Fire Prevention Week is again at hand. The object of the occasion is to remind the public of the seriousness of the large fire loss of this country, both as to life and property, and bring to the attention of every one that nearly all of this destruction could be avoided if greater care were taken in the construction of buildings, if litter and rubbish were removed from homes and places of business, if children and grown people were thoroughly educated in the handling of fire and

taught the importance of extreme carefulness. NOW, THEREFORE, I, E. E. AKERS, Mayor of Munday, in cooperation with the nationwide movement for the elimination of preventable fires, do hereby designate October 7 to 13, 1934, as Fire Prevention Week.

On these days I ask our civic and commercial organizations, our school officials and teachers, and our citizenship as a whole, to join with the chief of our fire department and our city fire marshal in arranging meetings and exercises for a study of ways and means of preventing fires, as well as to impress the seriousness of the wastage that it causes and the need for utmost care for the protection of life and property.

During Fire Prevention Weeek I urge that a thorough inspection of the entire city be conducted for the purpose of locating and removing fire hazards, and that the work thus inaugurated be hereafter expanded into a Fire Prevention Year.


