

How It's Done in Other States Some of them do it much more arbitrarily and brusquely than he would have it done in Texas. One apparently popular method it to give every county at least one member of a fixed number that is only slightly larger than the number of counties. Arkansas is one of these. Every one of it's seventy-five counties has by the Constitution's prescription at least one member of a House of 100 members, so that there is a surplusage of only twenty-five for distribution among the counties having populations in excess of the average. Texas, of course could not do that unless indeed, it were willing to reduce the number of it's counties greatly; for elsewise it would almost double the size of a body that is already much too large. But in other ways it can inflate the political power of the rural vote or, what seems the same end, deflate the political power of the urban vote, and Mr. Moffett overwhelmed the opposition with documentry proof that if it did do it would be acting rather conventionally than radically.



TODAY AND TOMORROW

GOLD-since 1493

According to the United States Bureau of Mines all the gold that has seen mined in the world since any kind of records have been kept; that s, from 1493, the year after Columbus discovered America, down to date, amounts to a little over a thousand million ounces. At \$20 an ounce that s worth twenty billion dollars, and more than half of it is still in the form of money or gold bars held in banks as security for money.

In the United States, since 1792, we have mined about 226 million ounces, worth above \$4,600,000,000; and that, curiously enough, is just about the amount of monetary gold still in this

In the same 450 years of gold proluction the amount of silver mined in he world was a fraction more than lifteen thousand million ounces; and the ratio of silver to gold in the world's monetacy system before sitver was dropped by one country after another, was just about fifteen to

Silver is coming back as money, out it is more likely to arrive at a ratio of about twenty to twenty-five o one than the traditional "sixteen to one" of the old Populist days. POPULATION-needed growth

The United States could support probably ten times the population we now have. It used to be all that ninetenths of the population could do to produce food enough for the tentenths, now it takes the time and work of only a fifth, perhaps less, to eed everybody.

Population in the United States is almost standing still. Unless there is an unexpected upturn in the birth rate or we open our doors again to immigrants from Europe, we shall find ourselves still less dependent on the producers of food.

It looks to me as if food farming. n any important scale, will be a hing of the past in fifty or a hunired years from now. More people ill live in the country, but fewer will e engaged in trying to make money out of growing food. They will get their cash from other forms of labor and of products of the land. LAND-what it will earn

What is good farm land worth An English friend told me not long age that the best land in England. where the average production per acre of all crops is much higher than in America, the markets are at the oor, the growing season is muc onger and the climate generally more favorable, can be bought for \$100 or less per acre, when it can be bought at all. With an experience of two thousand years behind them, English farmers are pretty likely to know what values are.

I doubt whether any land in America can earn interest on a very much higher valuation than that, except in a very few highly favored spots and then only by intensive cultivation of high-priced perishable fruits and garden truck.

One of the principal causes of nuch of the present trouble of farmers is that they paid, or promised to pay, more for their land than it was worth, and their mortgages represent more than the actual value. Land, like anything else, is worth only what it will earn.
