



VOTE FOR A PRACTICAL SOLUTION TO THE BEER QUESTION

When you go to the polls Saturday, July 21st, vote for a practical solution of the beer issue.

The sale of 3.2 beer has been legalized within the State of Texas by a vote of the people of Texas. Its sale is to a large degree unrestricted by our present laws, since it is lawful for beer to be delivered into dry territory in any quantity, but such dry counties do not receive any revenues whatsoever from the sale of beer into which it it is delivered, all revenues from such sales going to the counties in which it has been legalized. Why should not the money spent for beer in Knox county help to maintain the government of Knox county instead of nearby counties where it is legally sold?

" While Saturday's election is county-wide in its scope, that fact should by no means be construed to mean that beer could be legally sold in every community in Knox county. It merely means that should a majority of the voters favor the sale of beer in Knox county that those communities in the county opposed to the sale of beer would have the privilege of voting it out, and those communities favorable to its sale could retain their status. It would mean that every community in Knox county would have the privilege of local self-government—a principle of government laid down by Thomas Jefferson.

The legalization of beer would mean the retention of money in Knox county that is now going out of the county. It would mean the employment of numerous unemployed. It would mean a return to the fundamentally sound principle of local self-government. It would mean that many who now consume illegal liquor would content themselves with the mild beverage.

President Roosevelt has asked for the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment as one of the objectives in overcoming the depression, and he has always been an advocate of light wines and beer as a solution to the liquor question. We believe with him, that the sale of beer would prove less harmful and would lessen the sale of illegal boot-leg liquor.

Remember this: By casting your vote to legalize beer in Knox county you are not materially liberalizing present conditions, for now it it perfectly legal to buy beer in any quantity and have it delivered to your home or your place of business. By voting to legalize its sale in Knox county you will enable the county to participate in the revenues derived from its sale. By voting for ts sale in Knox county you are voting to give employment to Knox county citizens-you are voting to keep Knox county money in Knox county-you are voting approval of the sound principle of local selfgovernment.


