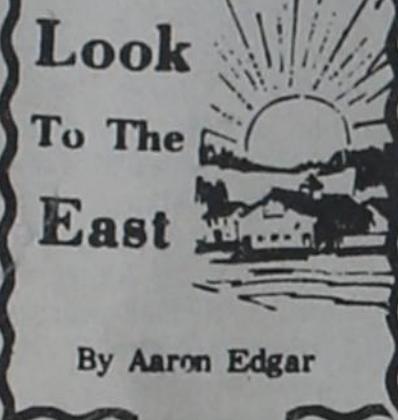

J. E. Reeves, Former Mayor Of Munday, Dies June 16th

J. E. (Jim) Reeves, who devoted many years of his life to his community, church and civic affairs and who did much in an official capacity for the advancement of Munday, passed away at 4:45 a. m. Wednesday in the Seymour hospital. He had been in failing health for several months.

Son of a pioneer couple, the late Mr. and Mrs. Willard Reeves, he was born June 8, 1893, in Robbins, Tenn., and the family came to Munday in 1904. Jim lived here continuously since that time with the exception of time spent in the service during World War I and a short period in Haskell, where he was engaged in business.

He was a member of the American Legion, Veterans of World War I, Knox Lodge No. 851, AF&AM; the Munday Lions Club, and a devoted member of the First Baptist Church, serving as deacon for many years.

After retiring from active business, having served in an automobile dealership for a number of years, Jim Reeves devoted 12 years of service as mayor of Munday, retiring in April, 1976. As a member of the Munday School Board in prior years, then as Mayor, he guided the thoughts and actions of his fellow-members through many trying circumstances

and decisions.

He married Elizabeth Perry on July 12, 1922, in Knox City, and she preceded him in death in May, 1971. He married Adele Edwards on March 2, 1972, in Munday. His chief loyalties were demonstrated in his devotion to his family and to his church.

Funeral services were held from the First Baptist Church in Munday at 4:30 p. m. Friday with the pastor, Rev. H. B. Graves Jr., officiating. Burial was in Johnson Memorial Cemetery by McCauley-Smith Funeral Home.

Serving as pallbearers were Bob Brown, Lloyd Patterson, Dr. W. H. Stewart, Frank Hendrix, Rhinehart Redder, M. L. Wiggins and Walter Hertel.

Survivors include his wife, of the home; a daughter, Mrs. Joe (Jean) Williams of Ozone; three sons, J. E. Reeves Jr., of Bowie, Md., Dr. Glenn Willard Reeves of Williamsburg, Ky., and Lt. Col. Michael Perry Reeves of Hawaii; two sisters, Mrs. Ina Hannah and Miss Elizabeth Reeves, both of Munday; and 10 grandchildren.

During the afternoon, a

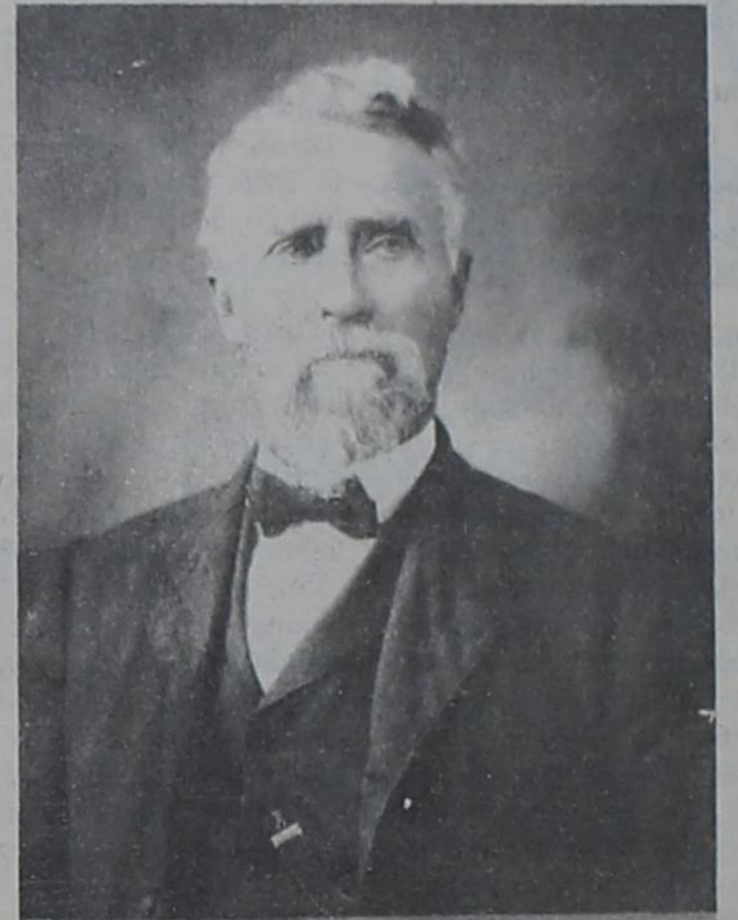

Mr. Munday moved to Knox County with his family in 1887 and played an important part in the establishment of Munday. In 1892, he donated the land for the first business in Munday, the Alexander Mercantile Store, gave land for the first Church of Christ, and was a leader in the growth of the community.

When the U. S. Post Office in Munday was commissioned in October, 1894, R. P. Munday was named as the first postmaster.

Citing his long period of service by the Goree store, he said it was probably the oldest business firm in the area that has operated continuously since its inception, since 1935, making a total of 41 years. The store will be completely closed by July 1, he said. Remaining merchandise is being sold at reduced prices.

development Corp., at a breakfast meeting at the Cottage Inn. About half of the 26 stockholders were present, including all of the directors.

Wiggins reported the architect, Joe Bill Pierce, stated "we are getting a pretty nice job" in construction of the 24 units. Tax Rebate Checks Mailed

Comptroller Bob Bullock has announced that checks totaling \$48.9 million were mailed to 846 cities and towns of Texas on June 15 as the June rebate of one-cent city sales tax which had been collected.

City rebates for 1976 are running 12.5 percent ahead of 1975, Bullock said. Rebates through June of 1975 totaled \$129.2 million, while they total \$145.4 million through June of this year.

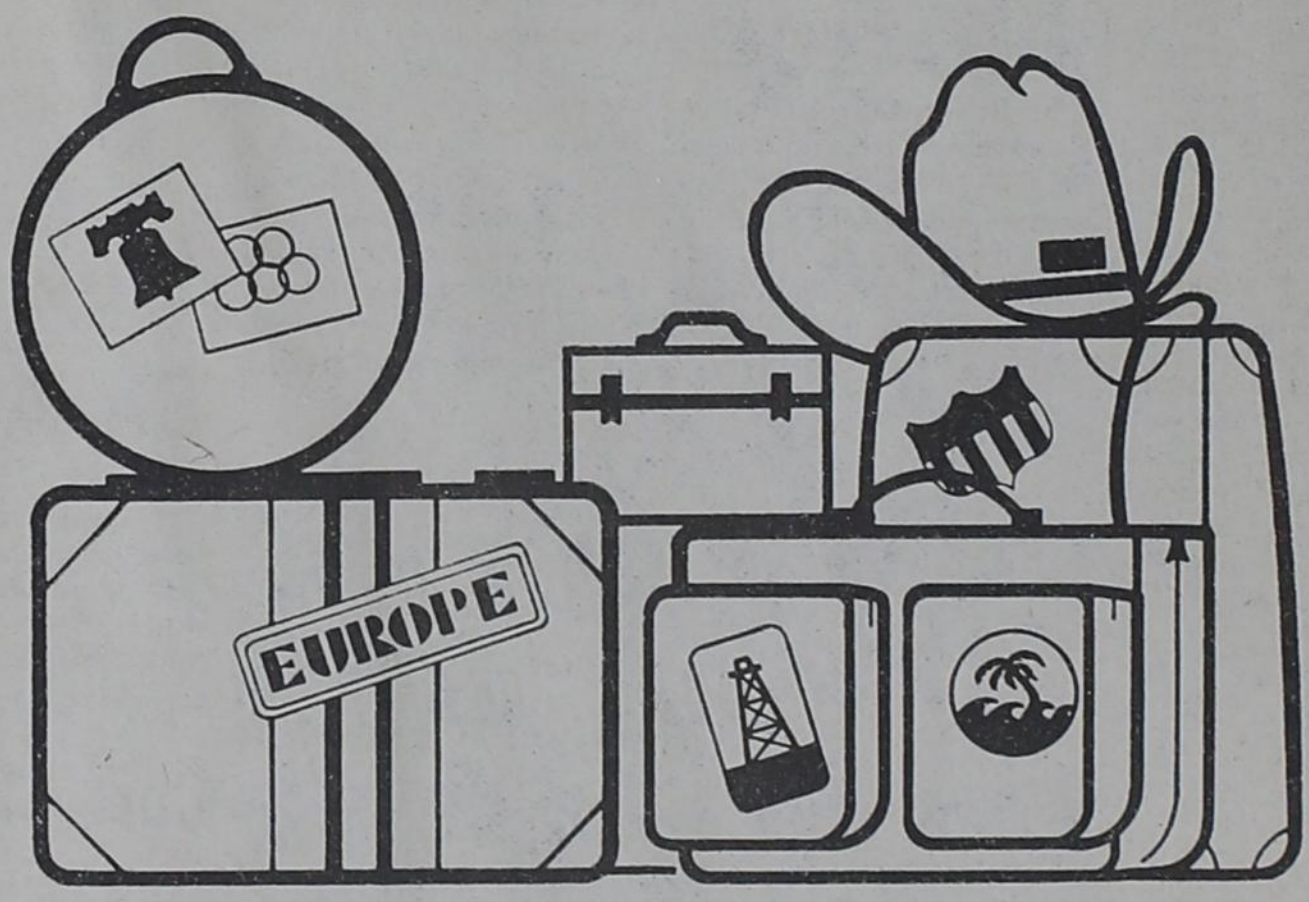

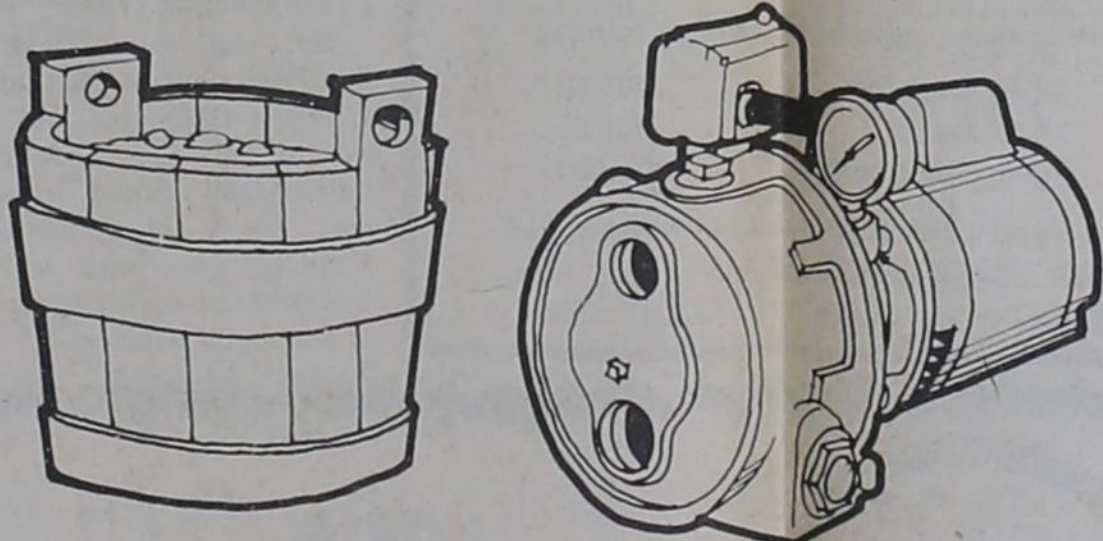

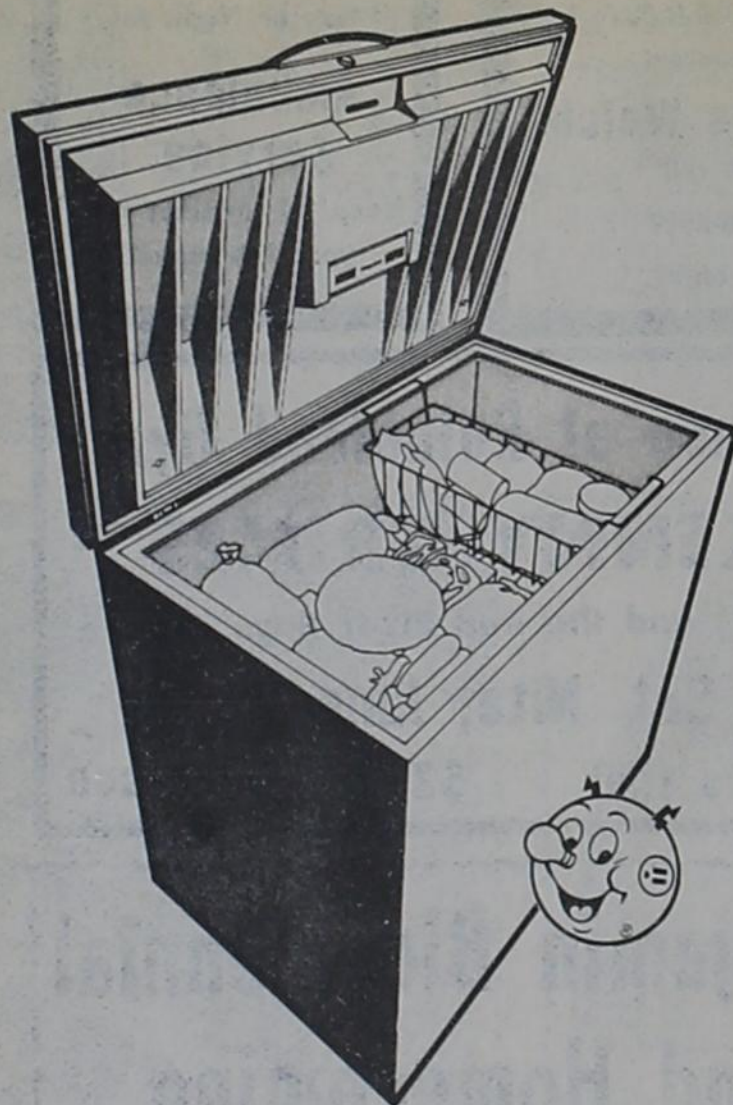

Beefsteaks may be back on the table for many people who have been passing steak up because of heart conditions or other concerns about high blood cholesterol. Low-fat beef, developed by a new feeding process, is already being marketed successfully in both Australia and New Zealand. Patented by the Australian agency responsible for its development, the process works basically by causing polyunsaturated fat to effectively bypass the animal's rumen and thereby decrease the proportion of saturated fat in the meat. Now under study and evaluation by the Food and Drug Administration, the new low-fat beef could be available in some markets in the United States as early as the first of next year.

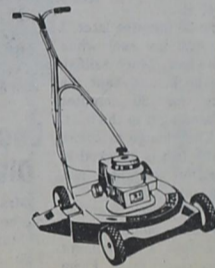

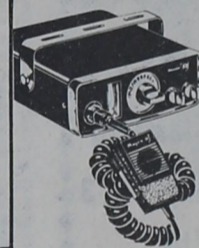

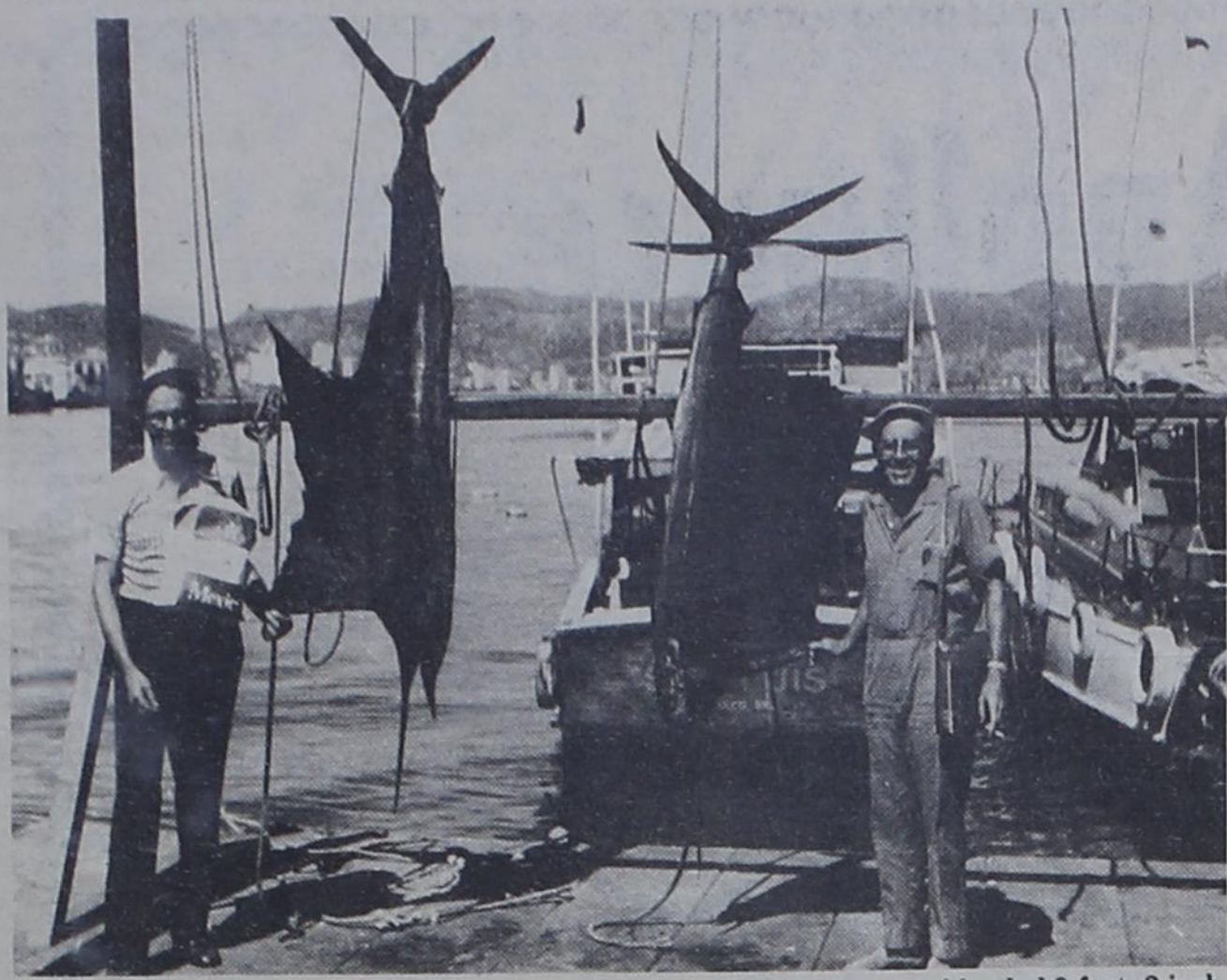

County's Bicentennial Coins Activities Of Colored People

Knox County Bicentennial Coins are now available according to Mrs. Virginia Casey, chairman of the Truscott Bicentennial Committee.

Michael Hutton of Wichita Falls designed the miniature murals which symbolize Knox County and the Wichita Divide. He was assisted by Juan Hernandez.

The Truscott Bicentennial Committee began the project, as a Truscott coin only, to raise money for the preservation of local history and other community projects. This meant a Truscott-Gilliland history book, possibly a museum, and improvement projects such as the six planters which were installed in downtown Truscott in the spring.

However, when it was decided to have original designs on both sides of the coin, the committee decided to include all of Knox County. (Some coins have an original design on one side only, and an eagle or other device on the second side.) A check revealed that no other Knox County group or town planned to undertake the time consuming, and expensive, project so the Truscott group borrowed money for the down payment and went to work.

It wasn't until several months and committee meetings later that they discovered that Wichita Falls Jaycees had turned down a similar project as too expensive.

Sales got underway before the group had chosen a design or designer. All they

had was a vague idea of what would be produced. The committee has had the coins on hand less than a week and has already sold over one-fourth of the antique bronze and single gold coins.

Coins will be available at Truscott or by mail anytime. As a special convenience to residents in other Knox County towns tables will be set up in Benjamin, Knox City and Munday on Friday, June 25. A display and order blanks will be set up in the First National Bank of Munday and at the Munday Chamber of Commerce office from June 28 on.

"We will be glad to come to Vera, Goree, Rhineland, and Gilliland if someone will help us get arrangements to set up a display," said Mrs. Casey.

Jewelry is also available for the coins in the form of four styles of pendants, a key chain, bolo ties, and a pewter belt buckle. All jewelry is available in gold or silver except the belt buckle.

The committee has been surprised at the local reaction since the coin was received. "People are buying and then coming back to buy again," laughed Mrs. Newell Looney, a co-chairman of the coin committee. "One lady ordered 10 coins last January and when they came in, she looked at them and ordered 10 more."

Actually the committee has been working to fill orders on hand and to organize the coins. (One thousand bronze and one

thousand brushed silver coins require some hours of organizing.) Each coin is numbered and when sold will be registered to the buyer.

The first five numbered sets in the four coin sets are not priced. These will be held for sale to the highest bidder. Details can be read in the ad in this issue.

The artist proof sets will be of interest to collectors only. Many counties have asked \$500.00 on these sets. At least two of the 14 sets will be retained by the committee, and discussion is underway on how many others might be retained for sale in future years. Many people are building collections of the Texas county coins, with some concentrating on the four coin and artist proof sets.

The silver coins are as pure as can be used in a coin. Other counties have found that the silver and gold have gone first because people buy these as an investment, whereas the bronze and brushed silver are purchased for sentimental gifts or to wear in jewelry.

The committee has also published a brochure in connection with the coin. It contains a short history of Knox County and the Wichita Divide, including a listing of the first Knox County officials and the founders of the Wichita and Brazos Stock Company. An order list is placed on the back for the convenience of those who must order by mail.
