 yards in seven plays. Quarterback Randy Routon scored on a one-yard sneak to tie the game at 6-6.

Later in the period, Moses Dena, fullback, scored on a 38-yard run off left tackle, with his score capping a five-play, 61-yard drive. The defensive battle continued through the final period.

Steve White, Wildcat fullback, scored on a fouryard run off left tackle in the first stanza to give Crowell its brief lead. The score capped a five-play, 61-yard drive.

The Moguls now stand at 2-2 for 7-A District play, and 4-4 for the season.

The Wildcats remain winless, having 0-3 district play and 0-7 for the season. They outgained the Moguls in yardage, 184 to 179, and held the Moguls to eight first

Bids for the reconstruction and improvement of a bridge on Farm to Market Road 143 in Knox County will be included in the October Letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The existing narrow bridge on FM 143 at the Salt Fork of the Brazos River, approximately 6.5 miles east of the King County line, has become extensively salt damaged with resulting increased maintenance
