That's another time he could have kept his mouth shut!

We think the Nixon-Frost interview, carried on television one night last week, didn't amount to much.

It didn't change the thinking of many people. It created sympathy for the former president by some; disdain and criticism by others.

A spot check made later by the Associated Press showed that not many people who viewed the interview changed their minds about the man who brought dishonor to himself and to the nation.

The interview came about 1,000 days after Nixon resigned in disgrace over the Watergate scandal. If that time had increased into tens of thousands, we as the nation and the world would have been no worse off. We didn't do the honor of tuning it in!

We guess the lure of money is just too much for a lot of people. The government is taking pretty good care of the former president with retirement pay and other benefits, but that's not enough it seems.

He's been working on his memoirs, and the publication of these is expected to bring in a right tidy sum. Then Mr. David Frost comes along, and Mr. Nixon gets back on television.

It was reported that he is expected to receive \$600,000 or more, from the interviews. A lot of people will go after these, and the memoirs like hotcakes—and the funds will come rolling in.

Mr. Nixon's tears and his tear-jerking statement might have brought about some sympathy for his position, when he said:

"I let down my friends. I let down the country. I let down our system of government and the dreams of all those young people that ought to get into government but think it's all too corrupt, and the rest..."

"I let the American people down, and I have to carry that burden with me for the rest of my life. My political life is over..."

And so Watergate is revived again! That we hate to see.

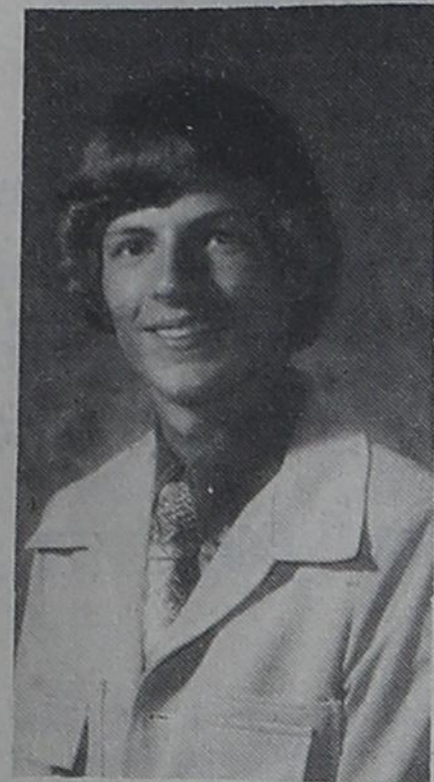
We think the noble thing for a people and a nation to do would be to let the hurt of bygones dwindle into nothingness.

It's been some 14 years since President Kennedy was assassinated, and a long time since Martin Luther King met the same fate. Yet, ever so often, we pick up a newspaper or "light up the tube" and find a renewal of these events back into the limelight. We find such things quite distasteful.

The events can not be recalled; the persons can not be brought back to life; the shame of Watergate can never be completely white-washed. Why not let them alone until the silence of many people though many years cause them to vanish completely into oblivion?

We once commented with pride that we shook hands with Richard M. Nixon. That was while he was vice-president, and when he made a speech at a Houston meeting of the Texas Press Association.

The first "feature" of the evening was a delicious banquet meal prepared by Curly Awalt and Mrs. Bobby Kegley. To make the activity more enjoyable, dinner music was furnished by the Munday High School stage band.

Coach Jim Pope served as master of ceremonies, being the first to pay tribute to those with whom he has worked during the entire school year.

The invocation was given by Coach Rodgers; the welcome by Phil McAfee, president of the Munday Quarterback Club, with the response by Supt. Douglas Myers. Athletes' responses were given by Kim Guess and Robby Thompson.

Special introductions were made, as follows:

Band members, Jerry Frazier; cheerleaders and pep club, Karen Longan; football players, Coach Rodgers; Basketball players, Coaches Holderman and Stapp; Track, Coach Pope; Tennis and golf, Coach Diggs.

Of more than usual interest was the presentation of special awards for the year. Boys receiving the most valuable player awards were Wayne Melton, football lineman, and Andy Haynie, backfield.

A state champion was recognized, as being the first in history of the local school, Julie Myers, who set a state record in the one mile run in Austin last weekend, was named the most valuable female athlete. Her time was 5:25.3.

The Booster Club award was made to the two best all-around athletes: Mike Urbanczyk for the boys, and Annelie Myers for the girls.

A "Fighting Heart Award" was made for the first time this year. This is for those who may not make all-district but who were there in spirit, thought and heart in all events. The senior boys of 1976-77 were selected for this award.

The Sammy Rayburn Bowman award was presented to Marlene Adams.

As a fitting climax to the evening, Jess Stiles, defensive end coach for the Red Raiders of Texas Tech in Lubbock, was introduced. He held the attention of his audience as he told of the value of a well-balanced athletic program in the schools—the part it plays in building the individual for "future conflicts," the aid to schools, and the value of good, healthful athletics to the community.

The all-sports banquet marked the close of Munday Schools' athletic program for the year, and was one of the great highlights of the schools' closing exercises.

Julie Myers, who has been setting new records for herself in the mile run during all of the season, established a state record for this event last Saturday in the UIL state track meet in Austin.

Miss Myers qualified for state by winning the regional contest at Odessa on Saturday, April 23, establishing a regional record of 5:37.8. This broke her previous record of 5:52, established in an earlier event.

Her winning record at Austin was 5:25.4, some 12 seconds faster than the regional. This will be a Class A record for next year, as this is the first season for the mile run for girls.

May 15-22 Proclaimed Soil Stewardship Week

Man is responsible for protecting and conserving soil, water and other natural resources provided by God. Emphasis on that awesome responsibility will be the highlight of Soil Stewardship Week, May 15-22.

Theme of this year's nationwide observance is "When We Care." "The theme is designed to help everyone examine his own motives and actions in the conservation of God's manifold gifts," points out Dr. B. L. Harris, soil and water use specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Extension Service is cooperating with the National Association of Conservation Districts and Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout the state in the weeklong observance.

"At a time when pressures are growing regarding the use of our natural resources, it is vital that we reflect on our dependence on God for all things," emphasizes Harris. "We must be continually mindful of all the priceless gifts bestowed upon us by our Creator—air, soil, water and sunshine—which make all living things possible."

Many special programs and church services are being planned throughout the state to call attention to the responsibility of all people for the protection and proper care of the Lord's

earth, adds the Extension specialist.

The custom of setting aside special days—called Rogation Days—for worship and prayer in thanksgiving for bountiful resources began more than 1,500 years ago in France when the country was suffering from crop failures and widespread hunger. The people united in prayer and penance and God answered their call.

"During Soil Stewardship Week, we should all acknowledge before God our gratitude for His gifts of the soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it," urges Harris.

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Farm And Ranch News

Grass is sun-loving and often difficult to grow in shaded areas of the home lawn. There are a few basic steps a homeowner can take to improve grass performance in these areas.

Proper pruning of trees and shrubs can lessen the shading of grass and will improve air circulation which will also help in reducing chance of turf diseases associated with shaded areas. When pruning trees and shrubs, do not top or stub back large limbs but prune selectively to thin out the top by removing branches at their point of origin.

Proper pruning can be done almost any time during the year, however the best time for evergreens is late spring or early summer after new spring growth. Early spring flowering plants should be pruned immediately after flowering. Deciduous trees should be carefully pruned over a period of several years to avoid removing too many leaves at any one time.

Tree roots compete with grass for moisture and nutrients in the soil and also cause it to weaken. This is even more critical if the overhead umbrella-like canopy of leaves prevent

rainfall from penetrating into the turf below.

While soil moisture is important, keeping the soil constantly wet can also be harmful to both tree and grass roots. A thorough soaking at 7 to 10 day intervals during the heat of the summer is best. Allow the soil to become slightly dry before watering again. For a yard that is shaded, fertilization should be increased slightly to compensate for the needs of the trees and grass.

After completing the necessary pruning, plant a grass that has shade tolerance. Plant the grass in the spring after the soil temperature is about 70 degrees F. The warm soil promotes fast growth and rapid establishment of the grass cover.

Once established, grass in shaded areas should be mowed at least one-half inch lower than grass growing in full sun. This provides a greater leaf surface to utilize available sunlight.

In deeply shaded areas where pruning is not possible, ground covers such as English Ivy, ajuga or big-leaved periwinkle are the only answer. If these won't grow under existing conditions, the next best thing to use is a mulch of bark or gravel.

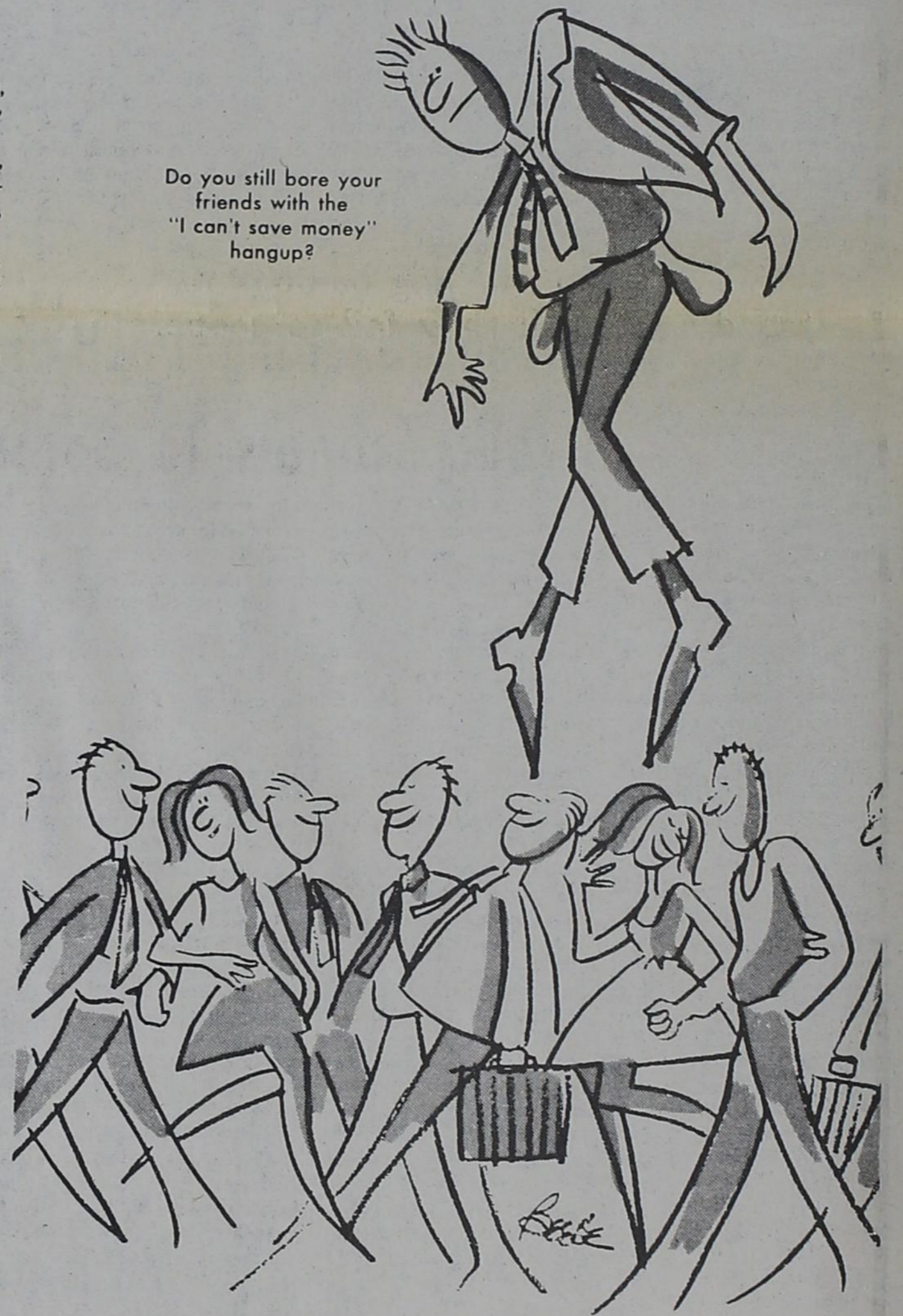

One of the floods expected late this spring is to come from a deluge of votes cast by cattle producers from all over the nation. At long last the voting on a referendum which will make or break the Beef Research and Information Order is right around the corner. Every beef producer is encouraged to vote on the measure, which if passed, would provide some 30 to 40 million dollars a year of the cattlemen's money for research and promotion. Cost to the individual producer would be three cents for every ten dollars worth of beef sold. Funds would be administered by a 68-member Beef Board representing all cattle producing regions. Registration for this special national referendum must be completed in advance of voting day. The place to sign up is the local ASCS office.
