"Hello, there! How are you?" or "How are you getting along?"

This is a stereotyped sort of greeting we extend to friends and neighbors when we meet them at the post office or along the street. It is designed to be a friendly greeting with more meaning than just a blunt "Howdy," but to many people it's more than that.

It's an invitation to pour out details of a recent ailment into attentive ears, or to bewail personal problems of the era to one who isn't inclined to listen, but who just made an expression of friendliness.

It is surprising to review the many and varied answers received to the simple question: "How are you?"

We've had some to answer in a sort of kidding, yet serious manner with: "How much time you got, before I get started?" and then begin pouring out the details from A to Izzard.

We used to have a sort of stock answer—one which we inherited, we guess, from our father—of "tolerable" or "only tolerable." We did this for some time, then people began to question us as to just how good or how bad is "tolerable." Since we couldn't provide a suitable answer briefly, we sort of did away with the statement. We note, however, that a number of people are "tolerable" when asked the question.

Some of the other answers given are: "fine," "okay," "pretty good, but more good than pretty," "Oh, I ain't doing no good," "I'd be alright if I would just get my strength back" "I think I'll make it, now" and a wide variety of others. It does in a measure depend on the person or personality to whom the question is addressed.

We know one person who used to invariably say: "Well, pretty good. Not as good as I was yesterday, but a little better than the day before."

Recently, we have adopted the phrase: "I'm fine. I got a good hold with a downhill pull!"

All this preface is to call your attention to a little poem we found in a borrowed newspaper—The Munday Times, issue of March 27, 1926 (almost 50 years ago). It was in a collection we borrowed for another purpose. The poem was entitled, "Quit Your Crabbing," and it goes like this:

There ain't no use in crabbing, friend
When things don't come your way;
It does no good to gloom 'round,
And grumble night and day.
The thing to do is curb your grief,
Cut out your little whine;
And when they ask you how you are,
Just say "I'm feeling fine."

There ain't no man alive but what
Is booked to get his slap;
There ain't no man what walks but what
From trouble gets his rap.
Go mingle with the bunch,
Old boy,
Work hard and don't repine;
And when they ask you how you are,
Just say, "I'm feeling fine!"

Sales Tax Receipts On The Upswing

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that city sales tax rebates to date for 1977 are running a healthy 20.3 percent ahead of last year.

Bullock said his office mailed rebate checks Friday totaling \$23.6 million to 868 Texas cities for their July share of the one percent city sales tax.

The July checks boost to \$190.7 million the total that has been rebated to Texas cities for the first seven months of this year. This compares to \$158.6 million for the same period last year.

"These rebates are just another sign of the strength of the Texas economy," Bullock said.

He also noted that state sales tax collections in Texas are registering a bigger percentage increase than any other state.

Bullock said the City of Houston will get a July sales tax rebate check for \$4.7 million and Dallas and San Antonio will receive \$3.2 million and \$1.3 million, respectively.

Munday received \$854,22; Knox City, \$1,110,79; Benjamin and Goree, 0.

A Day's Relief Of Hot Weather

Weather's heat that has been "on the button," slightly above, or just below the 100-degree mark has been commonplace in Munday, Knox County, a bigger part of Texas and a lot of the nation.

One day has been a repetition of the day before. The heat has sapped personal energy and has greatly eaten up electric energy as people make an attempt at keeping reasonably cool.

They kinda became used to nothing else but. Reports of a slight possibility of rain were received with guffaws! But the relief did come—if but for a day!

Thursday local people were surprised by raindrops falling. Then in pretty quick succession, two near-down-pours visited the Munday area—and smiles appeared on many faces.

Hey, Where's The Fire? Dam On Millers Creek!

During the afternoon of Thursday, July 21, the Munday fire alarm sounded while a slight drizzle of rain was falling.

The fire alarm usually prompts the question: "Where's the fire?" This time the answer came back: "The dam at Millers Creek reservoir!"

One fire truck was dispatched to the fire scene; and, sure enough it headed out in the direction of the Millers Creek reservoir. Several puns were made about the fire, such as:

It's been awfully hot lately, but I didn't know it got so hot that dirt and concrete will burn.

The grass on the back side of the dam, put there to prevent wind and water erosion, had caught fire.

Bicentennial Projects Outlined at Meeting

Several members of the Bicentennial committee met last Friday to discuss two proposed projects adopted by the Committee last year as continuing activities.

At this meeting, Mrs. Callie Ann Combs, Bicentennial chairman, gave a report on the projects which were adopted and completed, as well as a financial report on all expenditures. She stated that all projects adopted by the original proposal where by the city of Munday were approved and chartered as a 'Bicentennial City,' had been carried out with the exception of printing a history of the Munday area, and the completion of the tourist park and museum.

M. L. Wiggins is chairman of the historical division and Mayor Clint Norman is in charge of the tourist park and museum. Both of these projects were adopted as 'long-range' projects in the original plans.

A vote was taken among the twelve members present on the continuing projects. All voted to continue with the 'long-range' projects with the printing of the history as first priority. Every effort will be made to solicit histories from families who have not prepared their stories for the publication. No definite date has been set for the target date, although committees are to be appointed to contact non-resident families, or surviving members of pioneer families. Outlines and details for each family's use will be mailed after lists are carefully made. Local residents are requested to pick up the outlines at the Chamber of Commerce office.

Final 'Fun Fling' Event Is Slated Friday Night

The final stanza a Munday's "Whing Ding, Fun Fling" will be reeled off Friday night of this week, with fun and competition beginning at 8 p. m. This will close a united effort by local people to provide entertainment; and, at the same time, boost the funds which will provide a new ambulance for the Munday area.

Three teams: Weinert, which finished first in three nights of competition; Munday, holding second place, and Gilliland, with a close third, will be competing for Fun Fling championship honors.

Points garnered this far in competition will not be regarded, and all three teams will start from scratch.

A special event for Friday night will be a greased pig race, in which members of the City Council of Munday will be attempting to catch the pig. Many are looking forward to this event.

A total of five competitive events will be held, with only three of them definitely determined by Tuesday of this week. They are:

Caterpillar Crawl: Three men race to a long tube sack, place arms and legs through the holes, then a fourth player (woman) crawls inside tube and lays across the backs of her teammates, who crawl through an obstacle course to the finish line. Men are blindfolded, and woman directs them by looking through peepholes in the sack.

Tarzan to the Rescue: Tarzan jumps (or crawls) over barrier, runs up steps to pool, jumps into boat and paddles across to other side, runs through mud puddle and over obstacle of six tires to a banana tree, grabs banana and throws it to Jane, who is standing near the top rung of a ladder. If she misses, Tarzan returns to tree for another banana, continuing this operation until she catches the fruit.

Ma and Pa Kettle Go To Town: At sound of whistle, Ma Kettle jumps in wagon, or wheelbarrow, and Pa pushes her to a beauty shop, where she gets a treatment. Pa then pushes her to barbershop, where he gets a shave. They then go shopping for clothes designated for them, on to a grocery store and search through items for items on their list. Pa then pushes Ma through obstacles, including rain, to starting point.

The accident occurred about 4 p. m. Friday. The injured included Francis Jiminez, 6, niece of the victim; Nicolosa Jiminez, also of Haskell, who was treated and released; Arturo Chavez, 47, of Munday, who was also treated and released; while his 30-year-old wife, Mary, remained in the hospital for treatment.

The Jiminez family moved from Munday to Haskell about two years ago. The body of Miss Jiminez was brought to Munday by McCauley-Smith Funeral Home on Sunday night.

She is survived by her father, Pablo Jiminez of Haskell; four sisters, Lupe Casterna of Weinert, Maria Chaves of Munday, Irene Flores, Haskell and Nickel Jiminez, Haskell; two brothers, Marion Jiminez

of Munday and Juan Jiminez of Haskell.

Graveside services were held at 4 p. m. Tuesday at Johnson Memorial Cemetery in Munday with Father Bartholomew Landwermyer, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland, officiating. Burial was under direction of McCauley-Smith Funeral Home.

Fire Damages Home in Goree

Royce Miller of Vera has visited his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Navratil.


Mr. Bill Scott of Roaring Springs has parked his trailer just north of the Paul Bullion home and will reside here while employed on the road job.

Farm And Ranch News

By now, most producers have heard of the Restricted Use Pesticide Laws that will go into effect October 1977. Under this law, producers must become certified to be able to purchase any chemical that will be placed on the restricted use list when the law goes into effect.

There are three pesticide certification meetings scheduled for Knox County in August. They are August 2, beginning at 2:00 p. m. at the Community Center in Munday, August 4, beginning at 7:00 p. m. at the Community Center in Knox City and August 9, beginning at 7:00 p. m. at the Gilliland Community Center in Gilliland.

Every producer is encouraged to try and attend one of these certification meetings. It is important that you become certified to

enable you to continue purchasing various chemicals used in your operation. As of this time, we do not know what chemicals will be included on the restricted use list, but you can be sure that most of our pesticides for field crops and livestock will be included.





TEXAS TALK

Faced with high feed costs and low cattle prices, feedlot operators are looking with some interest at the efforts of crop scientists to improve the feeding efficiency of grain sorghum. Feedyard managers say an increase of just 5% in feed efficiency of the grain fed would mean an annual savings of nearly \$15 million. The scientists believe waxy and hetero-yellow endosperm sorghums may be one of the answers. When fed to steers waxy sorghums have given 8-20% better feed efficiency than nonwaxy milo, and yellow grain sorghums have increased digestibility in cattle. All this means savings to the feedlot operators and feeders. With several hundred million bushels of sorghum grains consumed annually in the U. S. any increase in efficiency has to be good news to the feeders. *****
