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Look To The East

How many times have your eyes scanned the skies, and you hoped desperately for a rain.

Trouble with rain is that, no matter how long the dry spell, everybody is not ready for the moisture when it comes. Perhaps that's what is being done now—the clouds are just waiting until people are 100% ready!

We're ready! Recently when we went in to pay our water bill after trying all through August to keep the lawn green as possible, we remarked: Guess I'll have to stop drinking water as a conservation measure and economic necessity.

We're losing faith in the daily weather reports of 20% possibility, maybe 25% or 30%, and no rain comes. We're inclined to scoff at the reporter, although realizing he isn't making the prediction—just reading it off a piece of paper.

Looks like we'd better start exercising some of our sure-fire methods of causing it to rain, or hopefully recalling some of the encouraging signs.

A "wet moon" has always been an encouraging sign. Trouble is that folks can't agree on just what a wet moon is. It's generally identified with a half-moon in the sky, but the problem is—is it a wet moon when it's sitting level in the sky like a canoe in quiet waters, so it is holding the water; or is it when the moon is tilted to one end, letting the water spill out over all the earth?

A ring around the moon used to be a pretty good sign. One would count the stars within the ring, and a rain was sure to come in that many days!

A method we practiced when a kid was to kill a snake and place it so it's naked belly was turned upward. It was sure to rain within five days.

A hurricane in the gulf used to always produce a good rain in this section of Texas. We've had three so far this year, and the rain results have been far from satisfying.

A strong wind blowing out of the south for three days was another sign you could almost bet on.

Then, there have been rainmakers; like, for instance, Chief Wattmaker, or something, who appeared in Wichita Falls a few years back, and nearly made a failure.

We had a rainmaker in this section a few years ago. He had a sort of contraption on a trailer that he pulled behind his car. It would belch smoke, or something, into the air—and he could produce rain for a price. We met him coming down the road one time, but there was no raincloud following him!

His was a sort of method of seeding the clouds. We first knew of seeding the clouds by airplane around 1947. We were at a press meeting in San Angelo when the effort was made. To our recollection, it produced only a small shower.

One of our sure-fire methods used to be running a picture in the paper of our town flood of May, 1930.

Subscription Rates To Be Increased

Subscription rates to the Munday Courier will be increased, becoming effective on Saturday, October 1, 1977. M. L. Waggoner, publisher, has announced.

"Due to the rising cost of postage and several increases in cost of having the paper printed, it is necessary to raise the rates of the Munday Courier," Mr. Waggoner stated.

The new rates will be: \$5.25 in Knox and adjoining counties; \$8.00 in the state and \$9.00, out-of-state. This increase will cost the subscriber an additional 1.5 cents per issue for Knox County and adjoining counties.

"We hope you will realize our position," Waggoner concluded. "We simply can not continue mailing the Courier at the present rate, in view of these continuous rising costs. The new rate is in line with those charged by other publications in this area."

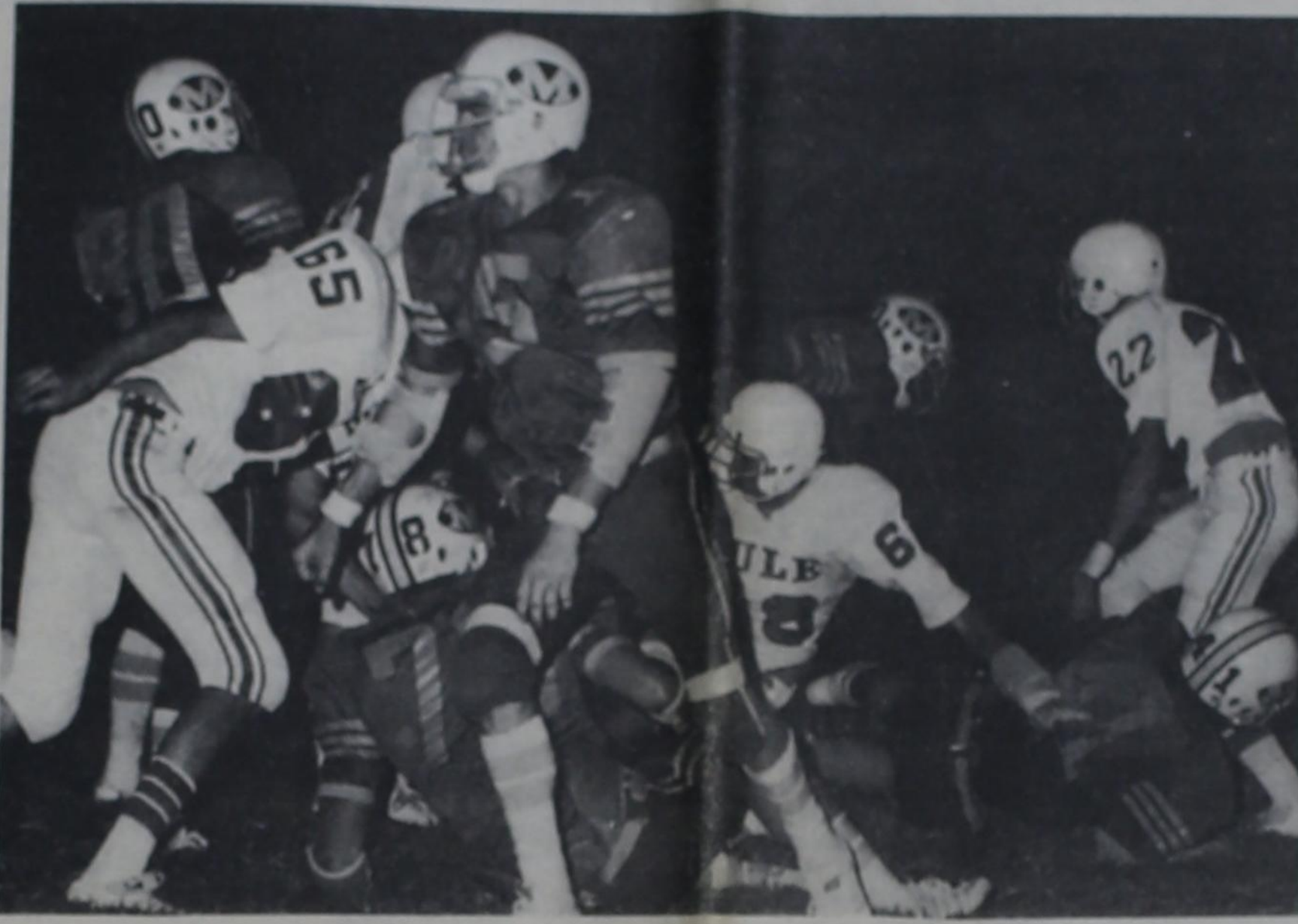

Moguls Gain Decisive Win Over Rule Bobcats Friday

Robert Spells, Mogul halfback, continued his "track workouts" last Friday night, as he racked up over 200 yards and scored four touchdowns to lead the Moguls for a decisive 32 to 7 victory over the visiting Rule Bobcats.

The Moguls appear to be "ruling the roost" at this stage of play, as they are now pointing to important district games for the remainder of the season.

Spells carried 28 times for a total of 214 yards and three touchdowns, then caught one pass for nine yards and his fourth career. The Moguls raised their season record to 2-0-1.

Other offensive players also added to the Mogul victory, as Munday collected a total of 524 offensive yards, with 465 of them being on the ground.

The loss dropped the Rule Bobcats to 1-2 for the season.

The senior halfback, Spells, started the Mogul scoring spree with a 61-yard run over left tackle with 3:06 left in the first period. Munday scored again with only 10 seconds left with a 51 yard pass from Cary Shawver, quarterback, to Tony Urbanczyk, giving Munday a 13-0 lead in the opening quarter.

Rule's Bobcats scored early in the second quarter on a five-yard pass from quarterback Tony Carter to end Rick Kittle with 8:28 left Munday took over at this point and held command

Minutes Reveal Busy Night At Meeting of City Council

The City Council of Munday met in regular session Tuesday, September 13, 1977. Minutes of the meeting are substantially as follows:

Mayor Clint Norman called the meeting to order and proceeded with discussion of leasing additional acres for a sanitary landfill. The A.S.C.S. office and Texas Department of Health Resources in Abilene are to be consulted for their opinions on the possible leasing of a site. This will be researched further and put on the agenda at a later date.

Gerald Saffel, Police Chief, met and discussed problems in Munday and the results he expects to obtain, that will be evident in a few weeks.

Saffel requested the city purchase a solid mounted radar with a bell like the Highway Patrol uses. Also requested was the additional help in the hiring of another certified patrolman.

M. Booe moved that Saffel be permitted to hire a police patrolman of his choice, who is certified, and who will be responsible to him. Salary for the patrolman will be \$600.00 a month for a 6 day work week. If satisfied with performance in 6 months his salary will be raised \$50.00 per month. Policemen in Munday are on call 24 hours a day.

Burns Ray will terminate his employment with the city at the end of September. His termination is not due to unsatisfactory work, but due to the need of a certified patrolman.

Hardin moved that ambulance calls within the county be amended to read \$35.00 per person picked up. If more than one is picked up

Sales Tax Rebates Continue To Climb

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that some 880 Texas cities have been mailed checks totaling \$57.8 million as their share of the one percent city sales tax for September.

The September checks raise to \$263.6 million the total that has been rebated to the cities to date this year, up from \$229.7 million for the same period last year. This is a 14.7 percent increase.

Bullock said the increase in sales tax collections in Texas is outpacing that of most other states, signaling the continuing vigor of the state's economy.

"This has got to be a good sign for everyone—the consumer, the merchant and the taxpayer," Bullock said.

Houston, Texas's most populous city, was sent a check for \$11.2 million, raising its year-to-date total to \$53 million. This is a 10 percent increase over last year.

Rebates to the City of Dallas are up a whopping 20 percent for the year, outpacing Texas' other major urban centers. Dallas was sent a check for \$6.9 million, bringing its total for the year to \$32.3 million.

Fort Worth has received \$11.1 million for the year, a 17 percent increase over the same period last year, and sales tax rebates in San Antonio are running 10 percent over last year for a total of \$16 million.

Munday received \$6,161.34; Knox City, \$5,913.01; Benjamin, \$328.63; Goree, \$713.98 and Weinert, \$276.98.

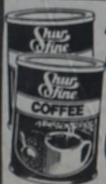

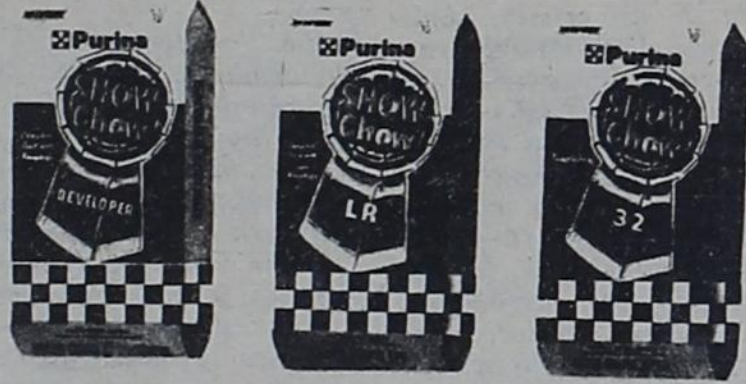

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The 15th annual Ranch Management Conference is slated for September 23 beginning at 9:00 a. m. in the Farmers Co-op Compress in Lubbock. The purpose of this conference is to bring together ranchmen, technicians and others interested in ranch and range management in an effort to help solve some of the problems facing today's ranching industry. These meetings will provide for discussion of the latest information on brush control, grazing systems, stocking rates, ranch investments, income tax problems on ranches, forage inven-

ment in the 1977 Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program was to start around September 6.

Mapping has been completed in a 15-county control area along the Caprock and survey teams have already finished their first field inspections. The general survey is carried out by 44 two man teams which provide weekly information on the 400,000 acres within the control zone which serves as a basis for selecting fields which need treatment.

Bollworm counts are being made right along with weevil counts. Special attention will be given to fields treated during the early part of the program to avoid creating any bollworm problems for program participants. Only those fields having large numbers of weevils or square damage

will be treated with the first application. The second application is planned for September 19. This and later treatments will be more intensive. The purpose of these applications is to reduce the numbers of diapausing boll weevils.

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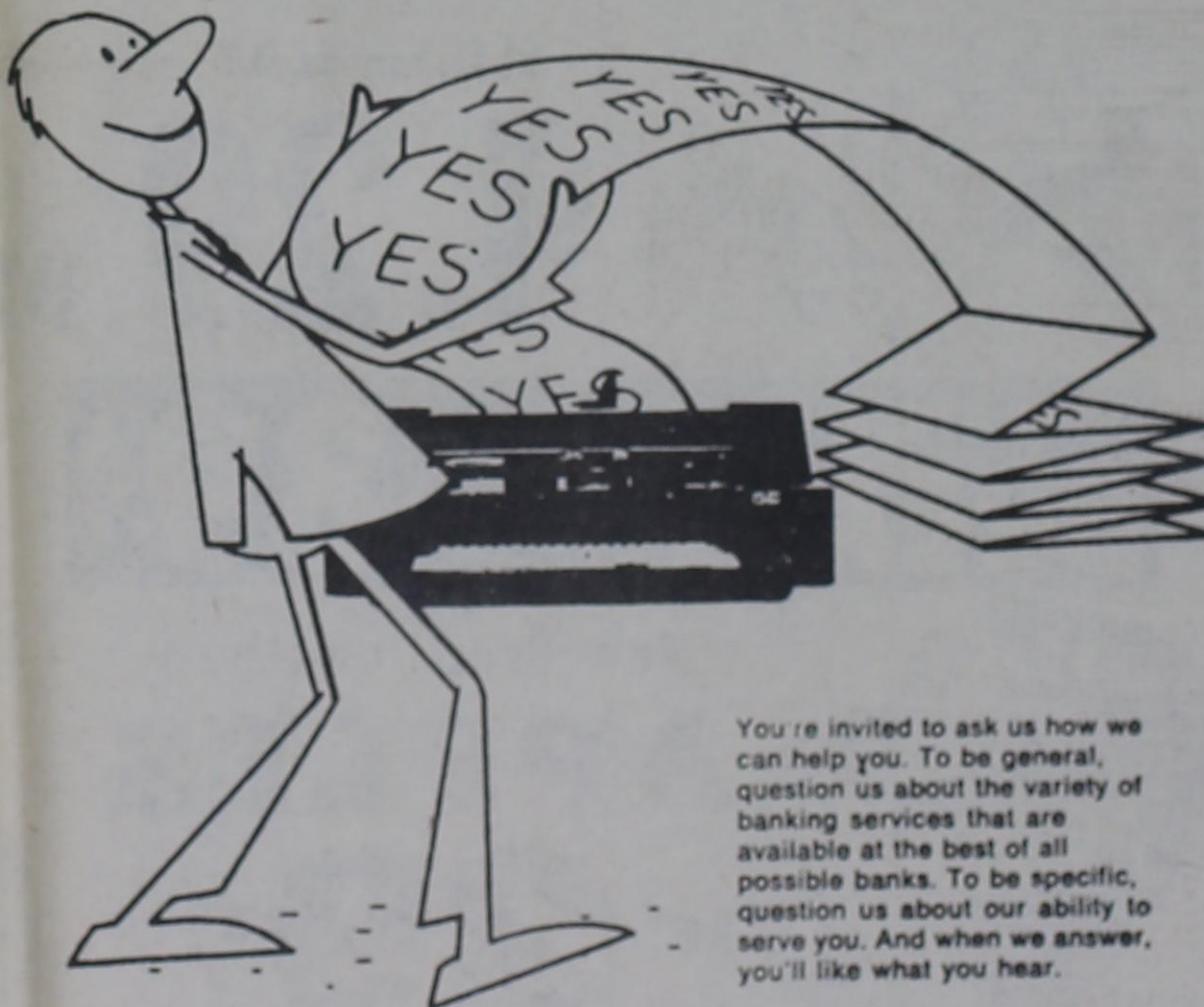
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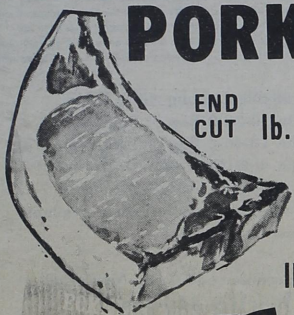
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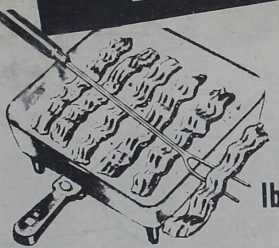
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
