Look To The East

Depressions have a devastating effect on people, and things!

But they are kinda like the bad penny, or the domesticated cat that was hauled away and left by the roadside miles away--they keep coming back!

We reckon we've never been entirely void of a depression in our lifetime, though they didn't bother us much in our earlier years. That was something for the older folks, those in charge of keeping their offspring fed and clothed through it all.

That's why, we think, our father had most of his hair come out, and that which remained to turn grey almost overnight. There might not have been a county-wide, or a community-wide depression, but he could work himself into a depression at most any given time. All he needed to do was to walk over the crops on Sundays, and notice them withering away for lack of moisture.

If it was outside the family realm and took in a wide area, most everyone was in the same shape the Edgar family was--just all in the same boat--so we just worked away at doing the best we could without actually realizing the effects of a depression.

Our first experience at a depression was during the "great depression" in the early 1930's. This was a nationwide affair!

Banks were closed, and money was hard to come by. Ours was one of many communities that tried to "save face" by issuing "script" money that was good only in this certain community.

Hunger lines formed at Red Cross centers, where people received a portion of the available rations and did without the remaining necessities.

It was then that we who could splurge for a box of shotgun shells drove the roadsides and wheat fields at night, shooting jackrabbits. We'd bring our "kill" to the local ice plant, where the animals were rationed out to those in dire need.

We were told at the time that jack-rabbit sausage became a pretty tasty dish!

The big depression gave way to a recession, which appeared to be just as bad; or, maybe worse! It was about that time that President Roosevelt issued his famous statement: "All we have to fear is fear itself."

Things began picking up! The following article which we salvaged from some of our deep files might lead us to believe this was all a state of mind, but our mind can't take it. The article is headed: "How to Invite a Depression". Here it is:

A man lived by the side of the road and sold hotdogs. He was hard of hearing so he had no radio. He had trouble with his eyes so he read no newspapers. But he sold good hot dogs.

He put up signs on the highways telling how good they were. He stood by the side of the road and cried: "Buy a hot dog, mister." And people bought.

He increased his meat and bun orders. He bought a bigger stove to take care of his trade. He got his son home from college to help him. But then something happened....

His son said, "Father, haven't you been listening on the radio? There's a depression on. The European situation is terrible. The domestic situation is worse."

Whereupon the father thought, "Well my son's been to college. He reads the paper and he listens to the radio, and he ought to know."

So the father cut down on his meat and bun orders, took down his advertising signs, and no longer bothered to stand out on the highway to sell hot dogs. And his hot dog sales fell almost overnight.

"You're right, son," the father said to the boy. "We certainly are in the middle of a great depression!"

So, if you think we are in a depression, stop and try to figure out if it's man-made, men-made, by act of Congress, or by some other method. It could ease our mind somewhat to know that we didn't cause it!

Chances are that, if we'll get down to the nitty-gritty, take our belts up

Douglas Myers Resigns As School Superintendent

Douglas Myers, superintendent of the Munday Public Schools since 1966, announced at the closing minutes of the school board's January meeting that he plans to retire at the close of this school year, May 31, 1982. He requested that he be released from the remaining year of his contract so he may retire. The board approved Mr. Myers' request with reluctance.

Myers will close his 16 years as superintendent of the local schools, and end 33 years in the teaching profession. Together, he and Mrs. Myers have chalked up almost 60 years as teachers. Mrs. Myers took a leave of absence for 13 years to devote her time to family and home.

A graduate of Jonesboro (Coryell County) High School in 1943, Myers entered the service of his country, serving from 1943 until 1946. He received his B. S. degree (1949) and his Master of Education degree (1953) from North Texas State University.

Beginning his teaching career in 1949, he was associated with the Weinert Schools for 17 years, three years as teacher and elementary school principal, one year as teacher and high school principal, and 13 years as school superintendent.

He came to the Munday schools as superintendent in 1966, and is completing

Three Items Covered At Special Council Meeting

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met January 7, 1982, at 7:00 p.m. in special session at the Munday City Hall.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen M. M. Booe, Ray Lynn Hardin, Donald Hobert, Larry Smith and A. Dale Selzer.

Members absent: none.

First item of business was Lone Star Gas rate increase request. After discussion of request by the Gas company and recommendations by City advisor, Councilman Smith made the motion that the City grant Lone Star Gas a 15% increase with no minimum monthly bill and no automatic rate adjustment clause. Councilman Booe seconded the motion and the motion passed, all members voting for.

Leon Ivey, local representative of the gas company, then was informed of the City's action. Mr. Ivey agreed to pass the Council's action along to his company and report back to the Mayor.

Next item was the pending Austin hearing on the permit for the Shamrock Supper Club. Councilman Hobert made the motion that the City send Mayor Reid as the official representative for the City of Munday. Motion seconded by Councilman Booe, all members voting for.

The final item was a request by Ida Jo Adams to discuss use of free irrigation water from the City sewer plant. Mrs. Adams protested the City allowing

Chalmer Hobert the use of the water. Mayor Reid explained that Chalmer Hobert had used the water since January 1977. Chalmer Hobert was first allowed to use the water because the previous user, a tenant on the land Mrs. Adams now owns, did not use the sewer water on a timely bases, causing dike breakage and spills and many complaints from rural homeowners in the area. Mayor Reid attempted to explain to Mrs. Adams that since Chalmer Hobert had taken over the use of the water these problems had been eliminated since Mr. Hobert cooperates with the City to use the water whenever asked, even though the crops on his land don't need the irrigation. Mayor Reid also attempted to explain to Mrs. Adams that the water has to be used when the City requests, that the City doesn't have the storage to hold water for use when it would be best for the farmer. Chalmer Hobert has cooperated fully in helping the City and helping to stop previous water problems at the sewer farm. Mrs. Adams did not accept the explanations offered by Mayor Reid and stated if the City will not grant her the right to water from the sewer farm, she will file suit against the City. Mrs. Adams then left the meeting.

Councilman Smith then made a motion that the City pay Mr. Hobert a portion of his costs in laying a pipeline to use the sewer water. Motion died for a lack of second.

Selzer made the motion to adjourn, seconded by Smith. Passed.

FEBRUARY 10, LAST DATE Munday City Hall To Stop Tax Collection Soon

Due to passage of new laws by the Texas Legislature requiring a single appraisal district in each county to set rates for all property of all taxing jurisdictions, the City Council of Munday has signed an agreement with Knox County Appraisal District for the appraisal of the City property tax roll; preparation notices, and collection of all taxes for the City of Munday, Texas. This will include both current and delinquent taxes.

Due to the above agreement, taxes can no longer be paid at the Munday City Hall after February 10, 1982. After this date, city taxes will need to be paid to Knox County Appraisal District. A notice in another section of The Courier this week will provide the taxpayer with an address to which they may mail their taxes, or they may pay in person. The Appraisal District offices are in the Knox County courthouse in Benjamin.

Walter Hertel, city administrator, stated, "We remind the taxpayer also that the current 1981 taxes are due and payable by January 31, 1982. After this date it will be necessary by law to charge penalty."

Bank's Deposits Go Higher!

Despite adverse conditions in agriculture and ranching in most areas of Texas and the nation, with "money crops" failing in many instances to show profits to operators, deposits in the First National Bank in Munday reflect a healthy condition in general.

The bank's deposits, shown in a statement issued in response to a call by the Comptroller of Currency in Washington D. C., as of December 31, 1981, continue an upward climb.

A condensed statement released to The Courier last week showed the bank's deposits at the beginning of 1982, at \$22,906,532.93, which is possibly an all-time high.

The statement issued early in 1981, showed deposits at \$19,092,334.68. The present statement shows an increase of \$6,413,000 in deposits for the year just closed.

The local bank maintains a capital stock of \$200,000 and a surplus of \$300,000. Undivided profits were shown at \$1,285,076.28.

Two light showers, coming briefly on Thursday and Friday, caused wheat and small grains to perk up a bit after receiving a wee bit of moisture.

Hightower To Seek Fifth Term

Congressman Jack Hightower (D-Vernon), who has represented the 13th District since 1975, has announced he will seek a fifth two-year term.

He has filed officially as a candidate in the Democratic Primary.

"I believe my conservative philosophy and common-sense approach to the complex national problems we face represent the views of the vast majority of the people of this area," Hightower said.

Hightower was a founding member of the Conservative Democratic Forum in the House, which advocates conservative tax and budget policies. He joined other conservative Democrats in supporting the major elements of the Administration's budget and tax reduction program in 1981.

"President Reagan received a nationwide mandate to reverse spending policies which have driven the nation into excessive debt while imposing high taxation on the people," he said. "This is a bipartisan program and I believe it is imperative that Democrats and Republicans work together to restore our economic strength."

At the same time, Hightower pointed out that "I disagree with the disastrous agricultural policies of the Regan Administration just as I disagreed with the Carter Administration." He also said he will continue to oppose any effort by the administration to reduce Social Security retirement benefits.

He added: "This indicates how important it is to have a Congressman who is independent from partisan pressures. I've never asked the President how to vote and I've never asked Speaker O'Neill how to vote. I make up my own mind based on what is good for this district and the nation. I do not think the people of our district want a rubber-stamp Congressman for any President or any political party."

Hightower said his experience in local, state and national government, his seniority in Congress and his key committee assignments have enabled him to effectively influence decisions in Washington. He is a ranking member of the powerful House Appropriations Committee which played a central role in reducing government spending this year. He also serves on the appropriations subcommittees for the Agriculture, Commerce, Justice and State Departments and the Judiciary.

Hightower listed interest rates, crime, immigration, social security and farm problems among his 1982 priorities.

"One of the keys to bringing down interest rates is to reduce the impending budget deficit in the next few years," he said.

Hightower pledged he "will continue to fight to make the government serve the people and not the other way around."

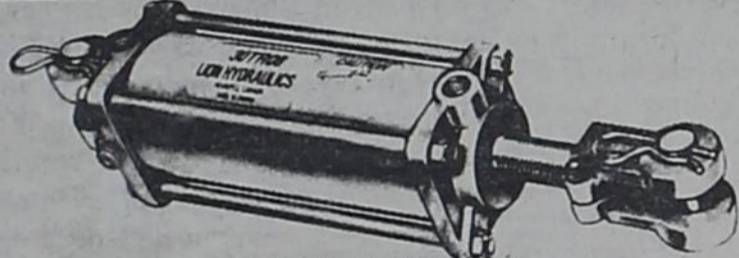

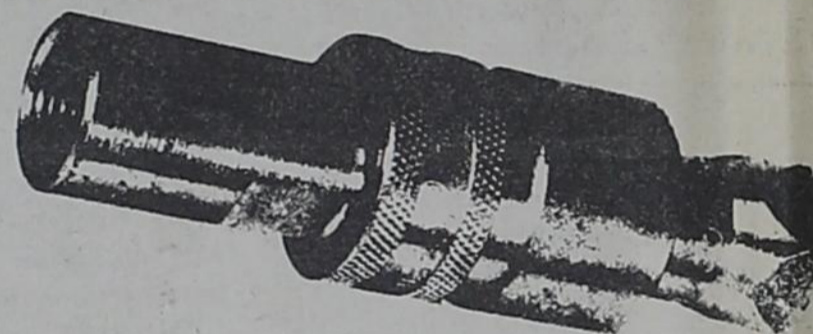

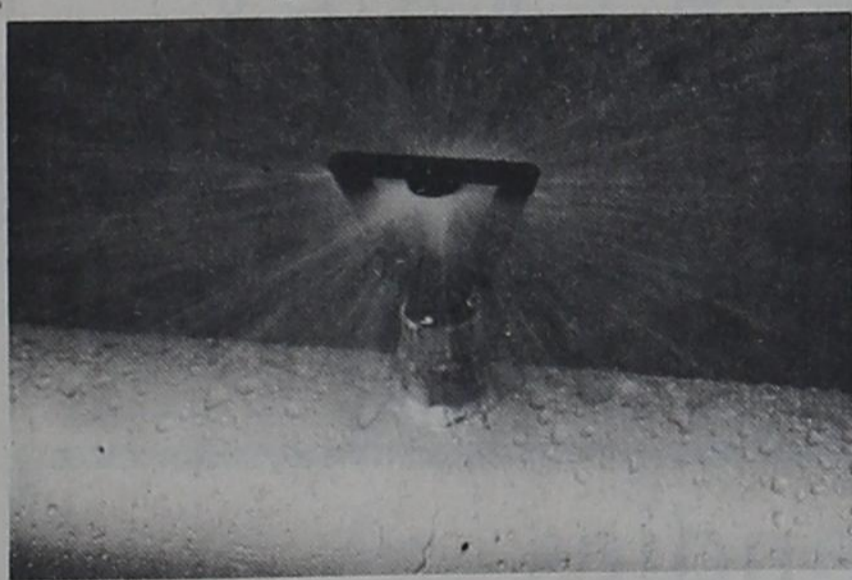
