Mrs. Guy Franklin of this city died in an ambulance which had been summoned to convey her to the Knox County Hospital at Knox City on Friday afternoon of last week and the remains were taken in charge by the Warren undertaking establishment of Knox City and conveyed there for the funeral services which were conducted at the Methodist Church on Saturday with the Rev. B. J. Osborn, pastor, officiating.

In addition to her husband, Mrs. Franklin is survived by one son, Gary Conrad, 3 years old, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Whitten of Knox City, two brothers, Gilbert and George Whitten of Knox City, three sisters, Mrs. Hollis Griffith and Miss Dorothy Whitten of Knox City, and Mrs. Bob Thomas of Ropesville, Texas.

Mrs. Franklin's death came as a great shock to the family, as she had been ill only short time and frantic efforts were being made to rush her to the hospital at Knox City, but before the ambulance left the city limits she had succumbed.

She had been practically reared at Knox City, where she attended grammar and high school, and her untimely death came as a great shock to her many friends. She was born August 11, 1910 and was 24 years of age at the time of her death.

## TODAY and TOMORROW

**INCOMES . . .** large and small. There is one individual in the United States whose net income, on which he paid taxes for 1933, was above five million dollars. I don't know his name; the Federal Income Tax Bureau didn't give it out with the figures it published the other day. And personally, I don't care who he is nor envy him his millions. It seems likely to me that he is one of the very rich men who spend most of their incomes on efforts to help make the world a better place to live in. There are a good many such.

What I am really concerned about is not that there were 46 persons with incomes of more than \$1,000,000 in that year, but that the number of individuals reporting taxable incomes of less than \$25,000 dropped off materially. The folk hardest hit by the depression have not been the very rich nor the very poor, but the in-between middle class and the wage-earners.

These Government figures that show total taxable incomes of about 11 billion dollars in one year, from one thousand to five million for each of nearly four million income taxpayers, makes a lot of the talk about "redistribution of wealth" sound silly. If all of those incomes were equally divided among the entire population of the United States it would amount to only \$80 a year per person. And it wouldn't be long before wealth would again be concentrated in the hands of those who know how to accumulate and use it.

## FORDLANDIA . . . and rubber

Who says the days of adventure have passed? I can't imagine any more interesting adventure than that of the American explorers and engineers who have been clearing the jungle in the upper Amazon country to build the new colony of "Fordlandia." Millions of acres are being planted to rubber trees, to insure a permanent supply for American motor-car builders, and a huge area that was uninhabitable for folks is being converted into something resembling an earthly paradise, to hear returning travelers tell about it.

Once more I take occasion to applaud the far-seeing vision and the enterprise of Henry Ford. He is one of the few great industrialists who doesn't have to consult a board of directors or consider the desire of stockholders for dividends before going ahead with his own original ideas.

## HOUSING . . . for workers

I am interested in the project, which several of the big steel companies and mining companies have under joint consideration, for the building of several thousand "company houses" of modern steel-and-wood construction, to replace the dilapidated hovels in which many of the workers in these industries now live.

They are talking of spending \$150,000,000 to start with. That will build a lot of \$3,000 houses, which can be sold to the workers on payments of about \$21 a month, and will go a long way toward making life comfortable in the steel and mining communities.

In a little New England cotton-mill town where I lived when I was a boy the most dismal feature of the landscape was the row upon row of dingy wooden "company houses," all just alike, and as unattractive as one could imagine. But mill hands who earn \$9 or \$10 a week could rent these houses for \$5 a month and couldn't afford anything better.

Those houses stood for more than 100 years, and were torn down only a few years ago to clear the site for a great reservoir. I hope the new "company houses" will last as long and be more comfortable and, especially, better-looking.

## Bankhead Act Is Approved By Big Majority Friday

Farmers of the cotton-growing states marched to the polls last Saturday and gave their approval to the Bankhead Act by a majority of 9 to 1, and it is therefore evident that a vast majority of the farmers of the cotton-growing states are heartily in sympathy with the program of Secretary Wallace in curtailing the cotton production.

Knox County, while giving a majority vote for the program, failed to give to the two-thirds majority that was required for its retention. However, Knox County seems to have been an exception, since the majority over the entire south was approximately 9 to 1, far in excess of the two-thirds majority required for its retention.

Again, the program of President Roosevelt has been heartily approved by those vitally affected by his revolutionary movements just as the administration was given the hearty approval of the entire north in the November election.

## Rev. S. J. T. Williams, Succumbs at Abilene On Sunday Evening

Rev. S. J. T. Williams, 57, who died at his home at Abilene Sunday night, was well known in Munday, having been a co-worker with the Rev. Will Hogg in a revival here some years ago, during which time he made many friends here, and since that time he has visited here on a number of occasions.

Rev. Williams was a native of Kentucky and an active minister in the Baptist church. Last month he underwent an operation in a Fort Worth hospital for the removal of a tumor on the brain and never recovered from the operation. The funeral services were conducted at the First Baptist Church Monday afternoon with the Rev. M. A. Jenkins, pastor, officiating.

## Hour Wage Scale For RFC Workers Reduced to 20 Cts

## Negro Killed In Quarrel Saturday Night Over Game

In a quarrel over a penny ante monte game Saturday night Willie Hill proved to be the loser when he was shot and killed by the other party in the game, and as a result of the affair Willie Riley, better known locally as "Friday," is in the Knox County jail at Benjamin in default of \$2,500 bond fixed by Justice W. S. Bailey after an investigation conducted Sunday morning in which he was assisted by Sheriff C. R. Elliott and local officers.

In addition to Riley John Ed Brooks is being held for investigation, it being brought out in the examining trial that John Ed provided the gun, which officers have to date been unable to locate.

Hill, who has been in Munday only about three months, is a brother of Levi Hill, well known local negro, and while it is stated that three shots were fired, only one took effect, penetrating the chest near the heart and causing instant death.

Hill's body was shipped to Austin on Monday afternoon, where it is said his mother owns considerable property, and was accompanied by his brother, Levi.

## Ira Williams Buys McCarty Shop And Takes Over Business

A deal was consummated on Wednesday whereby Ira Williams purchased the W. W. McCarty Barber Shop and he immediately took over the management of the business, which will continue with the same corps of barbers and in the same location.

Mr. Williams has resided here for a number of years and has been associated with the Wichita Valley, and will likely continue to work for the railroad, giving his spare time to the operation of the shop.

"Bring 'em in Dead" was the order that went out from the U. S. Marshal's office after receiving word that one of his ace officers had been ambushed and shot down by an outlaw renegade.

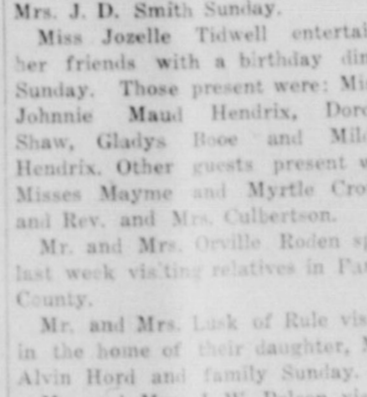
