alternating current motor was what McGraw will visit for some time. made long-distance transmission of power possible;up to that time, when only Edison's direct current motor was available, there was too much "leakage" of current.

If direct current is substituted for alternating. almost every piece of domestic electric equipment will have to be changed over, as well as factory motors. It is said to be easy, however, to convert the direct current to alternating where that would serve better.

One result would be to lessen the danger from broken high-pressure transmission lines. Direct current, in theory at least, is less likely to kill than is alternating. That is why the laws in many states which provide electrocution for convicted murderers specify alternating current.
