



### Senator Oneal's **Final Plea For** Amendment No. 1

TO THE VOTERS OF KNOX

This communication is with reference to the proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 1 as it appears on the ballot to be voted on November

Last week I gave out a statement to the voters of the Twenty-Third Senatorial District requesting that they vote for this Constitutional Amendment which would permit the Legislature to classify property for the purpose of taxation. At that time I called attention to the efforts that are being made to defeat this Amendment, by those who own a large amount of property that is escaping taxation, property that could be brought into the field of taxation, if this amendment is adopted.
