Bullock said that cities having the optional one percent city sales tax received a total of \$288.5 million to date this year, compared to \$238.8 million for the same period last

About 50 area cotton AMBUSH TM the new pyre- ed by the Environmental Protection Agency. It was also used under an Emergency Exemption, the first ever granted by the EPA, for control of the bollworm/ budworm complex after populations reached high levels. Several thousand gallons were applied throughout the cotton belt in 1977 under the Emergency program.

Tests under the fullseason program at the Phillip McAfee farm show superior control of bollworms. From July 22, 1977 to August 30, 1977, 6 applications were applied at the rate of 0.1 to 0.15 pounds active ingredient per acre.

As was expected with this new insecticide, cotton matured 7 days earlier than plots treated with standard insecticides. Mr. McAfee the owner, estimates that his vield on cotton treated with AMBUSH will be 75% larger than cotton treated with standard materials.

He also commented, "From these tests, I've learned two things about AMBUSH that every grower needs to know. You don't get quick knock-down. Insects stop feeding immediately, but you can see them squirming around for a day or two after application, even though they don't bother the cotton. The other point is that you need at least three gallons of water per acre with aerial applications to get good coverage of plants, and about 10 gallons per acre with ground rigs.
