Knox Farmers Leaders Guar Production

Knox County farmers placed fourth in 1975 Texas guar production with a crop totaling 4,270,000 pounds, Texas Agricultural Commissioner John C. White reported.

County farmers harvested 6,500 acres with a yield of 700 pounds per acre.

Texas guar production is concentrated on the Low Plains and Cross Timbers with small acreages seeded in South and Southeentral Texas. Experimental acreages have also been planted on the Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos areas.

While guar is a legume crop and some fields are turned under for soil-building purposes, most of the crop is harvested for the bean. Guar can be planted as late as July, and farmers will plant it as a catch crop for cotton or sorghum that has been bailed or flooded.

Wilburger County led the state in production with

Farm, Ranch Safety Week To Be Observed July 25-31

County Judge Clonts has proclaimed the week of July 25-21, 1976 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Knox County at the request of Knox County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

Using the combined reports of statewide and Farm Bureau member accidental death reports, Judge Closts said "records show that at least 300 Teeas farm and ranch people died during 1975 at the following rate: traffic-12% tractors-35; drownings-26; firearms-21; fires and burns-16; mashinory-14: a n i m a l s-14; falls-11; electric current-10; other vehicles (trailers) 9: suffication-6; poisoning di lightning-3; tornadoes-3; other and specified-3; struck by object-2: and stepped on nail-2. Knox County recorded no farm/ runch deaths.



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

### County's Oil And Gas **Output Economic Factor**

As an era of cheap energy and energy independence faded for America, Knox County's 1975 crude oil and natural gas production became more significant to Texas and the United States than at any time since production began in 1946.

With its production marketed for a record \$5.7-million and an industry payroll totalling \$543,624, petroleum continued as a factor in the economic health of the county, according to a study by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Knox was one of 200 Texas counties which produced oil and gas with a market value in excess of \$100,000 last year, an increase of three over the 1974 total and seven more than in 1973. The county ranked 148th in the state in the total value of petroleum produced, realizing \$5.7-million from the sale of 725,119 barrels of crude oil; \$50,953 from the sale of 103,773 MCF of natural gas. The county's royalty owners last year received \$716,986.

In addition to paying local school and county property, county producers also contributed to the support of state government with production tax payments total-

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 58 oil and gas industry employes worked in the county in 1975. But because oil and gas production and processing operations require such extensive support from service and supply firms, these direct employment figures are only a part of the story of the industry's impact on the local economy.

The industry's search for oil and gas continued in Knox County, with oil and gas developers last year spending an estimated \$2.3million drilling 60 wells in the county. Some \$1-million of that was lost in 29 dry holes, but the total drilling effort yielded 31 oil wells. The exploratory effort in the county last year saw the drilling of 10 wildcat wells.





#### Food Production Items Freed From Sales Tax

Texas farmers and ranchare to longer have to pay sales taxes on certain purchases to be used in the production of food and filer.

Effective July 20, the Texas sales tax law exempts. agriseliural producers from sales taxes on such items as heling wire, fenting suppiles, and machinery and equipment, points out Don. Fight, area semments with the Texas Agriceltural Expersons Service.

"However, a farmer or. ratefor does not salemanically qualify for exemption from the sales tax." notes Parks. 'Producers most file at exemption sertificate with each firm or husiness with which they deal. These certificates are gentlable from the Comptroller of Public Assource in Austin or from local branch officer of the Comptroller.

"To qualify for an exemption, the item purchased must be used exclusively on a farm or ranck. A farm or ranch is defined as land used. entirely or partially in the production of crops, live-

stock or other agricultural products. Home gardens are not considered a farm," explicing the aconomist.

Certain lients are exempt without the use of an exemption sertificate. These include food for farm and ranch animals, fertiliser. seeds and annual plants, and smirrade.

Diems requiring the use of at exemption certificate include fungicides, insecticides, herbicides, defoliants, desirranta, all medications for farm and ranch animals, and machinery and squipment used in fixed, grass and fixed production, including such expendable supplies as hand tools, bailing wire. Sence wire and posts, gates and storage facilities for bulk sommodities.

Natural gas or electricity used on a farm or ranch is also exempt with the appropriate certificate if used for pumps for livestock. or irrigation water, dairy harn operations, welding machines, siestric fences, and lights for barns, pens and poultry houses.
