One of the speakers during the session was Congressman William Lemke of North Dakota, co-author of the Frazier-Lemke bill for government refinancing of farm indebtedness at an interest rate of 1 1/2 per cent, which bill was heartily endorsed by the convention.

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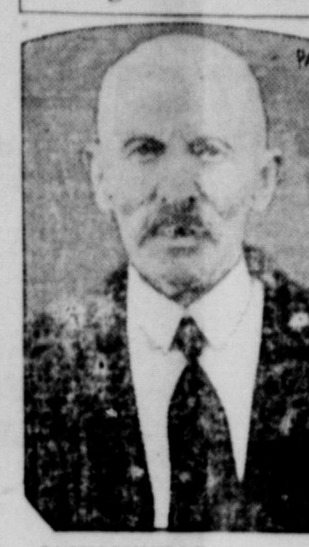
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New Hauptmann Attorney
