



During the past fall the business men of Munay and the farmers of the Munday trade area preared for the largest fall business and cotton harest that had been forecast for years-but nationide production was so heavy that the price was depressed with each months crop forecast-thus shattering hopes for many men for a really prosperous fall business.

However, local merchants and farmers have much to be thankful for. In 1936 no bumper wheat crop was sold at a long price-feed was shortfarmers were forced to sell cattle and cut their chicken flocks-the cotton crop was extremely shortall in all the farmer and business man was not in a sound financial condition in most instances, and many probably could not have stood another crop failure.

But this year is a different story. The wheat crop aided many farmers to pay debts, buy items they needed and wanted, the feed crop was bountiful, and as a result cattle are being fed out here this year. a bumper cotton crop was produced, true not at a fancy price, but with the aid of the government loan it will mean a money making crop.

For the incoming year, most farmers are better off financially than they were last year, practically all of them have cotton in the loan, which should pay bigger dividends and go on this year's business, the Soil Conservation program will pay farmers who participated thousands of dollars during the next two months, and the new wheat crop is in excellent condition.



C. Williams, president of the Fed-eral Land Bank and General Agent
Vestment. "Another factor in the increase which to help purchase farms is the availability of Land Commis-sioner Loans," Mr. Williams con-tinued. "The interest rate on new loans by the Federal Land Bank is four per cent, and on Commis-sioner loans five per cent. By a special act of Congress, a tempor-ary interest rate of 3 1-2 per cent on Federal Land Bank loans will be in effect until June 30, 1938. of the Farm Credit Administra-tion of Houston. The amount ap-plied for totaled \$15.069,200. and loans until July 22, 1939."

powers to enforce its acts, the union of States under the Articles of Confederation, almost collapsed. To give it the required strength and to correct other faults, our Constitution was adopted. Under it the States surrendered to the Federal government certain specified national powers and defined the Federal Constitution as "the supreme law of the land . . . anything in the Constitution or laws of any State to the contrary notwithstanding."

The States knew from experience that this was necessary to preserve the union. But in actual practice they frequently adopted or changed State constitutions or passed State

laws in conflict with the Federal Constitution. When such cases came before the Supreme Court it found such State laws unconstitutional.
