## Seymour Aquifer Has Unique Rechargability



OFFICIALS of state agencies and concerned citizens met in the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture office Friday to hear a report on the Seymour Aquifer as a result of an investigation by Rollin W. Harden and Associates. The report was published by the Texas Department of Water Resources. Seated left to right: C. R. Concerned citizens from Knox, Haskell and Baylor Counties met Friday in the Munday Chamber of Commerce to hear a report on the Seymour Aquifer as prepared by Rollin W. Harden of the contracting firm of Harden and Associates.

Dr. Bill Kingston, Chamber president, opened the meeting by welcoming guests and officials. He then introduced M. L. Wiggins who is chairman of the advisory committee for the three county survey. Others on the committee are Clint Norman and Callie Ann Combs, secretary Munday; Calvin Christian, Seymour; A. A. Cox Jr., O'Brien; and Joe B. Cloud, Rule.

Wiggins expressed his appreciation to the Texas Board of Water Resources and their staff for their work on the project. Also he commended Harden and his staff for their detailed study of the problems of the Aquifer and coming up with the answers the committee had wanted to hear.

Early in 1972 the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture met with Water Quality Board Officials, in Austin to express the concern of citizens of Knox, Haskell and Baylor Counties on pollution of the Seymour Aquifer.

State Representative W. S. 'Bill' Healy helped to initiate and obtain funding for the study after the Austin meeting. Senator Ray Farabee and Mr. Healy have monitored the study through regular semi-monthly progress reports.

Out of the concern of citizens of Haskell, Knox and Baylor Counties the Department of Water Resources and Water Quality Board realized the need for a study of the underground water supply in the Aquifer. Early in 1972 after deep concern was shown concerning the pollution the Texas Water Quality Board realized the need of such a survey. As an out growth of the boards concern for the value of the underground water supply Texas A&M Engineering and Extension service submitted a proposal to the board for a limited study of the Aquifer. The one year study was funded by the Texas Water Quality Board and did not answer all the question about quality and availability of water in the Aquifer, according to C. R. Miertschin, Director of Enforcement and Field Operations Division of Texas Department of Water Resources. The Texas Water Quality Board then entered into a contract with Rollin W. Harden and Associates to do a detailed study of the Aquifer.

An agency advisory committee of state departments and a citizens advisory committee composed the two groups that worked closely together for forty months compiling information on the Aquifer. Mr. Miertschin said, "I would like to extend my appreciation to these two groups for their cooperation and assistance in obtaining the information required to do such a complete and significant report."

In May of 1975, Rollin Harden and Associates began their study of the Aquifer. Harden opened his part of the meeting by stating, "We

## Area Pastors To Speak At Double Mountain Area Conference

The Area-Wide Evangelism Conference of the Baptist Double Mountain Area will be held January 29, 1979 in the First Baptist Church, Stamford. The meeting will be held in two sessions, the first at 2:00 p.m. and the evening session at 7:00 p.m. A rehearsal will be held at 6:00 p.m. for the combined choir.

Dr. Bailey E. Smith, Pastor of First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, Oklahoma will be the principle speaker for both sessions.

Smith, a native of Dallas, graduated from Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas in 1962 and from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Ft. Worth in 1966. He has served churches in Texas, Arkansas and New Mexico, where he was pastor of the State's largest Baptist Church, First Baptist Church of Hobbs. He served his last two previous pastorates, First Baptist Church, Warren, Arkansas and First Baptist Church, Hobbs, New Mexico, as the youngest man to hold that position in the history of those two churches.

In December of 1973, he was called to be the pastor of the 6,600 member church, First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, Oklahoma, the states largest church, ranked fourth in the Southern Baptist Convention in membership. The church has the second largest church training attendance in the convention and led the Southern Baptist Convention in baptisms every year he has been at First Southern Baptist Church, going over 1,000 three of the five years.



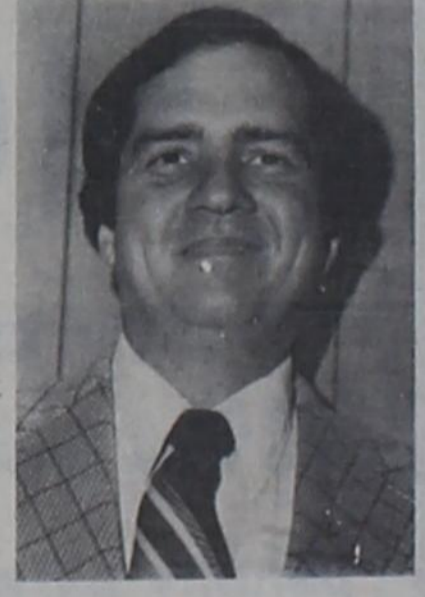

Winston Wilson of Quannah, vice president of the National Wheat Growers Association, spoke to Tuesday's meeting of the Munday Lions Club. He was accompanied to Munday by his father, Woodrow Wilson, and Howard Cook, a former Munday resident.

The speaker, who was introduced by Kenneth Baker, monthly program chairman, gave an interesting and informative discussion on agricultural prices and inflation. He mentioned two of the primary causes of low grain prices as government spending levels and trade deficits.

He emphasized that farmers are still selling grain at prices below the cost of production, and among the remedies mentioned were increased quantities of exports and increased price levels for exports.

are particularly proud about two things in the report. Number one, being part of bringing the news about how much water is in the Aquifer. Several months ago believing this area might dry up, we also started out believing how much pollution is out there and are we in trouble over a long haul or not. I am happy to tell you these conditions look very favorable in the area of quantity and quality. First of all there is about fifty thousand acre feet of water from rainfall that soaks into the formation every year. Also water quality pictures look very good. The general water quality looks very good for normal use, and irrigation. There are some places where there have been past problems, mostly those are the results of past activity and not anything happening now.

"There is no way we can dry up without pumping considerably more water than we have in the past," Harden stated.

Harden thanked the electric companies, W. P. Hise Drilling Co., Texas Railroad Commission and citizens for their cooperation in obtaining information for the study. Stamford Electric Co-Op, B-K Electric Co-Op and West Texas Utilities opened their records to the contracting firm to study the usage of electricity on irrigation wells. Mr. Hise notified the firm when he drilled a well so they could study the results. The Railroad Commission worked closely with the firm in regard to areas of past pollution.

Officials said most of the pollution in the Aquifer occurred in the first years of farming in the area where the nitrates were stirred up. Pollution occurring in the Aquifer is from these early years and no evidence shows man made pollution from fertilizers and septic tanks to any degree at this time.

Robert Bluntzer of the

Texas Department of Water Resources commented on the water study. "This study resulted in one of the best water products I've seen in a long time and I've been in the water business 16 years."

## Substitutes For Cooking Emergencies

Emergency substitutes can help save the homemaker that gets caught in the middle of preparing a recipe without all of the basic ingredients. For a quick reference, tack the following list in the cabinet or cookbook and don't panic:

### INGREDIENT SUBSTITUTIONS

**For 1 tablespoon flour [used as thickener]** - Substitute 1/2 tablespoon cornstarch, potato starch, or arrowroot starch, or 1 tablespoon quick-cooking tapioca.

**1 cup sifted all-purpose flour** - 1 cup unsifted all-purpose flour minus 2 tablespoons.

**1 cup sifted cake flour** - 7/8 cup sifted all-purpose flour, or 1 cup minus 2 tablespoons sifted all-purpose flour.

**1 cup corn syrup** - 1 cup sugar plus 1/4 cup liquid (use whatever liquid the recipe calls for).

**1 cup honey** - 1 1/4 cups sugar plus 1/4 cup liquid (use whatever liquid the recipe calls for).

**1 ounce chocolate** - 1 tablespoon cocoa plus 1 tablespoon fat.

**1 cup butter** - 1 cup margarine, or 7/8 to 1 cup hydrogenated fat plus 1/2 teaspoon salt, or 7/8 cup lard plus 1/2 teaspoon salt.

**1 cup whole milk** - 1 cup reconstituted nonfat milk plus 2 1/2 teaspoons butter or margarine, or 1/2 cup evaporated milk plus 1/2 cup water, or 1/4 cup sifted dry whole milk powder plus 7/8 cup water.

**1 cup coffee cream [20 percent]** - 3 tablespoons butter plus about 7/8 cup milk.

**1 cup heavy cream [40 percent]** - 1/3 cup butter plus about 3/4 cup milk.

**1 cup buttermilk or sour milk** - 1 tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice plus enough sweet milk to make 1 cup (let stand 5 minutes), or 1-3/4 teaspoons cream of tartar plus 1 cup sweet milk.

**1 teaspoon baking powder** - 1/4 teaspoon baking soda plus 5/8 teaspoon cream of tartar, or 1/4 teaspoon baking soda plus 1/2 cup fully soured milk or buttermilk, or 1/4 teaspoon baking soda plus 1/2 teaspoon vinegar or lemon juice used with sweet milk to make 1/2 cup, or 1/4 teaspoon baking soda plus 1/4 to 1/2 cup molasses.

**1 whole egg** - 2 egg yolks, or 3 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon thawed frozen egg, or 2 tablespoons and 2 teaspoons dry whole egg powder plus an equal amount of water.

**1 egg yolk** - 3 1/2 teaspoons thawed frozen egg yolk, or 2 tablespoons dry egg yolk plus 2 tablespoons water.

**1 egg white** - 2 tablespoons thawed frozen egg white, or 2 teaspoons dry egg white plus 2 tablespoons water.

**NOTE:** The amounts of corn syrup and honey are based on the way these products are used in recipes and not on the sweetness equivalence with sugar.

## Study Of Aquifer Has Been Published

The Texas Department of Water Resources has published a new report on the water quality and the availability of ground water in the Seymour aquifer in Haskell and Knox Counties.

The report is the result of an investigation by R. W. Harden and Associates, under contract since 1975 with the Texas Water Quality Board and the successor agency, the Texas Department of Water Resources.

A purpose of the report is to provide for comprehensive understanding of the water quality of the Seymour aquifer; the past, present, and potential sources of pollution to the aquifer due primarily to mineralized water; and the future quality and availability of water from the aquifer.

Focus of the report is on that part of the Seymour Formation located principally in northwestern Haskell County and Southern Knox County.

The study area represents a single hydrological unit of the Seymour aquifer covering approximately 274,500 acres. The aquifer furnishes fresh ground water for municipal, domestic, and stock supplies, for over 2,000 irrigation wells. The aquifer is the only available source of moderate to large quantities of fresh ground water in the area.

Analyses of pumpage, water levels, and precipitation data over the past 20 years indicate nearly 50,000 acre-feet of water per year is available for pumping by wells from the aquifer without a change in storage in this ground-water reservoir. (An acre-foot of water is the amount of water that would cover an acre to a depth of one foot.)

About 2 percent of the water in the Seymour Aquifer is estimated to be affected by pollution. The report recommends new and more extensive long-term monitoring programs to determine effects on water quality from specific pollution sources.

Based on reports, records, and analyses from state agencies and the U. S. Geological Survey, and with new field data and a pollution source inventory, the report evaluates needs for pollution prevention measures. Maps, graphs, and tables detail the investigation findings.

Planning for the report involved state agency personnel and citizen advisory participation. Agency representatives were from the Texas Department of Water Resources, the Texas Department of Health, and the Texas Railroad Commission. U. S. Geological Survey records were also used in the investigation. The planning, the investigation, and the report are intended

## Changes In Food Stamp Program Causes Confusion

Some confusion has resulted from changes in the food stamp program that went into effect Jan. 1, regional officials of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) report.

Southwest region FNS in Dallas, Texas, notes that its field offices in Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas are getting questions from grocers and their food stamp customers on several program revisions. There is some confusion stemming from food stamp usage where cash change, hot foods purchase, bottle deposits and "cents-off" coupons are concerned.

The agency has explained its regulations about each of those items. Up to 99 cents cash may now be given in change to food stamp customers. When the change due is more than 99 cents, unendorsed \$1 food stamps will be given to the food stamp customer. Grocers are no longer to give due bills, credit slips or tokens to make change for food stamps. They are, however, required to honor all such due bills, credit slips and tokens given in change prior

to Jan. 1.

Hot foods ready for immediate consumption may not be paid for with food stamps at retail stores. Authorized meal services for communal dining facilities for the elderly and institutions that serve meals to drug addicts and alcoholics are not affected by the 'hot foods' provision.

Deposits on containers, (such as milk bottles) may be paid for with food stamps when the containers hold items eligible for purchase with food stamps.

In the matter of cents-off coupons, they are to be redeemed for food stamp customers in the same manner as they are for cash

customers. If cash customers are given cash, food stamp customers should receive cash for their cents-off coupons. If the cents-off coupon value is deducted from the cost of the item for cash customers, it should be deducted for food stamp customers.

## Curtailment Not A Concern To Most Lone Star Customers

## Hearing Set For Textbook Proclamation

Texans will have an opportunity next month to make their views known concerning the proposed proclamation calling for textbooks before the annual process begins this year.

A committee of the State Board of Education has scheduled a public hearing on the textbook proclamation in Austin on February 8. The proclamation calling for new materials to be considered for adoption for the 1980-81 school year will be issued by the Board at its March meeting.

The hearing will begin at 1 p.m. in the Board Room, Riverside North building of the office complex occupied by the Texas Education Agency at 150 E. Riverside Drive. Members of the Committee on Programs and Personnel Development and other members of the Board will be present.

Persons wishing to speak are asked to notify Dr. M. L. Brockett, Commissioner of Education, no later than February 2. Time allocations will be determined at the hearing.

**TEXAS TALK**

**Foilar fertilization is not making A's.** University experts are not giving high marks to foilar fertilization and some are saying their results in 1977 were "unencouraging". Cliff Spies, Purdue agronomist, says foilar application of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and sulfur should be considered "experimental" and he doesn't recommend their application by this method yet. On soybeans, for instance, Spies says that "economic response is likely to be very small at present soybean prices." John Hanway, Iowa State University agronomist, obtained good yield increases with soybeans in experiments in 1974-1976, but this year's tests showed no yield response. However, Hanway says with conviction, "there is a real potential here if we can learn how to use it." Several Cornbelt states had studies going in 1977 with mixed results. University of Illinois agronomists say results of their foilar feeding experiments were "not encouraging." So, it's back to the drawing board.

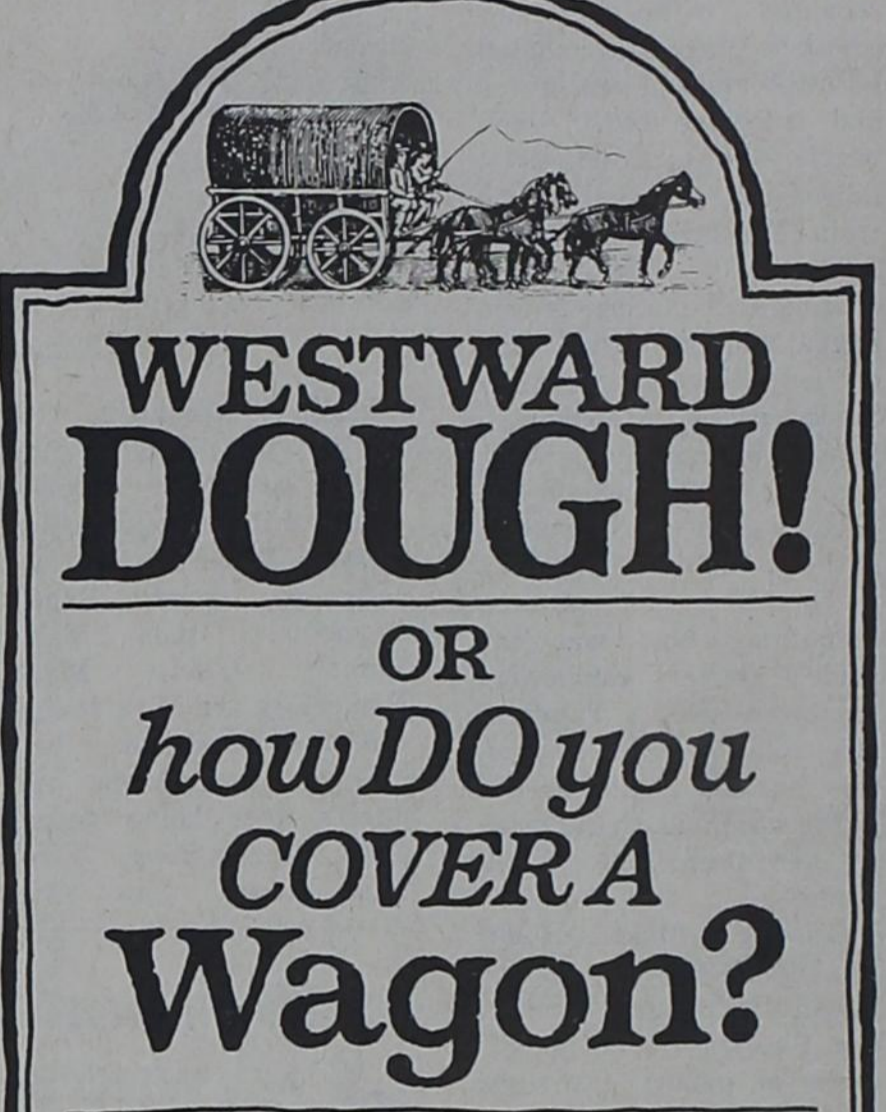

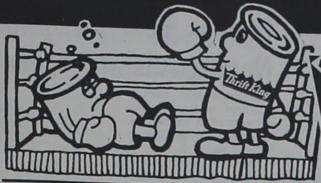

## Back Taxes Being Collected

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said his office has collected nearly three-quarters of a million dollars in back taxes with a computerized system that denies paychecks to anyone owing the state money.

Bullock said by using modern electronics his office will automatically withhold a warrant or paycheck to persons or businesses who have a tax delinquency.

"If they owe us money and we owe them money, our computer will kick out the state warrant and we can hold it until the debt is cleared," he said.

He said during the past six months the program identified more than 26,341 businesses who owed taxes and collected \$729,663 in overdue taxes.

Bullock said most of those owing back taxes settle up quickly so that their warrants will be released.

October sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Knox County were reported today by County Bond Chairman M. L. Wiggins. Sales for the tenth-month period totaled \$86,665.00 for 48% of the 1978 sales goal of \$180,000.00.

fiberglass with plants in it. It was much more. It had three separate rooms, each 20' x 40' with a 8' x 10' store room on the west side. The greenhouse had a heating and cooling unit for each room. Mr. Dillon pointed out that without the cooling system it would get up to 50 degrees hotter in the greenhouse rooms than the outside temperature in the summer. He also discussed the watering and fertilizing system.

A sterile soil mixture is made with a cement mixer. The soil is a mixture of peat moss, vermiculite and ready earth.

Outside the greenhouse, Mr. Dillon showed us the lath house, cold frames, and the orchard. Each tree in the orchard is watered with a low pressure emitter that is underground. The greenhouse was very interesting and we thank Mr. Dillon for giving us such a good tour.

Grade 42 continued as the predominant quality classed this week with 41 percent. Grade 52 accounted for 20 percent and grade 41 was 18 percent. Eleven percent was grade 51. About 34 percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade because of bark or grass. The predominant fiber length was staple 32 with 78 percent. Micro-naire readings in the base range of 35 to 49 dropped from 69 percent last week to 66 percent this week.

Twenty-five percent tested in the 30 to 34 range and 9 percent was below 30. About 6100 samples were classed during the week ending January 19, bringing our season total to 54,100.

funds from the state treasury. The Committee also has jurisdiction over all

matters pertaining to claims and accounts filed with the legislature against the state, unless jurisdiction is granted to another standing committee.

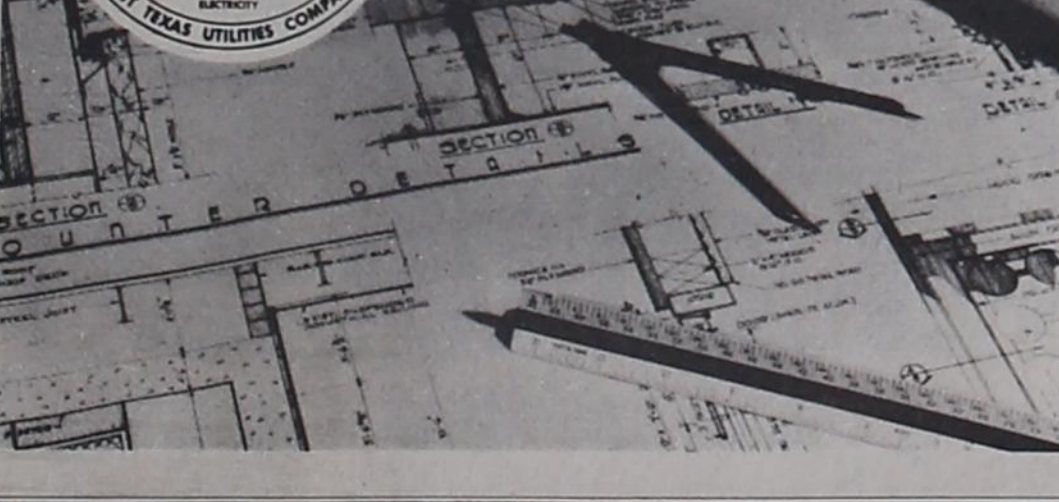
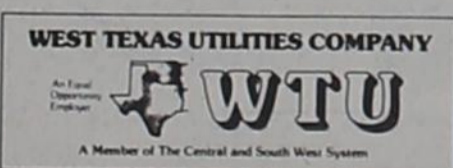
