

THESE MEN AT THE TOP

WHERE will a man ever get, you ask, if he delivers twice as much as he is paid to deliver? The answer is that unless he's a fool he will probably get to and stay at the top. I remember once traveling from Chicago to New York on the Twentieth Century

Limited. We were due in the Grand Central Station at nine-forty, a nice leisurely hour, and three of us who were traveling together decided to make a comfortable morning of it. We got out of our berths at a quarter after eight, shaved and dressed and half an hour later were making our way back to the dining-car.

He had been Governor of New York, a Justice

of the Supreme Court, a candidate for the Presidency of the United States, and was-at the time-practising law and reputed to be earning much more than a hundred thousand dollars a year. My companions and I were young men; he was well along in

middle life. We were poor and unknown; he was rich and famous. We were doing all that was required of us. We were up and dressed and would be ready for business when the train pulled in at a little before ten. But this man, of whom nothing was actually required, was doing far more. I thought to myself as we passed on to our leisurely breakfast, "That explains him; now I understand Hughes."

I have several times been in the offices of J. P. Morgan and Company after six o'clock in the evening. I remember vividly the mental picture which I once had of what such a private banking house must be-the partners coming down in limousines at eleven and leaving at three, after having given their nonchalant approval to a million dollar deal.

But on the occasion of one of the visits to which I refer the offices were closed. The clerks, and assistants and even the elevator men had gone, leaving only night-watchmen. Night-watchmen, and some of the partners. There seems to be always lights in the partners' offices no matter what the hour.

Austin, Texas, August 8 .- Lieutenant Governor Edgar Witt of Waco, an original opponent of the proposed constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to issue relief bonds, today announced that after acquainting himself with the relief situation he believes that it would be a tragedy not to adopt the proposal.

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"When the legislature submitted the proposed amendment last spring," said the lieutenant governor, "I was hopeful that we would not need Federal aid in Texas. But there have been many developments since then. and I have learned the true and dark picture of suffering in Texas and now I believe that it would be sheer tragedy to defeat the relief bonds.

"In the first place the drouth and crop failures in certain sections change the picture from what it was three months ago. I am told authoritatively that before the end of this winter there may be as high as 80 per cent of all the inhabitants of some Panhandle counties who will have to be publicly fed. So much Texas cotton has been plowed up and crops are so short that the usually dependable labor of cotton picking will be reduced by more than half of the nor-

"Twenty per cent of our population is now on relief rolls, but that is only a part of the picture. More than that proportion are unemployed, using the last of their reserves or savings, but not yet on relief rolls. This class will be the first absorbed in the re-employment provided by the National Recovery Act, leaving those on the rolls still to be publicly maintained.

Send It To The Steam Landary President Roosevelt in his war on Old Man depression has wrought drastic changes in economic conditions in this country. Through authority granted him by the National Industrial Recovery Act he has sounded the death knell of child labor in the manufacturing industries of the country, and these children who have formerly worked for starvation wages will be replaced by adults who will receive a fair wage for their labor and will be required to work only a reasonable number of hours each week.

With a stroke of his pen the President has accomplished what many individual states have been striving to accomplish for more than a generation, but which could not be accomplished without unified action on the part of the various states, which could not and probably never could have been accomplished.

These children will be replaced by adult laborers who will be paid a minimum wage scale of from \$12.00 upward per week, and will be required to work only 40 hours per week. These children have been required heretofore to work approximately 72 hours per week at a wage of from \$2.00 to \$5.00 per week.

Certainly these unwholesome labor conditions have been reflected in the prices of practically every commodity that we buy. Competition in every line has been unprecedently keen and every manufacturer has striven diligently to keep the cost of production to the lowest levels in order that they might sell their goods in competition with other manufacturers of like goods. Indeed it has been a battle of wits in which every manufacturer has, at the cost of labor, sought to undersell, and this condition has contributed to the depression which our President is now attempting to end.

And just as certainly as low wage scales, long working hours and other unwholesome conditions have contributed to low prices on all commodities, will higher wage scales, shorter hours and better working conditions bring about a material increase in the price of all commodities.

On September 1st a tax of approximately 4 1-2 cents per pound will be levied on all cotton goods in the shelves of merchants and factories over the nation. Other special taxes will be levied on various commodities, all of which mean that prices are going to be higher, and the delay in levying these taxes is provided in order that producers who have not yet benefitted from the "New Deal" might supply their requirements at lower prices than will prevail after the terms of the NRA have been applied generally and the taxes levied on all commodities listed to be taxed.

In view of this condition we believe it only fair to our customers and friends to urge that they supply their requirements in every line before prices advance. Goods offerd now will be much higher when replacements are made. Price lists are being canceled every day in practically every line. Goods are advancing in line with the increased cost of manufacturing and advances in the price of raw materials. It's just common sense to buy before these advances become effective, for certainly when replacements are made your merchants will have to pay more.

We are 100 per cent behind President Roosevelt and his recovery plan. We welcome higher wages and greater purchasing power by those who labor. We welcome higher prices for farm commodities, indeed we welcome every condition that is aimed at by our President in his Recovery plan.

And in urging that you buy all the goods you can during August we are in absolute harmony with our President's recovery plan. In fact, he has delayed the levying of taxes on numerous items in order that people might have an opportunity to make their dollars buy more before the advance come.



UNTIL WE LEARNED BETTER

Until we learned better, we used to mix wood and steel in our car

bodies and wheels. It was the best way to make bodies -- then. But the state of the art

has advanced. Of course, it is more expensive to make an all-steel body than to make a wooden frame and nail steel panels on to it. The better way involves an initial expenditure of several millions of dollars for new dies, which renders a change very costly. Cars, especially large expensive cars which are produced in small volume, cannot afford this, because the dies cost as much for one car as for a million. That alone explains why allsteel bodies are not used in all cars.

But our basic policy from the beginning is to make a good car better, regardless of cost.

For example, when we discarded wood-steel body construction, it was not because we lacked wood. We still have some thousands of acres of the best hard wood in America. Economy would urge us to use up the wood first, and then adopt the better all-steel body. But we decided that quality was more important than expense.

We weighed the reasons, for and against, before we made the change. We could see only one reason for retaining a mixed wood-and-steel body -- nailing the metal on, instead of welding an all-steel body into a strong one-piece whole. That reason was, it would be cheaper -- for us.




