Munday Moguls Smash Rotan Yellowhammers

The Munday Moguls blasted the Rotan Yellowhammers 43-0 in Friday night's District 7-A game to hold on to a tie for first with the Haskell Indians.

Isom Murray had his best night of the year as he accounted for two of the Moguls touchdowns.

In the first quarter, Mogul quarterback Carey Shawver passed to Tony Urbanczyk for 30 yards and the TD with Larry Welch adding the one point conversion.

The second period added 13 points to the Moguls score. Isom Murray went over from the one and Welch added the PAT. Robert Spells received a hand-off from Shawver and ran six yards for the second touchdown with the point after failing. At the half the score

ended 20-0 in the Moguls favor.

Shawver ran over from the 6 yard line to score his only touchdown of the night and Welch again added the PAT. Murray was called on again in the third period and added six from the one yard line and his second score of the game. Welch kicked the extra point making it 4 of 5 for the night. A field goal from the 31 yard line was good by Welch to make a total of 7 points to his credit for the night.

Doug Michalik ended the Mogul scoring in the fourth quarter on a 37 yard run with point after failing.

City Receives Sales Tax Rebate Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced recently that city sales tax rebates are running a healthy 20.8 percent over last year.

Munday's city sales tax rebate check which is their October share totaled \$1,067.99. Total payment for 1977 is up 12 percent for Munday as compared to last year's totals at this time.

Bullock said that cities having the optional one percent city sales tax received a total of \$288.5 million to date this year, compared to \$238.8 million for the same period last year.

"This is a pretty good indicator of the strength of the Texas economy and from an economic standpoint, things couldn't look better for the state," Bullock said.

Stenholm Announces 17th District Candidacy

Charles Stenholm announced on Tuesday, October 4, his candidacy for congress from the 17th Congressional District.

The Stenholms traveled on two buses accompanied by supporters from their home town, visiting 23 communities for announcement rallies throughout the day.

The reason for the bus tours, Stenholm said, "is to bring my announcement to as many people as possible and to make this a district-wide campaign right from the start."

Stenholm, a Stamford resident, emphasized in his announcement that all residents, regardless of whether they lived on the farms, in small towns, or larger cities of the district, have a stake in what happens to the

district's basic source of wealth, which is the land. "What helps the producers of food, fiber, and energy," he said, "helps us all; and what hurts them hurts us all."

Stenholm cautioned that district residents should not consider the problems of this area without looking at problems in other areas of the economy. "Businessmen, manufacturing people, consumers, agricultural and energy producers, and senior citizens share the same basic problems: Costs of production and costs of living are rising every day because of inflation; government regulations that have no relation to the needs of the country punish producers and consumers instead of encouraging production, initiative, and peace of mind.

Speaking to on-lookers at each brief stop, Stenholm said that the 17th District is "unique among congressional districts" in that voters can send someone to congress who knows the problems of agriculture, business, rural and urban areas from a lifetime of living and working in the district. He added that the "numbers of individuals involved in agricultural and

energy production has decreased at a time when this production has increased in importance to the country."

"When you consider that the voice of this important segment of our economy has decreased in Washington where the laws, rules, and guidelines are written that regulate the economy where we all make our living," Stenholm said, then the importance of sending "someone to Washington who understands the needs of a district whose livelihood is tied to the land makes the uniqueness of the 17th District very crucial."

The day's tour ended in Big Spring Tuesday evening with a rally.

Stenholm is seeking the congressional seat now held by Omar Burleson. Burleson announced in August that he would retire at the end of his current term in 1978.

City Council Meets Oct. 11

The Munday City Council met in regular session, Tuesday, Oct. 11 at 7 p.m. at the City Hall in Munday. Minutes of the meeting are substantially as follows:

Mayor Clint Norman called the meeting to order and the minutes of the regular meeting on Sept. 13 and special meetings on the 26 and 2 on the 30th were approved.

Discussion as to the requirements of the Corps of Engineers in regard to future pipelines crossing the drainage ditch was held. Pipelines etc., crossing the ditch must meet the Corps recommendations.

A discussion was held on the requirements of the State in regard to the certification or schooling for the City Judge. These schools are set-up in January.

Walter Hertel gave a report on the S.T.E.P. program and Green Thumb program which sponsors employees 16 to 24 hours per week.

Marr reported on the street paving completion

and collection of assessments.

Chief Saffel reported on the new radar being used on a trial basis. He has written several tickets since the unit was received. A 37-180 radio to be installed at the Chief's house on an antenna to cover during telephone failures was discussed. The Police Commissioner believed this to be a needed item for the police department and also for fire and ambulance service. It was agreed that an old unit be used if repairable at a reasonable cost and if not, find a good used unit that would meet the approval of the Police Commissioner and Administrator.

Marr moved to pay the bills: from the operating fund \$7759.94; ambulance fund \$252.39; street paving special \$260.53; revenue sharing fund \$57.38; airport fund \$172.24 and swimming pool telephone co. credit of \$26.25. Hardin seconded. Approved.

Cotton Classing Report

Cotton prices were steady to lower, ranging from 42 to 45 cents per pound, according to Sidney Ferrell, in charge of the Munday Classing Office. Market activity continued slow. Grade quality remained high with 90 percent of the cotton

classified being in the White category. Grade 31 accounted for 71 percent and grade 40 was 9 percent. Four percent graded 21 and 6 percent was grade 41. Grade 32 accounted for 8 percent. Four percent of the cotton was reduced in grade because of bark or grass. Staple length showed an increase in the longer staples with staple 32 accounting for 46 percent of the total classed for the week. Staple 31 was 40 percent and staple 33 and longer was 8 percent. Staple 30 accounted for 5 percent. Micronaire readings continued good with 95 percent miking in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Three percent miked below 3.5.

About 17,400 samples were classed during the week ending Friday, October 14, bringing our season total to 23,400.

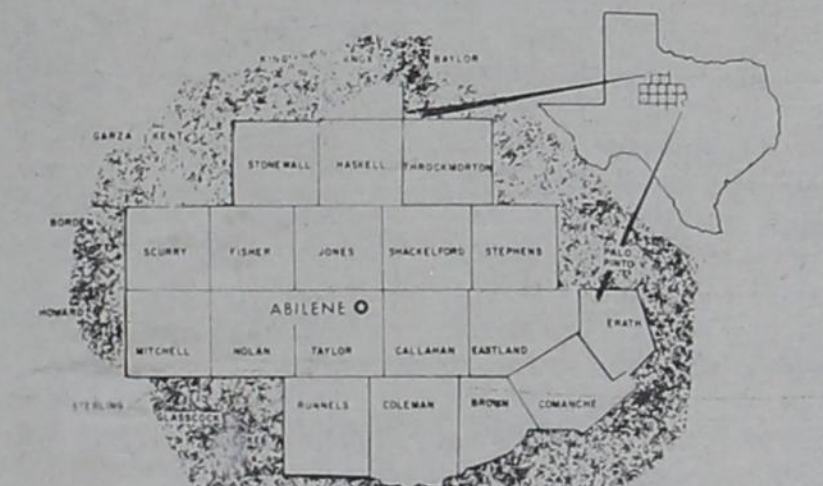
He is serving as a crew-member aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Halsey, homeported in Long Beach, Calif.

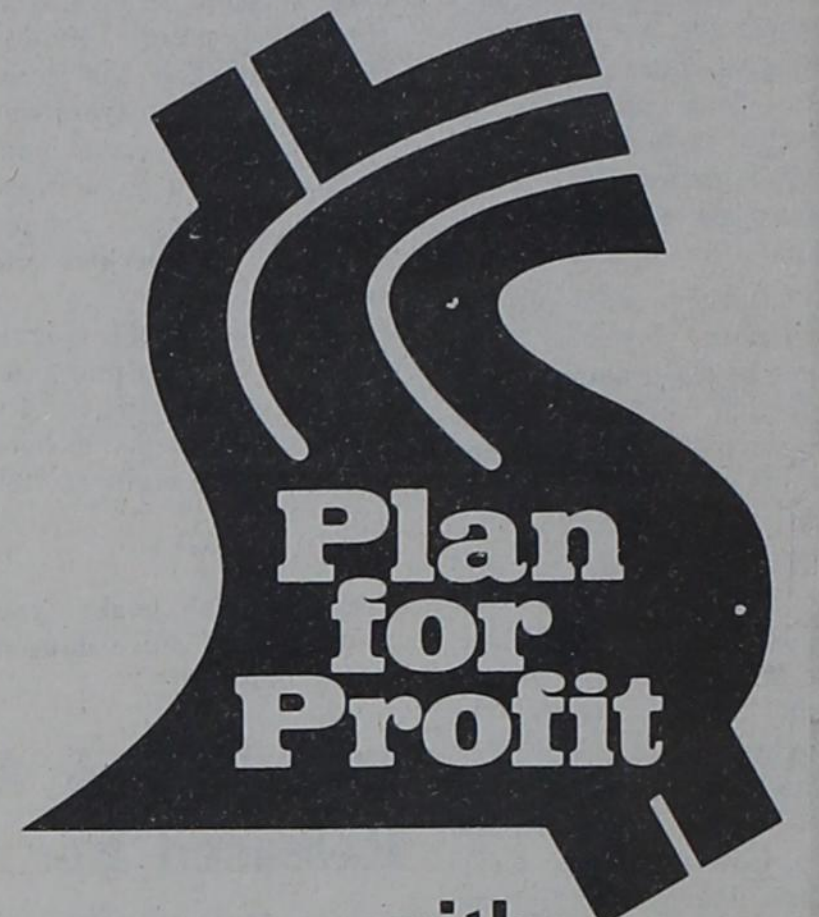

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

CARVE A JACK-O-LANTERN FOR HALLOWEEN FUN

As the morning air gets nippy and crisp, thoughts turn to fall. For the younger set, fall means Halloween. Make this Halloween special with a real pumpkin jack-o'-lantern!

Pumpkin season is rapidly approaching.

Pumpkin season lasts from late September until early May, with the peak season in October and November. About 79% of the pumpkins marketed are sold during October.

Several popular varieties of pumpkins you will be seeing are:

Field is the traditional jack-o'-lantern pumpkin. It averages 10 to 12 inches in diameter and weighs about 20 pounds, though larger ones aren't uncommon.

Small Sugar is the favorite for baking pies. It is about 7 inches in diameter and weighs 6 to 8 pounds and is an excellent eating pumpkin.

If you follow these suggested pumpkin-buying guidelines you will likely get a good one.

Buy only mature pumpkins that are heavy for their size.

Check for excessive scarring, cracks and soft-rot. There should be no wet-breakdown or indications of freezing or disease.

Buy clean pumpkins that are of a rich orange color.

Pumpkins come in all shapes and sizes. There are some that are nearly round, others are oblong, and some look a bit flattened on the top. Let your pumpkin shape add character to your jack-o'-lantern.

Children love to carve jack-o'-lantern faces. This can fill a rainy afternoon with fun.

To carve a jack-o'-lantern,

set the pumpkin on a table with the stem-side up. Cut off the top about 1/8 of the way down, exposing the hollow center of the pumpkin. Save the top for a lid.

Scoop out the seeds and the stringy material from the inside of the pumpkin, leaving a hollow shell.

Using a sharp knife, carve a face on one side of the pumpkin. To make the pumpkin last longer, spray the inside with a clear plastic to keep it from molding.

Last of all, place a short candle inside to light up the faces of the jack-o'-lantern and the children, then replace the top.

The seeds you scooped from the inside of the ole' jack can be roasted for a special treat.

Separate the seeds from the fiber, but do not wash. Spread the seeds in a shallow pan, salt liberally, pour a tablespoon of melted butter over them and bake one hour in a 250 degree

oven, or until dry and lightly browned. Drain on a paper towel and serve as a snack.

It's possible that sunspot activity may affect crop yields and sunspot cycles may help predict yield deviations, an Economic Research Service study shows. This observation was from preliminary studies for 1866 through 1973 of wheat in Texas and Kansas, corn in Illinois and Louisiana (1895-1972) and cotton in Texas. The ERS found lower than average yields associated with low sunspot activity, especially when it follows the high of a minor sunspot cycle, and higher than average yields during high sunspot activity. The ERS said Texas wheat yields declined 7% in periods of low sunspot activity while output rose 4% during highly active periods. *****
