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## Go To Polls And Vote No. 4- "Clean Water For Texas"

Richard D. Brown, chairman of the statewide "Clean Water For Texas Committee," today branded as ridiculous claims that passage of Constitutional Amendment No. 4 would revive the Texas Water Plan. "Those who are opposed to the Clean Water Amendment are literally 'grasping for straws' in a desperate attempt to downgrade the proposal," Brown said.

Brown, the executive director of the Texas Municipal League, was named by Governor Smith to head up the statewide campaign for support of the proposed amendment which would provide state assistance to local governments for financing construction of sewage treatment facilities. The amendment provides \$100 million Texas Water Development Fund bonds earmarked for such aid, raises the interest limit on all Water Development Fund bonds to six per cent, and extends use of the bonds beyond

the present constitutional shut-off date of 1982.

"The Clean Water Amendment has nothing to do with the Texas Water Plan," Brown said, "and insinuations that the interest limit hike from four to six per cent on Water Development Fund bonds clears the way for implementation of the Texas Water Plan are ridiculous."

Tracing the history of the bonds, Brown noted that voters have already put their stamp of approval on \$400 million. The legislature has authorized the sale of \$200 million of these, but because of the four per cent interest ceiling and trends in the bond market, only \$115.1 million have actually been sold. Proceeds from previously approved Water Development Fund bonds have been used almost entirely for assistance to cities and towns for development of municipal water supplies. Those yet to be sold and to which the higher interest

limit would apply, Brown said, would be used for the same purpose. He noted that only \$84.9 million authorized by the legislature and yet unsold would be immediately affected by the interest increase. "Legislative authorization for the remaining \$200 million requires a two-thirds vote of both the Senate and the House of Representatives," Brown added.

"Although emphasis of the 'Clean Water Amendment' has been placed on financial assistance it provides for sewage treatment facilities, and this is one of utmost urgency," Brown said, "many cities are reaching a water supply crisis that only assistance from the Water Development Fund can alleviate."

Brown pointed out that honest misunderstanding has resulted from wording of the Clean Water Amendment which ties the new \$100 million to "water quality enhancement," but noted that enabling legislation passed by the Texas House of Representatives makes it crystal clear that these bond funds will be used ONLY for construction of sewage treatment facilities.

"Not only does the enabling legislation pinpoint 'water quality enhancement' to sewage treatment," Brown said, "but it has ever been checked with the Environmental Protection Agency to make sure it is compatible with standards set for federal grants."

## EDITORIAL

Texas voters will be going to the polls May 18. Amid emotion-packed publicity about liquor-by-the-drink and welfare, facts about one of the most important decisions facing Texans are being lost. Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 4 on the May 18 ballot has been aptly referred to as the "Clean Water Amendment." Passage of this amendment is vital to every citizen in the Lone Star State.

The "Clean Water Amendment" allows Texans, particularly cities and towns, to get on with the important task of cleaning up our rivers, streams, lakes, bays, and estuaries. Briefly, it would provide state assistance for construction and improvement of sewage treatment plants, assistance in the form of loans to local governments.

Through no fault of their own, local governments have simply not been able to keep up with the sewage deluge. The heavy influx of new residents into urban areas has created intolerable loads on existing sewage treatment facilities, loads that local governments have been financially hard-pressed to adequately cope with.

The amendment earmarks \$100 million in bond funds for this assistance. Since those local entities taking advantage of the funds will eventually retire the bonds, there can really be no valid objection to the measure. Surely, voters will see the wisdom in passage of the "Clean Water Amendment."

Too long we have allowed our waterways to become open sewers.

## Increase In Postage Rates Becomes Effective May 16

Although postage for a first-class letter will increase to 8-cents May 16th, Postmaster Chan Hughes today reminded local citizens that the new rate will still be cheaper than postage rates were almost 125 years ago.

According to Postmaster Hughes, the first general issuance of postage stamps by the Post Office Department was authorized by Congress in March of 1847. He described the step as "one of the most important single improvements in the history of the American postal system."

The series consisted of a five-cent and a ten-cent denomination. At that time, the regular non-local postage rate was 5 cents a half ounce for mail traveling a distance under 300 miles and 10 cents a half ounce if over 300 miles.

During this period, an average letter weighing one-half of an ounce cost 10 cents to be sent from New York City to San Francisco. In comparison, the imminent first-class postage increase from 6 to 8 cents will still be 20 percent cheaper than before the Civil War.

"The comparison has more significance when consideration is given to the cost of living patterns, transportation modes, communications systems, and other factors which have changed during this 125-year period," Postmaster Hughes said. "Nevertheless," he added, "when one turns to more recent history, first-class postage has always been one of the best buys for the money."

"For example," he said: "The cost of mailing a first-class letter in 1932 was only 3 cents. When the new rate is effective, it will mean that first-class postage has increased by 166 percent."

"Yet," Postmaster Hughes continued, "if postal prices had risen at the same rate as retail prices since 1932, it would cost about 9 cents today - not 8 cents - to send a first-class letter."

During the same 39-year period, wholesale prices have increased by 230 percent and the average pay of manufacturing workers has gone up by 670 percent.

"Despite the great distances many letters must travel in the United States," Postmaster Hughes said, "our postal rates are still lower than in most other major countries, particularly when based on ability to pay."

When the proposed stamp rate is related to average hourly earnings, the impact of the 2-cent increase in first-class postage on the family or individual will be minimal.

The increase will only add \$1.04 annually to the household



# An Open Letter To All Citizens Of Knox County Regarding The Special Knox County Hospital Special Election

When the Knox County Hospital District was created in 1967, a 75 cent per one hundred dollar evaluation tax rate was authorized in the bill. However, the Hospital Board did not feel that this rate would be necessary and only a 35 cent rate was requested and approved by you the voters. Due to inflation and other factors, the Board must now request authority to increase the rate.

Therefore, on May 18th the Board of Directors of Knox County Hospital District will hold a special election for the authority to increase the Knox County Hospital tax rate from 35 to 75 cents per hundred dollar evaluation. **However, the Board has determined that only an additional 15 cents will be levied at this time. This will establish a tax rate of 50 cents per one hundred dollar evaluation at this time. It is not intended to levy the entire 75 cents in the near future.**

Some questions and answers regarding the election:

Question: Why does the Hospital have to have this extra money?

Answer: Because of increased cost in supplies, labor and maintenance. Overall costs have risen almost 23 per cent to the Hospital since January, 1970.

Question: Can the Hospital operate with fewer employees in order to reduce expenses?

Answer: Absolutely not. We are operating with the minimum number of personnel required by the Texas State Department of Health and Medicare.

Question: Do you anticipate any major repairs or alterations to the Hospital or equipment?

Answer: Over \$8,000 has been spent so far to comply with Medicare and Texas Health Department requirements. It is anticipated that a sprinkler system for fire protection will be required in the near fu-

ture at an estimated cost of \$20,000.

Question: How do your office procedures and financial management compare with other hospitals?

Answer: Independent auditors advise that we rate right at the top when compared to other hospitals that they serve.

Question: What is the present bonded indebtedness of the Hospital?

Answer: When control of the Hospital was transferred to the Hospital District, the District assumed its portion of the Knox County bonds issued for hospital construction. The following is the current schedule of bonded indebtedness:

Question: How are collections for hospital services?

Answer: We are fortunate in that our collections for 1970 were excellent. However, these collections were not sufficient to cover costs of operations.






