**MOGULS AND COWBOYS  
TIE 13-13**

The game started with the Moguls receiving on the east end of the field with Smith, right end; Zeissell, right tackle; Barncot, right guard; Greer, center; Broach, left guard; William Eiland, left tackle; Captain Kethley left end; Robert Layne, quarterback; Pruitt, left halfback; Trammell, right halfback; and Ralph Layne as fullback.

The Wooden Cowboys and the Moguls fought hard the first quarter but neither team scored. Those on the sideline had as a hard a time keeping up with the ball as the players, almost, for it was carried from one end to the other continuously.

In the second quarter West was substituted for Trammell as halfback. Then they began to pick up almost immediately. Brock was substituted for Ralph Layne as fullback. Then the Moguls began to click. Four plays were necessary to crash the goal. First Bob Layne plunged the line for a fifty five yard gain that got the boys started. Then Pruitt threw a lateral pass to Brock around right end, and Brock zipped about twenty-five yards. The same play was pulled around left end. Pruitt to West, and he carried the ball within a yard of the goal line. Then Pruitt plunged the line for a touchdown. This was the first touchdown made during the game, and the first time the Moguls have crashed an opponent's goal line this season. The try point was unsuccessful.

**FIRE PREVENTION WEEK!**

Fire Prevention Week is again at hand. The object is to remind the public of the seriousness of the large fire loss of this country both as a life and property, and to bring to the attention of everyone the fact that nearly all of this destruction could be avoided if greater care were taken in the construction of buildings, if litter and rubbish were removed from homes and places of business, if children and adults were thoroughly educated in the handling of fire and taught the importance of extreme carefulness.

Therefore, during this week, all students, as well as the citizenship as a whole, should study ways and means of preventing fires. The seriousness of the waste that fire causes and the need for utmost care for the protection of life and property should be deeply impressed upon their minds.

Fire losses of the United States and Canada in 1926 reached the total of \$393,023,500, the heaviest fire waste with the exception of two great fires in the country's history. The fire waste of 1926 was very disappointing to underwriters and insurance company executives. Figures taken from the Journal of Commerce giving the annual fire losses in the United States give a total of approximately \$23,283,621,326. Fires in the United States take an average of 15,000 human lives annually.

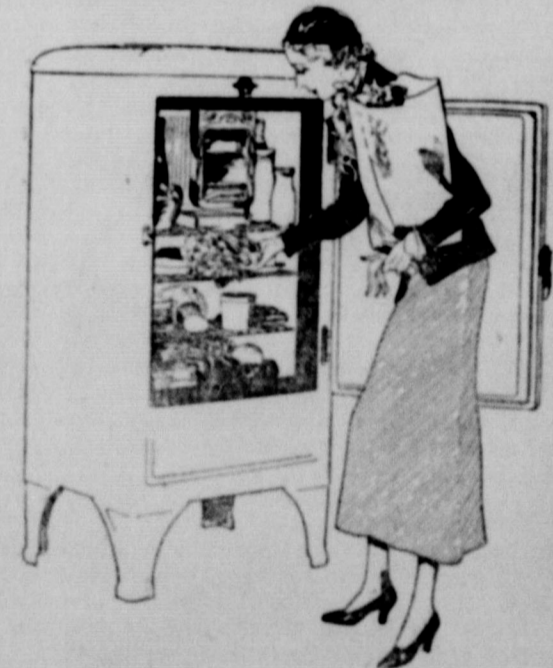
