

How many times have your eyes scanned the skies, and you hoped desperately for a rain.

Trouble with rain is that, no matter how long the dry spell, everybody is not ready for the moisture when it comes. Perhaps that's what is being done now-the clouds are just waiting until people are 100% ready!

We're ready! Recently when we went in to pay our water bill after trying all through August to keep the lawn green as possible, we remarked: Guess I'll have. to stop drinking water as a conservation measure and economic necessity.

We're losing faith in the daily weather reports of 20% possibility, maybe 25% or 30%, and no rain comes. We're inclined to scoff at the reporter, although realizing he isn't making the prediction-just reading if off a piece of paper.

Looks like we'd better start exercising some of our sure-fire methods of causing it to rain, or hopefully recalling some of the encouraging signs.

A "wet moon" has always been an encouraging sign. Trouble is that folks can't agree on just what a wet moon is. It's generally identified with a halfmoon in the sky, but the problem is-is it a wet moon when it's sitting level in the sky like a canoe in quiet waters, so it is holding the water; or is it when the moon is tilted to one end, letting the water spill out over all the earth?

A ring around the moon used to be a pretty good sign. One would count the stars within the ring, and a rain was sure to come in that many days!

A method we practiced when a kid was to kill a snake and place it so it's naked belly was turned upward. It was sure to rain within five days.

A hurricane in the gulf used to always produce a good rain in this section of Texas. We've had three so far this year, and the rain results have been far from satisfying.

A strong wind blowing out of the south for three days was another sign you could almost bet on.

Then, there have been rainmakers; like, for instance, Chief Wattamaker, or something, who appeared in Wichita Falls a few years back, and nearly made a failure.

hay or shear sheep. Anyone who works for you is your employee and not the employee of the farmer or stockman for whom you do the contract job.


You should keep records of your income and expenses. You should report your earnings to Internal Revenue if you net \$400 in a calendar year.

Free Meal Program Released At Weinert

Weinert Rural High unusual expenses due to School announces its continuing policy for free and reduced meals and free milk for children unable to pay the price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs and Special Milk Program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced meals and free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other

unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs sin excess of 30% of income. special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms have been sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the Superintendent's office at the school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.



Industries in rural areas that are interested in overseas markets can get assistance from the U.S. ment specialist with the Visiting Mr. and Mrs. Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The Department of Com-


merce's Trade Opportunities Program is designed to help rural industry seeking sales leads in foreign countries," says Dr. Richard Floyd. "The department has staff

in the 200 or so U. S Embassies and Consulates who look for marketing opportunities, and these are then forwarded to the company from Washington." Firms wishing to register

with the Commerce Department must indicate types of products or services they want to export, what countries they are interested in, and the kinds of sales leads they are seeking. Leads include whom to contact and what and how much is needed, points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

To register for the Trade Opportunities Program, a firm may contact the district office or call 202-377-2665. A company pays \$25 to register with the Trade Opportunities Program and \$37.50 for each 50 leads actually provided, points out
