When everybody else succumbs to organized labor, it's a sort of must for we poor mortals who hate the idea with a purple passion.

It's a complete change about. Bus schedules, train schedules, plane schedules, mail schedules, TV and radio programs, and everything else sets up activities an hour earlier than they did the day before.

If we are among those "die hards" who insist on keeping our watches on "sensible" time, we have to always bear in mind that "those with the new look" are an hour ahead of us. Makes it difficult--and it would likely wear one out in six months time.

It's easier to set your timepiece ahead one hour and bellyache about it.

Then we're synchronized with all those big time idiots who don't mind pulling the body out of bed an hour earlier so they can have an additional hour of daylight to play on the beaches or waste away in a smoke-filled barroom.

We kinda get a ribbing when we "hit the sack" before sunset. But in our opinion it makes no never-mind. If we're tired and worn out with our muscles aching, our back wishing we wouldn't bend over again, and the bottoms of our feet burning like they'd been exposed to the oven of a wood-burning cookstove--when we're in that condition, we don't particularly care what position the sun is in the sky.

And the sun is doing its natural thing, paying no attention to the position of the minute hand and hour hand on our watches.

The film urged everyone to watch for the "danger signals" of cancer, as well as regular checkups by the family physician. Some of the danger signals brought out are: excessive bleeding, nagging cough, changes in a wart or mole, sores that fail to heal, knot in the breast, and others.

"Early is such a short word, but it means so much," the film emphasized in urging an early discovery of cancer.

During the business session, some five Lions indicated they would attend the district convention in Graham on May 4 and 5. Designated as voting delegates were Hank Matthews, Troy Gauntt, Chan Hughes and Aaron Edgar.

The club voted to contribute \$1 per active member to the Lions "Care" program with the money being used to build a school in Honduras.

## C-C Directors Approve New Budget, Select Committees

Among items of business discussed at the first meeting of the Chamber of Commerce new board of directors was approval of a working budget for 1973-74, and the naming of various committees by President Clint C. Norman.

The re-election of Mrs. Calie Ann Combs as manager of the organization also became official by unanimous approval of all directors present.

The new budget, as worked out by the offices, was approved by the board. The budget was increased over last year by some \$730, due principally to new items being added and increased in the cost of others. The budget in detail is as follows:

Budget total, \$7,835.30.

## Students Tour Nature Trail

The Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Nature Trail is now in use. Some 125 school students and their teachers Mrs. Judy Allen, Mrs. E. Austin, Mrs. Hazel Long and Mrs. A. V. Kemletz recently

toured the trail. Principal John McGaughey, of the Knox City School, accompanied the groups.

Soil Conservation Service personnel Arche Lieb, Pete Eiliston and Mike Risinger led the tours describing the plants, animals and soils found on the Nature trail.

Future plans are to provide teachers a tape recording of the narrative for each stop on the trail. Monographed narratives will soon be available for individuals and other groups who wish to visit the Nature Trail.

The Nature Trail is located three miles west, on farm road 143, from Knox City; then 2 miles south west on farm road 2279. The trail is adjacent to the highway and easily identified by the Wichita Brazos SWCD sign.

The Nature trail is a joint effort of the Wichita Brazos SWCD and Soil Conservation Service with assistance from Boy Scout Troop 161, Knox City and Voc. Ag. Dept. of Knox City High School, Bush Burnett Ranch and B. B. Hendrix.

Purpose of the project is to provide an environmental education study area and training site for our young people and other interested persons.

## Farmers May Apply For An Emergency Loan

Farmers in Knox County, Texas, who suffered crop or property losses because of the drought and other natural disasters from January 1, 1972 through June 19, 1972 and who have not received an Emergency loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an Emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, 1103 East Main St., Knox City, on or before May 8, 1973.

Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for Emergency loans at 1 percent interest. In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5000, based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

But it's on us again, folks. If you don't want to get up at 2 a. m. Sunday and set the timepieces ahead an hour, then do it before you retire at night. The transition will be made, even as you sleep!

And remember, too-- you have a full six months before you can settle back to decent living again! The powers that be have decreed!

P. S.--Since this was written, we've decided to doff our old Fedora to Rep. Garner E. Shriver, R-Kan., who has asked Congress to pass a bill limiting the change to daylight saving to three months instead of six. "For farmers and school children and many others, Daylight Savings Time is bad," he said.

Yep! And for this columnist, too!

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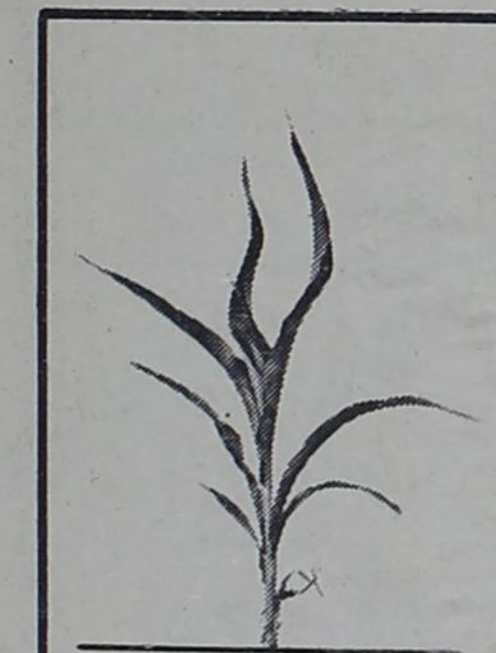

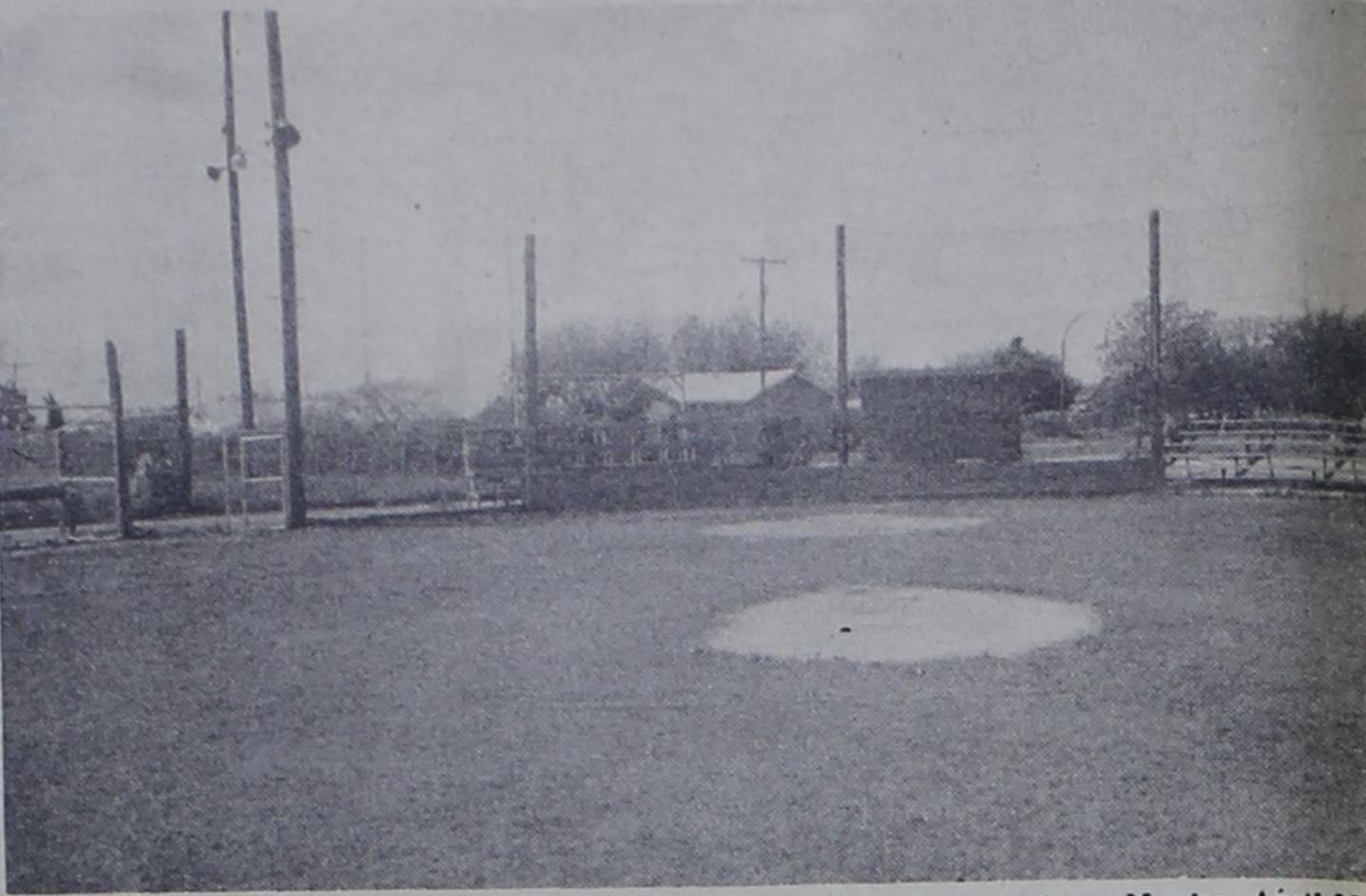

Preventing and controlling lung diseases is the goal of the North Texas Lung Association, the new name of the North Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association. Your lung association, working with concerned citizens across North Texas is trying to clean up the air we all breathe. And they're making an intense effort to convince anyone who still smokes to stop polluting his or her lungs as well as the air of everyone nearby. The association is also trying to find out more about how your lungs work and how diseases can be detected earlier and treated better.

Your North Texas Lung Association (formerly North Texas TB-RD Association) is working to give everyone's lungs a better break. Including yours. It's a matter of life and breathe.

# Farmcast

Compiled From Sources

Texas continues in the top 10 states in dairy production and number of milk cows, according to a report titled "1972 Texas Dairy Statistics". The major dairy section of Texas is located in the eastern half of the state.

Total receipts to dairymen during 1972 amounted to about \$250 million.

The top 10 counties in milk production in Texas are Hopkins, Erath, Wise, Grimes, Johnson, Tarrant, El Paso, Parker, Bexar, and McLennan. The top 10 counties in cow numbers are Hopkins, Erath, Wise, Grimes, Johnson, McLennan, Parker, Tarrant, Harris, and Comanche.

Texas' dairy producers--about 4,000 of them--are included in 10 federal milk marketing orders.

And as costs of production continue for the dairyman this year, he is expected to be caught in a cost-price squeeze which may force some dairymen to liquidate their herds.

Complete facts and figures on the Texas dairy industry for 1972 may be obtained free by writing to Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Texas Department of Agriculture, Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711. Ask for 1972 Texas Dairy Statistics.

Production of milk in Texas during March, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes, is up four per cent from a year ago.

Milk production in Texas per cow averaged 860 pounds, which is 30 pounds above a year earlier.

**WEATHER** conditions have curtailed commercial vegetable plantings in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and are also delaying harvesting.

Cabbage harvest has been slowed due to rains. Acres for harvest during the spring quarter will be above previous years because of some carryover acreage from the winter quarter.

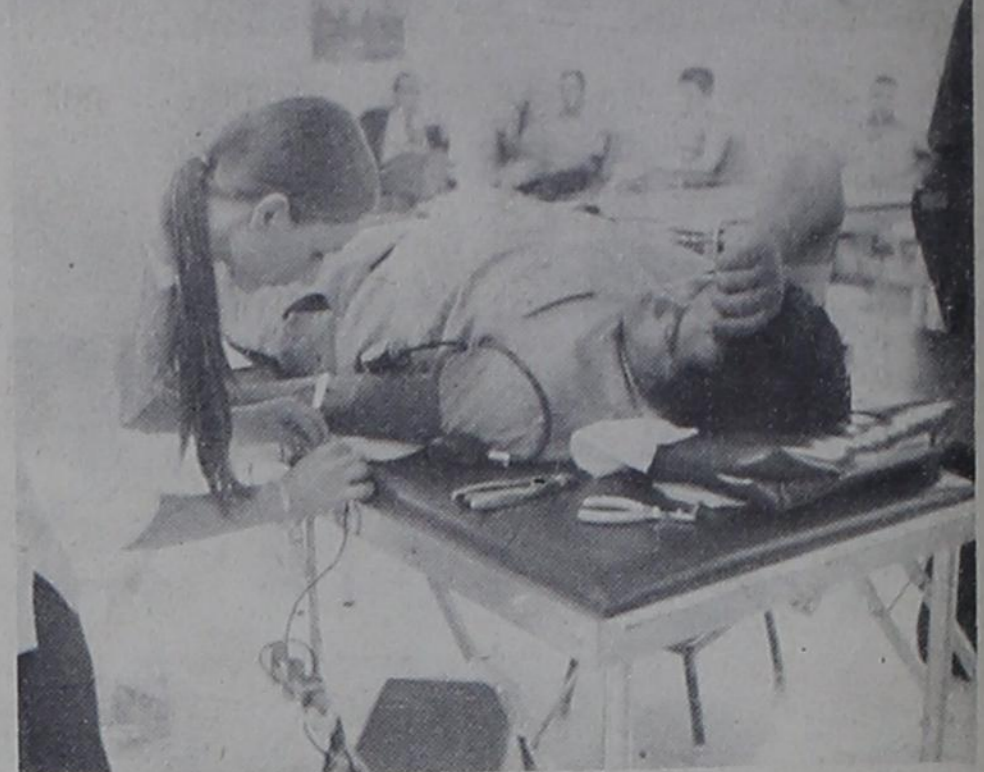
Excessive rains and freezing weather have reduced acreage planted to canteloupes. Crop progress is two to three weeks behind schedule. Harvest is expected to begin about mid-May. The crop at Laredo is making good progress with harvest to start in May.

Carrot harvest has been delayed, and the supplies of carrots during April-May are expected to be above normal.

The spring tomato crop is later than normal. No volume is expected from the Valley until May. In East and Central Texas, rains have delayed transplanting and as a result the crop will be later than normal.

Increased acreage of sweet corn is expected in the Winter Garden area and the High Plains. Heavy rains in the Valley prevented growers from planting a normal acreage.

Replanting of the watermelon crop was necessary in the Valley and coastal bend areas of Texas. The crop is two to three weeks behind normal. The Winter Garden crop is making good progress.

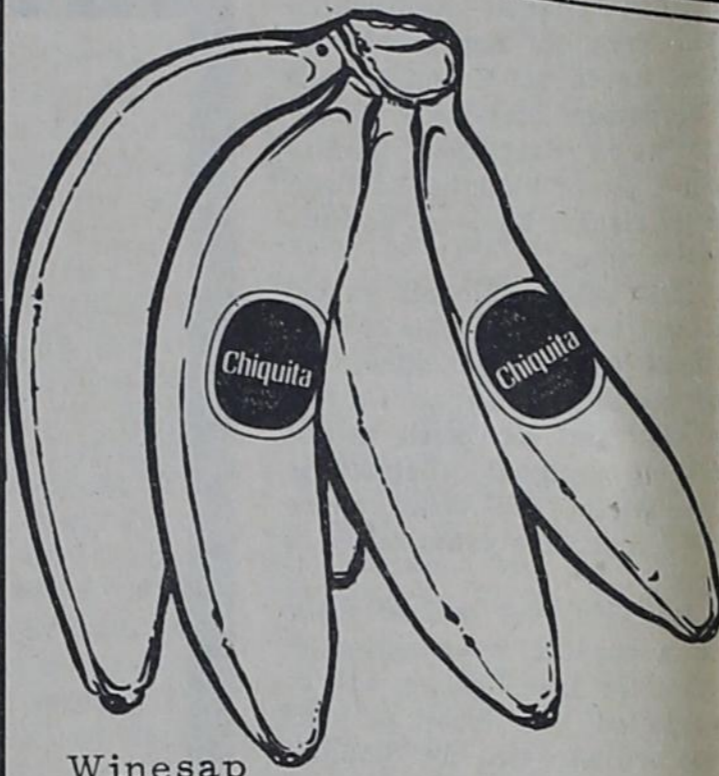

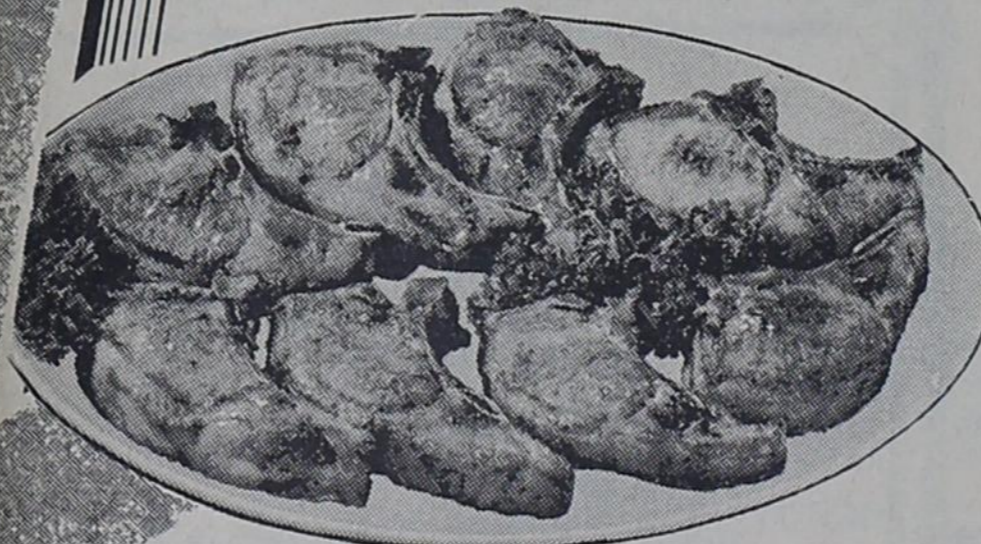

## Female Applicants Included For DPS Patrolman Positions

Austin--Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the DPS is accepting applications for appointment to the post of patrolman.

And for the first time since the State law enforcement agency was created in 1935, female applicants will be considered for patrolman positions.

Also, the DPS director noted that the department has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to patrolman positions and said efforts in this direction will continue.

Speir said general qualifications for DPS patrolmen are these: Applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age (inclusive); good moral character; excellent physical condition; height not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/20; and a citizen of the United States. Educational requirements area minimum of 30 semester hours of college credit.

Persons selected as cadets will be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school beginning June 26 at the DPS Academy. The salary during training will be \$600 per month, and room and board during this period will cost the cadet approximately \$55 per month.

Speir said upon being commissioned a patrolman, the salary is automatically raised to \$743 monthly. Patrolmen receive additional longevity pay for each five years of service to 25 years. They are also granted monthly uniform cleaning allowance, and receive travel expenses when away from their station.

Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished. Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee, and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Patrolmen participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as well as Social Security. Vacation, holidays and sick leave are as provided for all State employees.

Successful graduates will be assigned to the Highway Patrol, License & Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or Drivers License Service according to the needs of DPS and consideration of personal preference.

Patrolmen are eligible to compete for promotions after two

years of service. Experienced uniformed DPS personnel interested in criminal investigation may apply for appointment to positions in the Criminal Law Enforcement Division, which includes Narcotics, Intelligence, Motor Vehicle Theft and Texas Ranger Services as vacancies occur.

Speir said applicants should contact any DPS office or patrolman for an application. The completed application form should then be taken to the nearest regional, district or sub-district DPS office where the competitive examination is given.

Arrangements will be made for a physical examination. A character investigation will be conducted and those persons who are accepted for employment will be notified prior to beginning of the June recruit school. \*\*\*\*\*

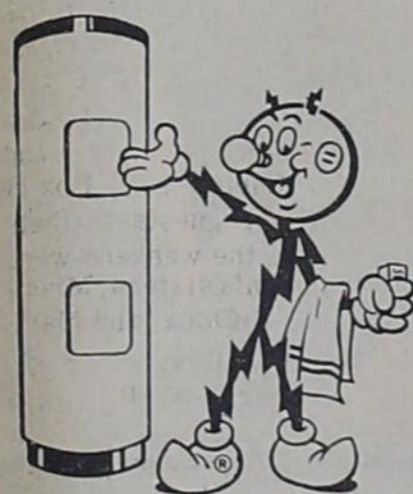

## Young Men Must Register With Selective Service At Age Of 18

Austin, Texas - Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has issued a statement reminding young men of their responsibility under Federal Law to register with Selective Service.

"The recent nationwide announcement that the draft has ended has misled some of our young men into thinking they no longer are required by law to register with Selective Service. This is incorrect!" Glantz said.

The State Director pointed out the fact that Selective Service is being reorganized into a stand-by operation to keep draft machinery operative and ready in case of a national emergency that requires the drafting of young men again in the future. He pointed out that although inductions have ended--the Selective Service System continues to operate and the law continues to require each young man to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or after his 18th birthday.

Increasing emphasis is being placed on retirement planning. For many people it is important to find out early what part Social Security plays in their retirement according to Henry Chustz, manager of the Vernon social security office. You can do this by calling or contacting your Social Security representative, he added.

By furnishing your name, birth date, address and social security number, you can obtain an estimate of your monthly social security benefit amount in a few days. Your representative will also be glad to discuss possible benefits for your spouse of children.

When the retirement date is known in advance, the application for social security benefits can be filed up to three months before that date. Early filing will help you get the first check when it is due. You can file your application by telephoning your Social Security Office. Your representative can advise what evidence you will need to furnish.

## Wheat Board Election Set

The Texas Wheat Producers Board formed in 1971 to support wheat research and market development will hold its first biennial election on May 31, 1973, according to Ken Kendrick, Stratford, Chairman. The terms of three current board members, elected at the formation of the organization, expiring at that time include: Leo Witkowski, Hereford; Delbert Timmons, Perryton; and John Cogdell, Crowell. Those with terms expiring drew a two-year stint of a normal six-year term in order to establish a rotating board. Board members are eligible for reelection to one additional consecutive term.

Any wheat producer living within the 34-county commercial wheat area, is eligible to vote for a board member for that district. Counties included are:

DISTRICT I: Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Moore, Hartley, Hutchinson and Gray.

DISTRICT II: Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Hale and Floyd.

DISTRICT III: Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Throckmorton, Haskell, Archer, Baylor, Willbarger, Wichita, Young and Clay.

Kendrick points out that any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Wheat Producers Board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election, at least 30 days prior to the election date, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters 15 days prior to the election, according to Kendrick. He also indicates that any person qualified to vote who does not re-

ceive a ballot 15 days before the election date, may obtain one at Agricultural Extension Service offices in the 34 county area.

Wheat producers supports TWPB with a 1/2 cent assessment on their deliveries of wheat at commercial handlers. Proceeds from such participation supports such programs as foreign and domestic market expansion, food and feed wheat technical service, insect control demonstrations and other activities designed to strengthen wheat producer income. In addition to Kendrick and the three members with expiring terms, other TWPB Board members are: C. L. Edwards, Panhandle; N. F. Renner, Spearman; Otis Harman, Tulla; Dwight Hamilton, Olney; and W. R. Moore, Jr., Munday.

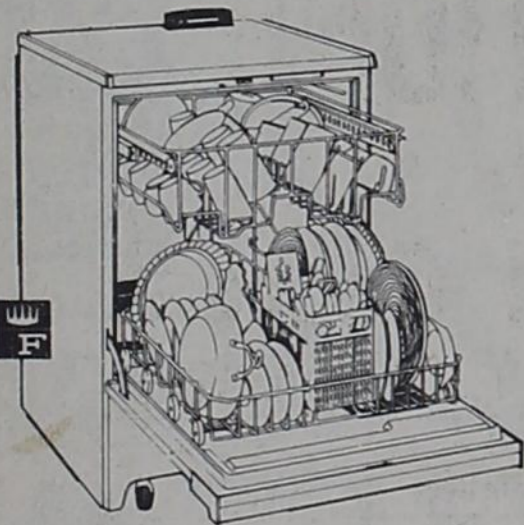
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
