reducing cotton acreage on the plan made avail-

The rapid advance in the price of cotton during the past few weeks is declared by practically all authorities to be due to the activity of the Department of Agriculture in reducing acreage, and it is predicted that if the plan is successful there will be still further sharp advances in the price of cotton. These same authorities are equally positive that should this plan meet with failure the price of cotton will drop to the six cent level, which will represent the price range at which this crop will be sold this fall. While the plan may not be perfect, it represents the only hope for the cotton farmer of the Southland, and it is gratifying to note that farmers everywhere are giving their hearty cooperation to the movement. There is nothing compulsory, but the failure of this plan will make any future plans far more difficult to carry out, and upon the farmer rests the full responsibility of success or failure in this movement as well as future movements designed to bring relief.

To our way of thinking, with acreage reduced along the lines set by the Department of Agriculture and the restoration of a living price for the staple a buying-power will be created that will completely wipe out the 13 million bale surplus, and with this surplus wiped out the farmer will face the future with hope and confidence. If on the other hand, the farmers fail to join in the movement, the outlook promises very nttle hone.

### Taxes ....

N TEXAS the natural gas industry and ultimately the gas consumers are required to pay four special tax levies to the state as follows:

Under one article of the state statutes, the gas companies pay an annual franchise tax. Under another article, gas distribution companies are required to pay a tax of one-half of one per cent of their gross receipts in all cities and towns with a population of from 2,500 to 10,000, and one per cent of their gross receipts in towns of over 10,000 population. Under still another article, a gross production tax of two per cent is levied upon all natural gas, and under a further article gas pipeline companies are required to pay a gas utilities tax of one-fourth of one per cent of their gross receipts."

The natural gas utilities are required to pay to the state two special tax levies which no other utility is required to pay. In addition to the various special taxes collected by the state, the gas utilities are required to pay many other tax levies, such as Federal Income Tax, Revenue Stamp Tax, Ad Valorem taxes levied by Road Districts, Water Improvement Districts, Levee Districts, Independent School Districts, and the Ad Valorem tax levies made for the support of the various city, county and state governments.

This company is willing to pay, and should pay, its just share of the reasonable cost of government; however, there appears to be a constant and growing tendency on the part of some tax assessors, tax boards and tax commissions to increase the values and raise the taxes of the gas utilities entirely out of proportion to the values and the taxes levied upon other personal property. Ultimately, this must result in a higher price for gas to the consumer. Under the present burden of taxation it requires approximately 56c out of every bill rendered to the gas consumer to pay taxes. Such taxes must be charged as an operating expense to the customer, because the company cannot control this expense and is merely a collector of the tax.
