Kendall, who together with Mrs. Kendall and a number of other Munday citizens, had met Mr. All-red at Haskell. Mr. Kendall in his introductory remarks stated that it was a happy event in his life to have the privilege of presenting the attorney general of the state who had given his son; Gaynor Kendall, an opportunity by naming him as one of his assistants upon his graduation from the law school of the Uni-

versity of Texas. Mr. Allred paid a very high tribute to the work of Gaynor in his capacity as an assistant in his office, and stated that he had become recognized as one of the most efficient and hard-working members of the


